EDITORIAL

London Drinker is primarily concerned with the beer scene in London but, as we approach 1992, it is perhaps appropriate to look at the situation from a European perspective. As subscription manager for London Drinker, I send the magazine to The Netherlands, Belgium and Denmark as well as the USA, Canada and New Zealand. In fact, Bjarne Jorgensen from Denmark has been a subscriber since the first edition in March 1979.

Informal contacts between PINT, the OBP (the Dutch and Belgian Beer consumer organisation) and CAMRA grew up over the last few years at events such as the Bok Beer Festival in Amsterdam, the Antwerp 24 hour Festival and the Great British Beer Festival and this has now been formalized into the European Beer Consumers Union. The EBCU regularly lobbies MEPs and the European Commission on matters of mutual concern for beer drinkers in all the European countries. As harmonization becomes more prevalent over the next few years, it will be more important for beer drinkers to be represented on a European wide basis and, hopefully, similar consumer organisations will be formed in other countries with a strong beer drinking tradition, such as Germany. Outside the European Community, there are changes taking place in Czechoslovakia and it is important that the quality of Czech beer is not impaired by the adoption of modern brewing methods.

On a personal note, I have visited all the beer drinking countries of Europe over the years and I can vouch for the quality of the beer available in Europe. It is important that beer drinkers insist that this quality is maintained.

Finally, whether you are in the UK or abroad, London Drinker extends best wishes to all readers for a Happy Christmas and a prosperous New Year.

LETTERS TO THE EDITORS

Dear Editors

I refer to Hugh Smith's Letter in the October edition which I saw too late to reply to his comments on my Guest Editorial (July 1991) in the November issue. I wonder if Hugh saw the letter from Keith Flett in the September issue supporting my view on beer prices? I will concede that the last word of the phrase to which Hugh took exception, namely "£1.50 a pint seems about the norm" might have been better expressed as "average". However, the verb I used shows the statement to be my own impression, which I gained in a number of pubs, most of which I have frequented in a quarter of a century of London drinking, and of whose pricing policies I am aware. Only the very wealthy can afford not to be selective. The first part of my sentence containing the disputed words was "I haven't gone out of my way to find extremes". I suggest that Hugh has done precisely that, and I certainly don't accept that the prices quoted for Fuller's beers in a particular pub are "incredibly cheap for the area and not bad by any standard". I don't know what other prices are like in nearby pubs, and over a pound-and-a-half for even a beer as excellent and strong as ESB is well over the top, especially to those on a small income, who are on the increase and include me in their number. My available cash has not risen anywhere near as much as the cost of a pint which is, after all, a basic food though the price implies it is a luxury. I don't doubt Hugh's figures, but they certainly represent the cheaper pints available, and even they would have caused an outcry not so very long ago. Some breweries - and publicans - are set to price themselves out of the market, and the sooner the better.

The unthinkable happened on Sunday evening, in the "College Arms", Forest Road E17 and

then in the "Drum", Lea Bridge Road E10. In each, the bar staff announced without a hint of embarrassment that NO real ales were being sold that evening because there was a "beer festival next day." Whether or not this applied to all JDW pubs I do not know, but it does seem a strange way of running a chain of pubs whose main theme is the promotion of Real Ale. It shows a disregard for the "passing trade", and undermines JDW's pretensions to be that bit better than rival pub chains. Would it have been beyond the wit of the management in these two houses to have left at least ONE real ale available? It seems incredibly amateurish to have arbitrarily withdrawn the whole lot.

Let's hope that such unprofessionalism was a one-off occurrence, and that JDW is able to get its act together on the eves of any future "festivals".

NEWS FROM RICHMOND & HOUNSLOW

Major news from our neck of the woods down in the south west of the Capital is that the J D Wetherspoon organisation is due (as I write this) to open another new pub on Thursday 14th November, this time in Twickenham in the premises of a former wine bar and night club. This venue, which has not featured as an "opening soon" in their adverts in the Drinker is to be called (no prizes for guessing) the MOON UNDER WATER. It's coincidental, isn't it, that our recent correspondent, C. J. Player, who suggested a couple of alternative names for Wetherspoon pubs should come from Twickenham.

Meanwhile we seem to have a fair number of licensees on the move. Most disappointing for us was the recent departure of Frank and Joss Reynolds from the BUILDERS ARMS in Field Lane, Teddington just as the 1992 Good Beer Guide was coming out featuring their pub for the first time. Not being able to agree terms of a new lease with Courage, they have moved to the OLD WHITE HORSE, the last pub as you leave Henley on the A423 heading towards Oxford (a Brakspear's pub, if you hadn't guessed). They described this pub to me as very run down but I'm sure that by now it is well up to scratch. We all wish you all the very best in your new venture. Funnily enough, the next pub up the road from there is the FOX at Bix, run by Richard and Sue Willson whom those with long memories will remember from their days at the TUDOR CLOSE in Richmond (before it was tarted up and renamed the ROSE

OF YORK by Sam Smith's).

Another licensee who has moved, though not as far as Henley, is Peter Murray who was manager at the WHITE HART, Hampton Wick. He is now to be found at the RED COW, 59 Sheen Road, Richmond where he is the new tenant following the departure from there of Nick Toulson. Peter was moaning the other night about the two telephone boxes which were erected by British Telecom right in front of the front door of his saloon bar. It seems that the land on which they are standing may actually be part of the plot belonging to the pub and not public land. Either way they completely ruin the appearance of the pub as you approach it from the middle of Richmond and he is trying to get them moved. Before the days of phonecards there was just one old red phone box which was better sited and did not block the view anywhere near so much. Best of luck Peter.

Meanwhile, Peter's former assistant manager is currently in charge at the Builders Arms on behalf of Frank until his lease there runs out in February. Small world, isn't it.

Finally a belated welcome to Alex Priestly and his good lady Carmel who took over as new managers at the PRINCE ALBERT, 30 Hampton Road, Twickenham a couple of months ago. We featured the Albert (my local for about the last eighteen years) on our front cover last month but lack of space precluded any words about it.

SAMICHLAUS, THE STRONGEST LAGER IN THE WORLD. ARRIVES

Samichlaus, the world's strongest lager, has arrived in Britain, ready for a sell-out Christmas.

The UK allocation of Samichlaus, brewed by Brauerei Hurlimann AG in Zurich, Switzerland, has been almost doubled this year to cope with unprecedented demand.

Says Hurlimann UK director John Bird: "We have secured 1,500 cases - that's 36,000 bottles - and I anticipate selling it all very quickly." Basic trade price is £21.60 + VAT per dozen.

The demand for Samichlaus last year meant that supplies to more than 2,000 UK pubs and

take-home outlets were snapped as soon as they reached the shelves, despite an average retail price of around £2.30 per 25cl bottle.

Suppliers for Christmas, 1991, will include Classic Ales (formerly West Country Products), the Premium Beer & Wine Co of Gateshead, and Merrydown of Horam, while stockists will include Brain's and Shepherd Neame pubs, and Unwins off licences.

Samichlaus Bier is only brewed once a year, on December 6, which is Switzerland's





ITS GRAND TO GO TO OLYMPIA

Its good news to all you Londoners who like a good beer range. After this year's success at the London Arena, the GBBF is returning to London for 1992. The Festival will take place in Olympia between 4th and 8th August, 1992.

The Festival will be held in the Grand Hall; a hall which certainly lives up to it's name. The Hall was commissioned in 1884 by the Nat. Agric. Hall Co. to provide a hall suitable for both agricultural shows and military pageants.

The hall opened on Boxing Day in 1886 with a circus, the 'Paris Hippodrome'. It was so successful that it became a tradition. The last one being the Bertram Mills' Circus in 1967. Olympia was also the site for the first Motor Show in 1905. Current events include the annual Horse of the Year Show.

Not since, Alexandra Palace, has the GBBF been at a site with so much style and heritage. it is also the biggest venue to date, with over 150,000 square feet. The vast arched glass ceiling adds to the sense of space and grandure. The designer, Henry E Coe, allowed for natural ventilation by arranging for the roof to part in the centre by the use of pulleys. All being well, the skies will be parting once or twice during

the Festival. only the second time the event has been out in the open air!

For anyone who went to the London Arena, there will be a sigh of relief that the 1992 Festival will be much more accessible. With 4 tube stations within 10-15 minutes and plenty of buses running along the road outside travelling to and from the venue should be easy.

NEWS FROM YOUNGS

A pub without a garden has won the top prizes in two gardening contests.

The Mitre in St Mary's Grove, Richmond, Surrey - already voted Best Bloomin' Pub in London - has now won the final of a competition open to the 170 pubs owned by Youngs, the Wandsworth independent brewers.

Licensees Patrick and Carmel Regan took both awards for their amazing display of hanging baskets and window boxes, which have made the Mitre one of the most attractive pubs in Britain. In summer, hardly a brick below the first floor of the pub is left uncovered by flowers or foliage.

The Best Bloomin' Pub Trophy is the most hotly contested award in the London in Bloom competition, organised by the London Tourist Board, and the Mitre's triumph comes a year after the Regans took second prize.

The Young's contest is split into four sections

- for gardens, front-of-house displays, patios and herb gardens - and the four winners go into a final round of judging for the overall championship.

Mr and Mrs Regan learned that they had won the top award from the brewery at a ceremony at Guildhall in the City of London.

The section winners they beat to the title were the Foley Arms, Claygate, Surrey (garden), the Bricklayers' Arms, Sydenham, south London (patio) and the Windmill, Clapham Common, south London (herbs).

FROM OUR ARCHIVES

TEN YEARS AGO the December,1981/January 1982 edition of London Drinker consisted of 24 pages including the outer cover on pink paper, which featured the exterior of the Mudlark, SE1 then Charrington's newest pub, and still a pleasant venue, even for a modern pub. The page size was then slightly larger than that which you are now reading - at the time the paper was to the old imperial Foolscap size, and the pages were about ½ inch taller and wider than this, metric A5. (I only realized that when preparing this item, though in retrospect the change was made with our first glossy edition, in June 1984). Enough technicalities, let's get on with some recent history.

The first item was a major work of statistics from Roger Warhurst, analysing the breakdown of pubs selling real ale in the Greater London district, by geographical division and brewer. The vital figures were: total pubs 5,454, real 2,374 (= 44%). Free houses also received attention, 244 or 79% of the total of 307 were selling real ale.

Under the heading A MAC AT THE OPERA was the report "We can look forward to the first tied house in central London to be run by the Hertford brewers McMullen's. The NAG's HEAD in Covent Garden has been run by Whitbread even though McMullen's own the freehold. Our information is that McMullen's will shortly take over the pub from Whitbread".

David Bruce's Firkin chain had opened another (fourth) pub, the Pheasant & Firkin, formerly the Ivy House, in Goswell Road, EC1. At the time of printing it was selling beers brewed in other Firkin pubs, and brewing on the premises was anticipated for the New Year. Two lines following that report stated that the Lion, Pawson's Road, Croydon, was also brewing its own - neither is doing so ten years since.

In an article entitled "Measure for Measure", Laurie Bishop surveyed the British ersatz lager scene; at that time there were a number of advertising campaigns to promote its sale. Part of the article ran: "If the British drinker were to sop and think a minute he might question the wisdom of spending so much of his money on inferior products. However, we live in an age of junk food, where genuine soya bean pie will become popular to the detriment of traditional British cooking. Where processed food rules OK. Where battery eggs are preferred to free range and where trash like sliced bread in big red plastic carriers replaces the traditional loaf from the local baker.

The philistine will of course describe what is said above as yet another example of blinkered narrow mindedness that all dyed-in-the-wool traditionalists display when their pride and joy is threatened. I refute that. Lager drinkers are quite entitled to go on drinking their own peculiar form of poison for as long as they like provided that they do me no harm in the process. But Londoners have lost too many breweries in recent years because of rationalisation. Keg beer and lager, together with the centralisation of production in large mega-breweries near to motorways have robbed us in the capital of many of our best beers."

As a footnote, he added in a typical CAMRA "No holds barred" statement: "The brewers don't just overcharge for lager. Compare draught Bass at 70p a pint in the Royal George SE1 (free house) with Charles Wells' bitter at 56p a pint in the Anchor & Hope in the Cut SE1 (Wells' tied house). The only thing I would add is that I wish the Anchor & Hope gave you a full pint!"

FIVE YEARS AGO: The December 1986/ January 1987 edition was the first to be printed without the use of black ink, green appearing throughout with red as the second colour on 8 pages, as befitted to Festive season. The front cover was largely in red with a 2-coloured cartoon by our loyal artist Eileen Gray, who over the years has produced many cartoons and illustrations for this magazine. It depicted a somewhat inebriated Santa Claus arriving head-first, clutching a near-empty jar, in the fireplace of a room festively decorated and including many empty glasses. I well recall my language when colour-dividing it, and the Printer's comment when receiving the instructions. Perhaps a small consolation for his typesetter was that a fair amount of the text was set on Andy Pirson's word-processor and reproduced camera-ready in reduced form, giving higher than average words-per-page. At 40 pages this was at that time the bulkiest

BOOK REVIEW: THE GOOD BEER GUIDE, 1992

The launch of the 1992 Good Beer Guide in October marked the beginning of CAMRA's 21st birthday celebrations. This is its 19th edition, and I believe the format has now evolved to its optimum, given that the page size is unlikely to alter at this stage. Consisting of 480 pages in card cover, it lists about 5,000 pubs and real ale off-licences in Great Britain. Northern Ireland, the Channel Islands and the Isle of Man. Having said that, it is not simply a list. Each entry has been researched and written by a volunteer enthusiast, and selected by the local CAMRA Branches, who can be expected to know what they are doing. I quote here the paragraph which appears towards the foot of the inside Front Cover, below the explanation of how to use the Guide, and the list of symbols for facilities, as it sets out more clearly and briefly than I can the principles involved in its compilation.

"The information contained in the GOOD BEER GUIDE is the result of surveys by volunteer CAMRA members, who receive no payment and accept no hospitality or other inducements. The only way for a pub to be included in the GOOD BEER GUIDE is for it to receive sufficient votes at the selection meeting of the local CAMRA branch. Suggestions for pubs to be included (and excluded) are very welcome and will be passed to the local branch for consideration." It continues, making another point I would make, "Every effort is made to ensure the accuracy of the information in the GOOD BEER GUIDE, but no responsibility can be accepted for errors as it is inevitable that some pubs will change their character during the currency of the Guide."

The majority of the editorial matter in the form of feature items appears in the front of the Guide - the topics covered include: the rise and fall of keg; fictional TV pubs (as in soap operas); drinking at home; real beer abroad; and stout and porter. Such items separate this from a simple list of pubs, and make the project viable for a less specialized market than the dedicated CAMRA member; I am glad about this, as there are only 3 articles intruding into the essential text, all of them relevant to the subject. At the back is a ful list of brewers and their products, with some comments on taste - which is a matter of personal preference. A useful index appears of beers by their titles, and an indication of where

in the Guide to find more details. The Guide is sponsored by British Coal, who make a special offer to readers.

With regard to the Greater London area in total 317 pubs and off-licences are listed, including 3 "try alsos". 89 pubs featured in the 1991 edition have not re-appeared, and there are 80 entries which did not appear in that Guide. It is only fair to note that the exclusion from any particular guide is not necessarily an adverse comment on the pub concerned or its management, which might have changed since the last listing; many branches automatically "drop" a pub for a year after a change to allow the incomer an opportunity to prove worthy for inclusion. I have personally several times been approached by landlords with the question "How can I get my pub into the Good Beer Guide?" the reply to which is "Serve good real beer between now and the next survey".

The Good Beer Guide nineteenth edition, 1992, ISBN 1-85249-004-7 published by the Campaign for Real Ale Ltd and printed by the Cambridge University Press, is available in bookshops or CAMRA HQ at a cover price of £7.99. CAMRA members may obtain copies for £5.00 inc. postage & packing from Headquarters on quoting membership number, or from local Branches.

NEWS FROM WETHERSPOON

Wetherspoon's has added to its estate with new free houses across London.

It has opened the Half Moon in Winchmore Hill, north London on the site of a former supermarket, the Beaten Docket in Cricklewood, north west London in a former motorcycle shop and the Moon Under Water in Twickenham on the site of a nightclub (Twickenham opened on November 14).

It has also bought the New Fairlop Oak in Barkingside from Whitbread and it is opening on December 5 following a £275,000 refurbishment project.

The company's first outlet in the City, the Hamilton Hall free house, opens on the site of the former ballroom of the Great Eastern Hotel in Liverpool Street. (Note - This will open in December, but no date has yet been fixed).

CROYDON & SUTTON NEWS

THE PLOUGH, Croydon Road, Beddington (Young's) is to lose its public bar and outside gents' toilet to make way for a restaurant.

THE ROSE & CROWN, Butter Hill, Carshalton (Friary Meux) has also lost its public bar but this bustling, now one-bar pub has still retained its dartboard. It is currently selling Friary Meux Best bitter at £1.38 a pint; Tetley Bitter at £1.42 and Ind Coope Burton Ale at £1.56.

Another Friary Meux pub, the FOX & HOUNDS, 41 High Street, Carshalton is selling Benskins Bitter at £1.44 a pint; Tetley at £1.46 and Burton Ale at £1.58 - no Friary Meux though (not an unusual situation among Allied pubs).

The RACE HORSE, 17 West Street, Carshalton (Courage), when visited on 11th October was selling Eldridge Pope Royal Oak at £1.66 a pint. Meanwhile another Courage pub in Carshalton, the LORD PALMERSTON at 31 Mill Lane is selling Wadworth's 6X.

And finally, KEMBER'S WINEBAR which is to be found at 282 High Street, Croydon is selling Harvey's Bitter.


PRESUMPTUOUS PRICING

On my return I decided to pop into the Phoenix and Firkin at Denmark Hill BR station - for, amazingly, the first time. I'm not fond of the house beers, but as the guest was Everards Beacon I went for a half of that. The blackboard said "£1.65" so I was put out greatly to be asked for 85p for the half.

£1.65 is excessive anyway, and to be asked for a sum rounded up to the nearest 5p was too much. The barmaid said, "It's what the till says". I said, in a withering blast of apoplexy, "Sod the till! Half of £1.65 is 82½p, or 83p rounded up to the nearest penny." The barman wandered past and said, "OK, let him have it for 83p".

Satisfaction was thus gained, but the experience was most unsettling and the Beacon was less enjoyable because of it. How widely spread is this practice of excessive rounding?

SHEPHERD NEAME CHAIRMAN CONDEMNS MMC 'MISCARRIAGE OF JUSTICE' AND WARNS OF PUB CLOSURES

Independent brewery chairman Robert Neame has told his licensees that the MMC investigation into the brewing industry was "the biggest miscarriage of justice ever carried out by the Commission", and would lead to the closure of many British pubs.

Addressing more than 140 Shepherd Neame licensees and their wives at their annual dinner at the Alexander Centre, Faversham, Mr Neame said he believed that 15-20 per cent of the nation's pubs could be sold off for alternative uses in the next decade.

He said that this would "effect the heart of small communities which have already lost their church, school and village shop. A real disbenefit to the social structure of community and rural life in this country."

To the applause of brewery tenants, he said: "I believe that history will relate that the findings of the Monopolies and Mergers Commission in respect of the brewing industry were the biggest miscarriage of justice ever carried out by the Commission.

"It should have brought into serious question whether their only task should be to examine the effect of take-over proposals whereby a monopoly might be established, rather than carry out a full investigation of an industry,

whether it be brewing, petrochemical or minerals."

He challenged the viability of the new, longterm, full-repairing leases currently being offered to tenant licensees by some major brewers.

Shepherd Neame's tenancy agreement was, he said, "the fairest and most sensitive way to deal with this situation ...

"The traditional tenancy is an ideal model for individuals who wish to take the opportunity of entering into business on their own account from a low capital base at comparatively low risk".

The combination of post-MMC interference in the industry and the recession had led to a "demoralised atmosphere", he said.

"The price of beer has continued to rise to try and meet the substantial increase in overheads resulting in beer becoming price sensitive, and a real risk of depressing the pub-going habit in the medium to long term".

And he said that licensing laws needed further changes to improve opportunities for families, to enable the employment of 16 and 17-year-olds in pubs, and to enhance the flexibility of licensing hours, particularly at weekends.

BEER BRIEFING

LONDON BEER GUIDES UPDATE 67

The pub and real ale scene in London is constantly changing. The aim of this column is to keep "London Drinker" readers up to date with events as they happen and record confirmed changes to pubs and beers as they are reported.

A momentous two months with the effects of the takeover of the old established Finch's pub chain by Young's becoming clearer. No less than eleven former Finch's Free Houses (including one City wine house) are now Young's tied houses. One ex-Finch's Charrington tied pub is being bought from Bass and two additional Charrington pubs have been acquired direct from Bass. In exchange, three Finch's Charrington tied houses are due to revert to Bass. A further ex-Finch's pub remains leased from Bass and tied to the Charrington estate but with Young's as tenants! Four more ex-Finch's Courses Whatever the revert to Bass. A further ex-Finch's pub remains leased from bass and then to the Charrington estate but with Young's as tenants! Four more ex-Finch's Courage/Watney tied pubs remain tied to Grand Met for the time being — further information in due course. Finally, the six ex-Finch's "Bill Bentley" wine bars are to remain as a separate chain under Young's. Thanks to Michael Hardman of Young's for the above clarification. In addition to all this, Youngs have bought an old established free house in E1, Stepney.

Slightly eclipsed by these developments, Fuller's have acquired a pub from Grand Met (Watney) in Hammersmith and Highgate Mild has appeared in four more Charrington pubs, making a total of eleven confirmed outlets in Greater London. Two more Wetherspoon free houses have opened in north and north west London.

The numbers in brackets after each entry are intended to make it easy to update your London beer guides. They refer to page numbers in the East London & City Beer Guide, 2nd edition (E prefix); the North London Beer Guide, 2nd edition (N prefix); the South East London Pub Guide, 3rd edition (SE prefix), Real Beer in South West London (SW prefix); Real Beer in West London (W prefix); the Essex Beer Guide, 8th edition (X prefix) or previous updates (U prefix). CRUSADE TO SAVE THE LOCAL PUBLICAN

One of the biggest assets in the brewing industry - its people - is being wasted. Loyal, dedicated and hard-working tenants are being thrown on the streets, with untold damage to the character of the pubs they used to run. That's the harsh message delivered by Good Beer Guide Editor Jeff Evans at the launch of the 1992 Guide.

Many brewers are taking the cream of their tenanted pubs into management. The breweries make higher profits in the short term, but the tenants are left with nothing for years of hard work.

"Not all managed pubs are bad, but the brewery has more control over them, and the publican has less incentive to do well" said Evans.

Pub owners are switching to long leases, imposing impossible rents onto tenants, and making them responsible for expensive repairs. In some cases rents will treble, implying price increases of twenty pence a pint or more.

Licensees will be caught between drinkers reluctant to pay higher prices, and vastly higher payments to brewers. "Not surprisingly, thousands of tenants are leaving their pubs, rather than signing agreements they believe will bankrupt them" said Evans.

"The magic ingredient of a good pub is atmosphere, and the hard work of a motivated tenant is vital in achieving this. for decades it has been tenanted pubs which have got into the Good Beer Guide, ahead of the breweries' managed houses."

"In a couple of years, pub bankruptcies, soaring prices, and collapsing trade will convince the brewers that they were wrong. But by then thousands of pubs of real character will never be the same again. It will also be too late for the tenants, who will have left the trade."

"We need nothing less than a national crusade to save the publican."

SURVEY FINDS DIRTY GLASSES IN 30% OF PUBS

The popular fear that public house glasses are riddled with bugs and bacteria is well-founded, according to the results of the first in-depth health survey into pint pots published recently.

It concluded that more than 30% of pub landlords serve pints of beer and lager in dirty glasses, exposing the customer to sickness, diarhoea, acute gastro-enteritis and even hepatitis A.

"Drunkenness," it added, "may be the least of the regular pub-goers' problems."

Inadequate glass disinfection between drinkers, filthy dishtowels, and contamination from a previous customer's lips or a barman's hands are the chief causes of disease transmission.

But while most drinkers blame the last pint, or the end of the barrel, for any sickness, few make the connection with non-disinfected glasses.

Although beer drinkers are accustomed to being given clean glasses each time they ask for a refill, the best advice may be to guard the original glass, cutting down the risk of "multiple exposure".

Taking a personal pint mug to the local pub is another option for drinkers who do not relish drinking from a glass used by up to 30 other drinkers in the same pub opening session.

While health officers do not expect drinkers to "fall like ninepins because of the contaminated glasses", Mr Ray Jones, the environmental health manager at Halton Borough Council, Cheshire, which compiled the report, said that the results explained why so many beer drinkers felt ill after an evening at the pub.

He called on landlords to review their hygiene procedures. The survey found that glass is a "good medium" when properly used, and that disposable containers would not prove popular. But it said unhygienic handling of otherwise clean glasses by bar staff untrained in basic hygiene practice can undo all the good work of a publican with a fastidious appraoch to clean glasses.

The report was compiled after tests on more than 500 glasses, selected randomly from 82 pubs and bars. Fewer than 70 per cent of the pubs examined passed hygiene tests when it came to the galsses.

The sampling involved bacteria tests on pint jug and straight glasses collected during lunchtime bar sessions and further tests on newly-washed glasses.

The report was compiled after tests on more than 500 glasses, selected randomly from 82 pubs and bars. Fewer than 70 per cent of the pubs examined passed hygiene tests when it came to the glasses.

Mr Jones said the survey had shown that the cabinet glass washing machines in use in many pubs were relatively effective at disinfecting glasses between each use, but the rotary brush from the machine, where one sink is used to wash and another to rinse, were equally ineffective.

issue to date, only exceeded once, exactly a year later - with 48 pages and 3 colours.

David Bruce and the Firkin pubs were frequently featured in London Drinker at that time. This particular issue carried two full-page 2 coloured adverts for the chain including a prize "passport" crawl - one of the few I ever failed to complete despite being an avid follower of such schemes. and then living, so to speak, on the doorstep! A report opposite the "Passport" read: "David Bruce is due to open his ninth London pub in February. Formerly the Red Lion in Balaam St, Plaistow E13, it is to be renamed the Phantom and Firkin, which brings a few puns to mind (Beer to get you by the Ghoulies?). Our inn-spectre was unable to discover the origin of the title - not the ghost of a chance! Purchase was delayed as the previous owners, Allied Breweries, had mislaid the deeds, but since their re-appearance the deal has gone through and work continues apace."

Merton's Winter Tale concerned a huge fall of ice from a cliff which obliterated a row of houses near Lewes two days after Christmas 1836 - the pub on the site is called the Snowdrop. Roger Warhurst was on the 29th update of Real Beer in London - it occupied two pages. The pub crawl was described by Eastender, and visited twelve hostelries along Whitechapel Road. A list of new London entries in the 1987 Good Beer Guide showed 123 out of the total of 308. For those in the latest issue, see p. 19. The East London & City Beer Guide had also recently been published and was reviewed this month.

The final piece of text read:

"VALETE ANNO VOBISQUE Explicit hoc totum Pro Christo da mihi potum."

Bearing my initials in the guise of layout designer, the 2nd and 3rd lines were a fragment of Mediaeval Latin verse from the hand of an unknown but thirsty monk, and the translation runs: "FAREWELL TO THE YEAR, AND TO YOU. Now that's all over, for the love of Christ give me a drink".

And on that topical note, may I wish everyone the compliments of the season.
