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Courage at half cock

IT MUST BE obvious to readers that Courage is not the 'Drinker's' favourite brewery. It is fast taking over the mantle once worn by Watney's, that of the beer enthusiast's Enemy No. 1.

Why should this be so? When you venture into a Courage pub these days, (writes NICK WARD, who is CAMRA's liaison officer with the company), you need to have your beer buds about you. You might, if you're lucky, get a pint of Directors or Best Bitter, still quite good beers, though sometimes hard to tell apart. On the other hand, you might be served 'bright' (i.e. filtered) best bitter from a handpump, prevalent in South-East London, Surrey and Kent. You might be palmed off with a pint of toppressure Directors,

Both practices are against declared company policy, but the company doesn't seem to have much to say about what goes on in its pubs. To be fair to Courage landlords, the main problem they face with regard to real ale is delivery. Some landlords serving bright best through handpumps do so because they can't get the real thing. Others, particularly in S.W. London (see June 'London Drinker') are being persuaded to take bright beer by the local depot.

Courage's management policies seem to be at the root of the problem. Centralised brewing and distribution through depots favour processed beer, since the double-handling and delays involved are likely to affect the quality of cask-conditioned ale, especially when disputes cause additional hold-ups.

The other big brewers, including Watney's, have realised the commercial importance of real ale, but Courage just haven't caught on.

They show no signs of realising the benefits of decentralisation and the identity of regional brews.

Courage in London have a good strong bitter (Directors), and a bitter which could be improved, although a new barrel of Best Bitter can be very good. But they have no real mild. Within the group they have the ability to produce really good mild, (witness Plymouth Heavy and the excellent, latelamented Reading Mild). But they have abandoned this end of the drinkers' market in favour of the mad scramble for the lager bubble.

So we have a company which is following the policies of Watney's in the Sixties and their profit performance has gone the same way - down. CAMRA is trying to help them see the light, but the management, at least in London, won't even talk to us. So all we can do is monitor their headlong progress to Grotneyland.

Courage are not as single-minded as Watney's were in pursuing their fate. They are still installing handpumps-1400 are promised in the next year. More promotion is planned for Directors and Best Bitter, and the Courage Western 'Ale House Scheme' whereby leaflets are available giving all outlets for cask-conditioned beer is being actively pursued.

Therefore if we can correct the, largely local, attempts to push pressurised and bright beer and assist any attempts to promote real ale, Courage is not a lost cause.

We can only hope that Courage recognise the full potential of real ale before Imperial Tobacco, who own them, decide to sell them off to Wimpy Bars or to a Pizza chain.

From the heart of the hop country



In the second of our series on the out-of-town independents, LEN MURRAY looks at the pride of Kent, Shepherd Neame, whose share of both tied and free trade in London has grown in recent years.

UNTIL RECENTLY, Shepherd Neame Ltd. was the only independent Brewery in Kent. It was founded in 1698 by Richard Marsh who, like several noted brewers over the years, became Mayor of Faversham on more than one occasion. He passed the business on to his son who died in 1727 and his daughter sold out to Samual Shepherd of Mongeham, near Deal in 1741. Julius Shepherd took over on his father's death in 1770 when they owned three tied houses, the Red Lion, the Castle, and the Three Tuns; the latter two of which are Sheps houses to this day! 'Modernisation' came to the Court Street brewhouse in 1790 when Julius installed a steam engine, the first in the town.

Between the 1840's and 1869 various partnerships were entered into, the firm trading as Shepherd & Hilton and then Shepherd & Mares until Pearcy Beale Neame joined and the familiar name of Shepherd Neame & Co. appeared. In 1877 Henry Shepherd Jnr. died and severed the family link, and P.B. Neame became the sole proprietor. Under his control the Brewery flourished, adding considerably to its tied estate. He bred the magnificent heavy horses, for which the Company was justly famous, whilst still recognising the advantages of mechanical transport. In 1874 the Company purchased a traction engine from Messrs. Aveling & Porter of Rochester and it was used for deliveries as far afield as Ashford which must have been a tiring walk for the man carrying the red flag! Steam waggons were used until 1939 and the last dray-horse, Old Charlie, wasn't pensioned off until the early 60's.

A private limited company was formed in 1914 and it currently has 130 shareholders, the Chairman being Mr.Robert Neame. In 1956, the Maidstone firm of E.Mason & Co., Waterside Brewery, was purchased and its delightful Trade Mark of an Edwardian parlourmaid carrying beer to her master was used for a while but has now long since disappeared. The last 5 years has seen the expenditure of some £5 million on Brewery modernisation, but Real Ale continues to flow.

The present brewhouse was rebuilt and re-equipped in 1896-97 and some of this plant is still in use alongside the newly-installed plant. Modern materials and technology may be employed but the brewhouse is still traditional in its methods and, more importantly perhaps, in its end product. The beers are brewed from malted barley, hops from the Company's own hop farm at Queens Court Ospringe, water drawn from an Artesian well and yeast. In fact the Company's slogan for many years was 'Malt & Hops Only'.

Now that the new Brewhouse is in use, production capacity is some 156,000 barrels, which translated into pints is almost 45 million per annum.

Shepherd Neame have one of the most complete range of beers in the United Kingdom. Cask conditioned beer accounts for a substantial 60% of their production with keg and bottled beers making up the remainder. Some 70% of their sales are for Master Brew Bitter (1036) followed by their sweeter Special Bitter (1039) which is smoother but with a bit more bite. 'Sheps' have always been known for their Master Brew Mild (1031) and are one of the few breweries in the south of England who have no plans to produce it in keg form only. Last but not least is their dark Stock Ale (1037) which is very suitable for a cold winter's evening or the 'mild drinker'who prefers something similar but a bit stronger.

Draught Abbey is a keg version of 'Sheps' Special Bitter while a recent addition to their range is the Master Brew XX which is a light bitter (1033) produced specifically for the club trade although it is now available in many pubs. They also produce a range of bottle beers with intriguing names such as Bishops Finger, Borough Brown, Shepherd Stout, Abbey Ale, Christmas Ale (brewed for the festive season), as well as the more conventionally named Light Ale.

Since 1975 'Sheps' have been brewing under licence the strong Sternbrau lager (1045) which is marketed under the name of Hurlimann. For those who enjoy lager this is one of the best you can drink.

'Sheps' own some 236 pubs throughout the south of England most of which are run by tenants. The brewery do not favour managed houses and this is reflected in the excellent way that their products are kept. Nearly all their own pubs sell Real Ale served by traditional methods. They also supply some 650 Free Trade outlets throughout their trading area.

In the last few years 'Sheps' have been extending their trading area and are always looking for new outlets even to the extent of purchasing pubs to achieve their objective. At the time of printing this article, 'Sheps' own 15 pubs in the London area but are currently looking for more. So that the London drinker can sample what 'Sheps' have to offer, a current list of their tied London pubs are shown below.



JENNINGS – Beer as beer ought to be, with nothing added and nothing taken away!



HAMMERSMITH is an area which is full of contrasts, ranging from the new developments round Hammersmith Broadway to the elegant Victorian riverside. It is extremely well served by public transport including at least thirteen bus routes and three underground lines.

Start at the RIVERSIDE STUDIOS
(1) in Crisp Road. These ex-BBC studios now house a theatre complex which puts on a wide range of productions. Better still is the bar which serves Fuller's London Pride and E.S.B. at cheaperthan-normal pub prices. Also there is excellent home-made food at reasonable prices available both for lunch and in the early evening.

Left up Crisp Road and left again is Lower Mall and the River Thames. Pass under Hammersmith Bridge (built in 1887 by Sir Joseph Bazalgette) and turn right up to the OXFORD AND CAMBRIDGE (2). This

Charrington pub, serving only I.P.A. on handpump has recently had its two bars knocked into one but there are still public and lounge 'ends'. Also there is 'live' music most Friday and Sunday evenings.

Back down to the river and along Lower Mall is the BLUE ANCHOR (3), a popular Courage pub whose licence dates back to 1800. Best Bitter and Directors are available from an array of handpumps - some of these are fake, so be careful. Outside there are tables and chairs but as the river wall was raised by 18 inches a few years ago as part of London's flood-control measures, the riverside views are not as good as they could be.

Through the gardens is a small alley way where one of London's best-known taverns can be found. THE DOVE (4), a listed pub dating back to the reign of Charles II, was bought by Fuller's in 1796. Inside, London Pride and E.S.B. can be found but no draught

lager! In the tiny public bar (on your right as you enter) is a brass plate showing the level that the pub was flooded to in the high tides of 1928. In the back is a small garden which affords not only excellent views of the river and of Chiswick Eyot but also of Fuller's Brewery. Although it can get very crowded and the prices are a bit high, it is nonetheless worth the visit.

Next is the 17th century OLD SHIP (5), a recently-rebuilt Watney pub that won the Evening Standard's Pub of the Year contest two years ago. Unfortunately, both the London and Stag Bitters are served by the controversial D.C.L. system - still there is always bottled Guinness or Worthington White Shield should you wish to stop for a while.

Carry on along to South Black Lion lane then right up to pedestrian subway under the busy Great West Road. Just beyond is THE CROSS KEYS (6), a Good Beer Guide pub selling excellent Fuller's London Pride & E.S.B. The landlord is very keen and during a recent brewery strike, got in a wide and varied range of other traditional beers. Since last January, the Campden Hill Branch of the Society for the Preservation of Beer from the Wood have been meeting here regularly on the first Monday of each month. At other times there is usually live music. There is also a very pleasant garden.

Just round the corner on King St. is the WHITE HART (7), a large, fairly basic pub serving Ind Coope Burton Ale. The next pub is quite a walk but it will give you a chance to sober up a bit or even stop for some fish and chips by Dalling Road. Just.up Dalling Road is THE PRINCE OF WALES (8), a large Irish-music pub selling Courage Directors.

Beyond is the first Young's pub on this crawl, THE THATCHED HOUSE (9). Ex-Fulham football player, Beddy Jezzard keeps excellent Ordinary and Special and certainly justifies his inclusion in the Good Beer Guide. Needless to say, it is a very popular pub - service is fast and staff extremely friendly. In fact, it was a runner up in the S.P.B.W. Pub-of-the-Year contest last year.

Back again into King Street and past THE SALUTATION (A Fullers pub currently awaiting installation of handpumps) is THE COACHMAKER'S ARMS (10). A small, one-bar pub which sells Charrington IPA from a single handpump and boasts a collection of old chamber pots hanging from the ceiling.

Further down King Street and opposite the New King's Mall shopping precinct is THE BUILD-ERS (11), a pleasant two-bar pub selling all four Young's beers and, if you're so inclined, polypins to take away. The lounge bar, reached via the small street on the right of the pub, has recently been redecorated and in winter has a real fire. Very handy for the Lyric Theatre, which unlike the Riverside Studios, sells its Fuller's beers on pressure.

Finally, round Hammersmith Broadway and up Shepherds Bush Road is THE BROOK GREEN HOTEL (12), a large Good Beer Guide pub selling all four Young's beers and handy for transport home after, we hope, a very enjoyable time.

Note: A pub crawl of the area, organised jointly by the West London Branch of CAMRA and the Campden Hill S.P.B.W., will take place on the evening of Thursday 14 August. It starts at the RIVERSIDE STUDIOS at 7.00, with the next stop, the BLUE ANCHOR at 8.00.







Crunch for the Tramshed

GREENWICH BOROUGH COUNCIL, writes LOUISE JOSELYN, must have been quite surprised at the response to the public meeting it called on July 7th to discuss the views on the development plans for Woolwich Town centre. These, as outlined in the April issue of 'London Drinker', call for the demolition of the Tramshed, Woolwich's only all-round entertainment centre and real ale haven.

Over 500 people including past and present performers such as Max Collie, Joe Stead and Splodgenessabounds (of 'Two pints of lager and a packet of crisps' fame) marched in pouring rain from the Tramshed to the meeting. Afterwards, the campaigners knew that they had impressed upon the councillors the extent of the support. The final decision was to be made by the council on 28 July.

Two schemes have been put forward.
One, put forward by the 'Save Woolwich Now' Campaign, combines selective redevelopment of certain buildings and areas with the retention of the Tramshed Theatre.
The second, which the council are investigating further, involves complete redevelopment of the area.

Under this, some space has been allocated to replace the Tramshed Theatre. However, this will not be enough to make the running of the theatre profitable, without charging an extortionate amount for entrance. More important to the beer drinker and beer drinking theatre-goer, there would be no cellars. Added to this, the whole atmosphere of this Victorian generating station would be lost.


Colin Smith, who jointly runs the Tramshed bar with Terry Malone is very pleased with the success so far of the campaign and says:
"The more pressure there has been

from us, the more the developers have indicated that if an alternative plan is advocated then proper facilities will be provided for keeping real ale in the Tramshed". Hopefully this will mean the provision of an adequate cellar at least.

'Save The Tramshed' and 'Save Woolwich Now' have joined together since the last meeting and organised another petition, to be presented to all the councillors before the final decision is taken. This is in addition to the already 6000 strong petition signed by Tramshed users. "If the Council decides to go ahead with the redevelopment", says Colin, "it will find that the objections have only just begun. We will just move into a higher gear."

WE UNDERSTAND that Simon's Tower Bridge Brewery has stopped brewing and is unlikely to restart in the immediate future.



Finally round the bend

"I AM VERY (ahem) to see so many of (ahem) enjoying yourselves and just (cough) that you should (er) tuck in and grab the jolly old booze while it's there, what?"

Sir Rudolph Clumping-Twatt hated every minute, but the Board had insisted that nothing less than the Chairman would do to preside at the opening of the newest, biggest Gurglepis GuzzlePalace. A huge and shimmering office block had risen from the ashes of one of the many breweries taken over by the company in its rampaging past. But the ground floor contained two banks, a unisex sauna, a pornographic bookshop and, not least, the ASSET-STRIPPER'S ARMS.

You could just sit and drink, or try one of the twenty sizes of steaks cooked to your exact specifications on the Charco-o-matic Grill. As with all GuzzlePalaces, the rooms were spacious and the decor old fashioned. If neither the black beams nor the glowing log-fires nor the twirly bits over the bar were exactly what they seemed, they did contribute an air of cosiness and well-being.

At last Sir Rudolph was able to hand over to Jiminy Sleak and retire gratefully to his corner and his G&T. A few platitudes and then Sleak introduced the night's celebrities: Ferdy Pewbs, smut comedian, and Pendula Bobble, starlet and girl-about-town.

Arthur Droopy supped slowly at the bar and watched the audience. Everyone had ears for Pewbs and eyes for Bobble. 7X SuperNatural Ale, served from handpumps which jutted defiantly through the glare of GlucksenHarn and BlasenBrau dispensers, was going down well with a group of Real Ale notables as they basked in the warmth existing be-

tween their organisation and Gurglepis that had replaced the years of mutual blood-letting. At another table, the shorts were being knocked back at supersonic speed by a party of journalists.

Droopy made his way to the Gents'. He had already tested the urinal and now needed to sample the other amenities. From the comments circulating, he gathered that the new invention did not meet with everyone's approval. It had also nearly claimed its first victim: a writer on one of the trade papers, attending his third session of the day, had lost his footing at a crucial stage and found himself dragged half-way into the

mechanism.

By contrast the cubicles, as Droopy was pleased to discover, were constructed on traditional lines. He was less pleased to find that there were no toilet rolls. The place hadn't been open five minutes and already the local football supporters had raided the toilets and stocked up for Saturday.

ALAN GREENWOOD'S BEER DIARY

LAST MONTH, I had the pleasure of attending the first-year celebrations of the GOOSE AND FIRKIN in Southwark Bridge Road. For those who don't know, the GOOSE AND FIRKIN (a 15th century word for a fourth of a barrel, i.e. 9 gallons of beer) is one of two pubs started by David Bruce into which he has incorporated a small brewing plant. The beers produced and sold only in the two pubs are Bruce's Bitter, Dog Bolter and special-occasion beers, Earth Stopper and Sphynxta. If more proven beers are preferred, Shepherd Neame's and others are also available.

However, even more notable than the uniqueness of its own beers is the very high standard of pubmanship and atmosphere, all of which are enhanced by David's principal philosophy and own life-style - that people should enjoy themselves.

David Bruce's passion for people enjoying themselves has an interesting coincidence, for within literally a few hundred yards are the remains of another brewery business, which was once entrenched with the same ideals and philosophies. This was Jenner's Southwark Bridge Brewery, which although having about five pubs, brewed substantially for theatres and the merry making Music Halls which they actively supported.

Unfortunately, laws and fashions change. The changes took their toll of this lucrative and important brewery trade, and consequently of Jenner's Brewery. But even today there is a descendant - Mr. Jenner, now Head Brewer and Managing Director of Harvey's Brewery in Lewes who if he cannot be found in his brewery or home is almost guaranteed to be at his local theatre of which he is a major patron.

At the GOOSE AND FIRKIN, back in London, the merryment continues today, as the tender heads and hoarse, over-sung voices, following the first year's celebrations, bear witness. Good luck to David, the GOOSE AND FIRKIN, and all who can enjoy themselves in such a good wholesome vein.




