EDITORIAL

Welcome to London Drinker in 1992. It is not too late to start off with a New Year's Resolution; Don't mouth off when collecting your London Drinkers or you might end up with a guest editorial to write . . .

The subject that I had chosen to write on was the perennial one of short measures. By coincidence we had a pronouncement on this very subject from the Minister for Consumer Affairs whilst I was in the course of my writing but I am alas not reassured especially as I find myself at odds with Steven Cox, CAMRA's Campaign Manager.

The Minister's statement was that it will be made "illegal to serve a smaller measure of liquid topped up by foam". This matter has been blighted by a history of contradictory local rulings, especially over Guinness but mindful of the terms of the Consumer Protection Act I have always been puzzled as to how there can possibly be a dispute over a full measure. A pint is the specific measure that you purchase and it is the liquid that you drink so surely if you do not get a pint of liquid you have been cheated? The statement is welcome because it would appear to confirm this view but to my mind it is hardly progress.

No dates for the "change" have been announced as the Minister first must have "talks" but the rather complacent reaction of the Brewers' Society: "the head on a pint of beer is a matter of taste and if in any doubt the customer asks for a top-up. The incidence of complaints is minimal", does not suggest that progress will be swift.

I am sure that I do not need to tell any reader of this magazine that the answer to this problem is the lined measure glass as already championed by some brewers, notably Wolverhampton & Dudley. Our problem is how to arrange quick universal introduction. How about this? Every glass used to retail beer to the public has to be stamped as a

measure by HM Customs & Excise. So I do not think that the Minister needs to talk to the brewers; all he needs to do is to ask his Treasury colleagues to approve only the stamping of lined measure glasses from say 1 April 1992.


Retooling might be a short-term problem for the glass manufacturers but given a fair period of notice I am sure that they could cope. It is their business after all. I would not suggest an immediate phasing out of the existing brim-measure glass but usual breakages and constant requests from us consumers to supply a full measure as we are encouraged to do by gentlemen from the Brewers' Society should be effective enough.

As to my disagreement with Mr Cox, in reply to the Minister's statement he was quoted in the Daily Telegraph as saying that it is not something that he gets terribly worked up about and that it was not as simple as asking for a pound of sweets and getting two ounces short. I have to disagree with him.

The Chief Executive of the National Licensed Victuallers' Association said that "somebody has got to pay for a change-over if it means disposing of the current glasses and the cost is going to be borne by the customer" yet The Institute of Tradings Standards Administration has valued the shortfall in pints served at £225 MILLION per annum.

The simple truth is that beer drinkers have for years been regarded as less deserving of their legal rights than any other group of consumers. I feel that the Campaign must take a key role in this debate because by my reckoning the customers have more than paid for their rights already and no-one else but CAMRA is going to look after our interests. Quite the opposite, I suspect, to judge from the quotations above unless we are alert.

Dear Editors

In reply to your call for sightings of Gribble beers in Hall & Woodhouse pubs in South West London, I can confirm that Reg's Tipple has been available in the Newt & Ferret on and off for a few months now (at £1.62 on 20/11/91) and very nice it is too. The pub has a constantly changing range of usually six beers from Hall & Woodhouse, Charles Wells, Everards and excellent Wadworths. The Hall & Woodhouse beers are always available, including the "dangerously drinkable" Tanglefoot and recently, a Rugby World Cup special called Hard Tackle (4.5% abv). The managers, Paul and Julie, told me that they had tried Gribble Ale and Harvest Pale but only Reg's had sold well.

At the time of writing the pub has on offer two bottled lagers imported from Hofbrau in Munich - an Oktoberfest beer and a Hefeweiss (a wheat beer with yeast, hence cloudy).

The pub is well worth a visit if you are in the Kingston area - it is at the south east corner of the Fairfield - for good ale and atmosphere. Quiz nights are held on Wednesdays (prize - one gallon of beer) and there is a yard of ale challenge on the first Tuesday of every month. The Newt & Ferret also has a large selection of non-traditional pub games including Dingbats, Quotations, PSI etc. (Who stole the pigs?)

The pub is open all permitted hours and isn't too expensive compared with some in the Kingston area. It's about time it was back in the Good Beer Guide.

Dear Drinkers

My letter about Fullers new pubs, published in the November Drinker, referred to a previous letter which appears to have gone astray.

The new Fuller's list has 198 pubs on it and there are four pubs no longer listed. These are the Northcote in Southall; the Midland Tavern in Luton (which as far as I am aware never opened); the Wolseley Arms in Bedford and the Princess of Wales in Woking. The last two are among the forty four recently purchased. The other forty two are listed although the Volunteer in Theale, near Reading, is listed as

temporarily closed. One more new pub is

listed as opening in late 1991; this is the Swan in Gracechurch Street, EC3. In fact, when I passed this pub just before Christmas there was a sign outside which said that it will be opening in February 1992.

Two pubs previously not listed as having handpumps are now listed as having them: the Waterfront, E14 and the Master Spear Point in Ashford, Kent. Six pubs are listed as not having handpumps. Of these, the Wheatsheaf in Ealing and the Chineham Arms, Basingstoke, are in the current Good Beer Guide! Presumably this is a printing error in the list. Also so listed are the feathers in Ealing, the Swan in Bicester, Oxon (one of the 42) the Six Bells in Brentford and Latymers in Hammersmith. As I said in my November letter Latymers may be serving through electric pumps and I think it is the Red Lion in Brentford which does not have handpumps.

On another matter completely, I have received a letter from David Bruce introducing "Bertie Belcher's Hedgehog Club" which is a follow on from the Firkin Club. It mentions a new acquisition, a 200 year old thatched pub near the Kennet and Avon Canal in rural Berkshire which will not be anything like a Firkin or Hogshead pub; no further details are given.

Also included are details of the Bruce Charitable Trust which has already adapted a narrow boat, the Rebecca, to provide holidays on the Kennet and Avon for disabled, disadvantaged and elderly people. There are also plans for a second, purpose built, boat called the Hannah.

You are certainly correct about the two pubs in the Good Beer Guide being misprints in the Fullers list; also the Six Bells, Brentford has handpumps while the Red Lion does not ("because the music shakes the beer up!"). And to bring things up to date a bit more, the beer guide updates in the December London Drinker listed the Andover Arms in Hammersmith which has been acquired by Fuller's from Watney's and which is not on the list.

NEWS FROM WETHERSPOONS

Independent free house chain Wetherspoons has cut the price of its Younger's Scotch Bitter to 84p in all its 42 outlets.

The price cut came into effect on January 2 and will run until February 28.

The company hope to serve 500,000 pints of Younger's Scotch Bitter in their free houses by the close of the offer.

Retail director Keith Lunn said: "We have always offered our customers a pint of bitter for less than £1 in all of our free houses and I think they will welcome the price cut after the Christmas and New Year period.

"I believe it proves that pubs can offer customers good beer in decent surroundings without charging ridiculous prices.

"The beer is probably the cheapest pint around in London and the south east."

"IGOTELEPHANTS AT THE PIGS"

The Tenth Pig's Ear Beer Festival - at West Ham Town Hall, Stratford - seems to have been a success. Not only did it cover its costs (and, one hopes, generate funds for CAMRA's programme of campaigning) but it also gave great enjoyment to those who attended. If you were one of those unfortunates who were outside when the doors had to be closed, you have my sympathy!

This year's festival opened on Tuesday night - a day earlier than usual - and had a wide range of milds, bitters and strong ales on offer, not to mention cider and perry. Inevitably some people found that the beer they wanted to try wasn't on at that particular moment, but overall the policy of providing a wide and ever-changing range proved popular.

What was especially pleasing for the East London & City branch was the amount of active support from other London branches of the Campaign: long may this continue!

Finally, a vote of thanks to Graham Hillman for organising the festival, to Tony Ayton for selecting the beers and to all those CAMRA members who gave freely of their time to ensure that everything ran smoothly.



Thursday 31st October saw the Branch present the RAILWAY BELL, New Barnet (Wetherspoon) with its Branch pub of the Year Award. "A DICKY IN YOUR BOTTLE ..."

(East London & City News)

HAMILTON HALL, Wetherspoon's first City establishment, has opened in what used to be the ballroom of the Great Eastern Hotel at Liverpool Street Station. It takes its name from Lord Claud Hamilton, Chairman of the Great Eastern Railway whose headquarters were at Liverpool Street.

As might be expected, the former ballroom has an immensely high ceiling with much fancy plasterwork and gilding. So high is the ceiling that it has been possible to instal a mezzanine floor above the bar, making room for larger numbers of drinkers.

The range of beers is what you'd expect: Marston's pedigree, Greene King IPA & Abbott, Theakston's XB and Younger's Scotch Bitter have been noted, all at Wetherspoon's usual low (for London) prices. On opening night, Marston's Pedigree was 146p a pint, compared to 149p for Bitter & 159p for Special in the Young's pub (Dirty Dick's) just across the road, so Hamilton Hall is likely to do good business.

One small complaint: I had to ask for a top-up. This was done willingly and without question but I shouldn't have had to ask. Perhaps the bustle and excitement of opening night was to blame? That apart, I had no complaints.

Hamilton Hall is at the Bishopsgate entrance to Liverpool Street station, which is served by British Rail and the Central, Circle, Hammersmith & City and Metropolitan lines of the London Underground system.

WINTER BREWS ARE NOT SMALL BEER

Brewers reported booming sales last Christmas of "winter warmers" - potent, full bodied beers made to recipes sometimes hundreds of years old.

According to research conducted by CAMRA, 171 such beers were on sale last Christmas, 24 per cent more than the previous year, amid signs that the appeal of the winter warmer is spreading beyond the ranks of the real ale connoisseur.

"There has been a revival in demand for cask ales generally over the past few years, but now interest is spreading to the really specialist brews," said Ian Loe, Camra's research manager.

Winter ales, some of which have ferocioussounding names such as "Headbanger" or "Skullcrusher", are about 20 per cent stronger than normal keg beer or lager and are generally sold only between October and April. Most are produced by tiny brewers on a cottage industry basis.

Mr Neil Bain, brewer-in-charge of the Highgate Brewery in Walsall, West Midlands, said his phone was "constantly ringing" with publicans asking for Bass's Highgate Old Ale ("very dark with smoky, chocolate and subtle bitter flavours."

He said: "We had it off the market from 1985

to 1990 because demand was low, but drinkers seem to be returning to this kind of beer."

The Jolly Roger Brewing Group, based in Worcester, said it had pre-sold three brews of Winter Wobbler - one of the strongest of the ilk, with an alcoholic content of 11 per cent.

Every autumn each of the Jolly Roger group's 40 employees takes turn to stir the first of the season's "wobbler" brews - the basic recipe for which, as with most winter ales, is a closely guarded secret. Each year the specific gravity of the brew increases one degree.

"We don't deny ours is a strong one, but we have tried to be responsible in marketing it," said Ms Jane Griffiths, the group's managing director. Publicans were encouraged to sell it only in half-pints and pump clips carry the warning - Don't drink this and drive.

The Institution of Environmental Health Officers is unconcerned about the growing popularity of winter ales, whose lineage can be traced back to the malty, powerful brews fermented by the clergy in the Middle Ages.

Asked if the development was a threat to road safety at Christmas, a spokesman replied: "It's not something we're actively concerned about. Most of those who consume these beers know what they're dealing with".

Book Review: INN AND AROUND LONDON a History of Young's Pubs

In the first twenty years of CAMRA's existence plenty was published about beer, and comparatively little about where we drink it - that national institution and pillar of British society, the pub. So often, intent upon slaking the thirst, we fail to notice our environment, and I personally find it a bonus if someone has taken the trouble to write up a history of the pub for the interest of customers - be it the ubiquitous John Thirkell or a local historian. This comparative deficit is remedied, at least as far as Young's Brewery is concerned, by INN AND AROUND LONDON by Helen Osborn, published by Young's in November 1991. A glossy cover bearing a sepia photograph of the Prince of Wales, Tooting receiving a beer delivery by a horse drawn dray in Edwardian times contains 144 pages of good-quality A5 size paper, packed with information about each of Young's 172 tied houses, excellently illustrated with 270 photographs- some modern, some archive, providing some interesting comparisons, 5 details from paintings and 5 facsimilies of printed matter. This is NOT a beer guide; indeed nowhere in this work are the beers listed: I will mention these later.

This book is an historian's paradise, without detracting from the interest of the casual reader. I found the text clear and in a style which left me wanting more - to coin a phrase, I found my copy un-put-downable, except to replenish my glass, and leaving aside necessary interruptions I read it from cover to cover. The author, who has a literary background, is an employee of Young's and obviously an enthusiast; I envy her the task which she so efficiently undertook from various sources, not the least Young's comprehensive Archive, which I have had the privilege of consulting for articles about various of their pubs.

The introduction should not be skipped, whether your purpose is dipping-in or local reference. This is followed by a run-down of the history of brewing on the Ram site (of which records go back as far as 1675,

suggesting an older foundation) and of developments since Young's involvement there in 1831. The major bulk of the book gives a full account of each pub's history - the 22 Finch's pubs acquired in August 1991 are dealt with, in lesser detail, in a separate chapter. Pubs are dealt with in alphabetical order of district, each one described briefly and followed by the pub details. Details of address, telephone number, a brief description and where appropriate special facilities are mentioned, but this is basically an historical work and designed to interest the reader, however casual, in his/her environment. Don't be put off by the word history - it is ongoing, and already as you read these words it embraces the moment when you picked up this magazine. Each pub is represented by at least one photograph. Around the turn of the century, William Henry Davies penned the words:

"What is this life if, full of care,

We have no time to stand and stare?"

and "Inn and Around London" is certainly the ideal incentive to do just that.

As I have intimated, this is not a Beer Guide, but given the chance I would make it prescribed reading for the London drinker. If you only see a pub as the background to your beer-glass and supplier of its content, then no doubt you'll be just as satisfied with carry-outs. But most of us have at least a touch of interest in our immediate environment, and this book fills a gap which is all too frequently neglected in the licensed trade. It could only be covered in beer guides or Pub Crawl articles embracing the most limited of areas, or of aspects of the pub scene, such as Alma Books' specialised guides - which of necessity must be selective. This book is also selective, but only in the sense that it is confined to the houses of one company, each of which is excellent, characterful and different in its own way isn't that what pubs are all about?

CAMAL COMMENT

There seems to be a great deal of confusion among the public at large and, seemingly, among the brewing fraternity as to what lager is. There is a popular belief that it is an amber coloured beer, but this is not necessarily so. Lager can be any colour from pale straw to black, or even red.

If it can be the same colour as any other beer, what then distinguishes it from any other beer? Lager is simply a beer that has been fermented with a strain of the yeast culture, Saccharomyces Carlsbergensis. This is a bottom fermenting yeast as it is heavier than water and tends to sink to the bottom of the wort which is over 90% water. But how does this lead to a beer being called lager?

The answer lies in the fact that this yeast generates substances that the other kinds of yeast used for brewing beer do not. Some of these substances make the beer unpalatable and they must be removed of before the beer becomes drinkable. Given time, the yeast suspended in the beer will digest these unwanted substances and the traditional way is to store the beer in tanks for several weeks. This is

called lagering which is why the beer is called lager. Although the beer can be drunk at this stage and often is in parts of Germany, it improves if it is stored for a few more weeks at low temperature. If beer is stored for reasons other than this, it cannot properly be called lager. Two essential elements must be present for a beer to be called lager, 1, it must be bottom fermented and 2, it must be lagered. Hybrid yeasts are often used these days, but beers brewed with these cannot properly be called lager, nor for that matter can they properly be called ale which by definition must be top fermented. Beer cannot be called lager just because it is stored. It may be stored for a variety of reasons, but unless it is stored because it has been bottom fermented, it is not lager. What does it matter whether lager is authentic or not? Try this test. Buy a bottle of Pilsner Urquell from your local supermarket and compare it with any of the national brands of draught lager that you can get at any pub. You can be fairly certain that the national brand is not authentic. Which one you prefer is entirely up to you. I know which one I prefer.

THE WHITE HART LIVES AGAIN

Not very far from Twickenham Rugby Ground, The White Hart is the oldest pub in Whitton and is located in the original settlement of Whitton, in Kneller Road to be exact. It is undoubtedly the pub mentioned in the James II census of such establishments in 1685, but the building can be traced back to 1660, and a map of the Manor of Isleworth Syon, dated 1635, shows a building on the site. However, it was first given the name of The White Hart in 1727.

The White Hart has seen many changes and extensions over the centuries (some more successful than others) and has been called alternately The Old White Hart and The New White Hart. Sadly, following a fire in the loft some two and a half years ago and the subsequent water damage, this listed building was closed and forgotten. Under the ownership of Watneys planning applications were submitted for residential properties; happily these were turned down but The White Hart remained a neglected evesore.

When the Papworth family purchased the pub in 1991 to reopen it as a free house, local residents were initially concerned that it was to be knocked down but they were relieved to discover that it was indeed to stay as The White Hart. Many people passing the building during refurbishment expressed their happiness and sent good wishes for the reopening.

The pub has been sympathetically restored, saving 300 year old beams and artefacts wherever possible, or using them again, as in the restructuring of the new servery. During removal of the corrugated roof, three of the original thrown pantiles were found. The new owners would like to make The White Hart Inn into a true family pub and, being aware that at present families can only visit pubs during the summer, have intentions of erecting a family room at some time in the future. Food is a strong feature and can be eaten in the non-smoking area of the pub. The pub is currently selling four real ales; Greene King IPA; Smiles Best

seemingly the most popular among the real ale drinking public.

Ann and Toby Papworth have a selection of prints copied from old photographs and postcards of Whitton displayed on the pub walls and would welcome the opportunity to collect more. Also, while digging in the garden, they found a number of bottles, possibly late Victorian and shaped like slim milk bottles in tan coloured stone with the inscription "K&TVMWV" on the side. They would love to be enlightened as to their origin.

SOUTH WEST LONDON NEWS

Spencers, 262 Merton Road, SW18 has reopened and been renamed the Merton Inn. The pub has been comfortably refurbished, and the new licencees, Mr J & Mr S Appleby, are making every effort to change the pub's previously somewhat seedy reputation. The beers are Courage Best and Directors, which were in good condition on my visit, and the introduction of a guest beer is being considered - so go and suggest you think it a good idea!

This reopening now makes Merton Road an interesting crawl. Next door to the Merton Inn is the GBG listed Gardeners Arms (No. 268), a Young's tied house. Just round the corner, 44, Longfield Street, is the Builders Arms, Courage Best and Directors, Back towards Wandsworth you find the Park Tavern (212) which has just introduced Adnam's Bitter to its range of Wadworth 6X, Courage Best and Directors. A little further along, on the opposite side, is the Lord Palmerston (141), which although a Watney house, has Fuller's London Pride as its only real beer. If you go the other way (south) at 479, is the Pig & Whistle, another Young's house.


RETURN OF COBBOLD'S

WETHERSPOON'S AGAIN

Those of you who visit Wetherspoon pubs regularly will no doubt already know that they were selling Younger's Scotch Bitter knocked down from its usual 99p a pint to 88p. They believe this to have been the cheapest beer in London. Through Feb. on Mondays they are selling other beers at about 10p a pint below their normal, reasonable prices. Some are keg but some are real so you will have to keep your eyes open. No full details as we are not sure the deals are the same in all of their pubs.

Unannounced in their advertising before it happened a new pub was opened in Twickenham on 14th November in a converted wine bar and night club in London Road, just along from the Police Station and a couple of hundred yards from Twickenham BR station. Called (Well, it had to be, didn't it?) the Moon Under Water, it sells Younger's Scotch Bitter (at the normal 99p a pint) Greene King IPA, Theakston XB and Marston's Pedigree. Lack of cellar space precludes any guest beers, we are told.

COVER PRICE INCREASE

It is with regret that we have had to raise the cover price of the magazine to 30p with effect from this issue, but with ever increasing production costs and falling advertising revenues we must now take this action. CAMRA member 'Arry Hart is the new London's Brain Of Brewing - the capital's most knowledgeable person when it comes to beer and brewing.

Mr Hart, an analytical chemist from Wimbledon and a member of CAMRA's SW London branch, won the title in the annual competition run by brewers Taylor Walker, sponsored by Burton Ale in conjunction with *London Drinker*.

He wins a beery holiday for two in Belgium, including brewery visits and tutored tastings at the famous Bier Academie in Brugge. He will take his wife Sue along on the trip in June.

'Arry first won through heats to become South London champion, before taking on four other regional London champs for the title at Doggett's Coat & Badge pub at Blackfriar's Bridge. In the final he outscored all other finalists in each of the three sections: written test; blind beertasting; and two gruelling minutes in a "mastermind" chair facing rapid fire beery questions.

Says 'Arry, a regular at The Grove pub in Morden Road, Wimbledon: "My nerves were truly wrecked but it was great fun bringing the title South of the river for the first time. I think they owe me a Burton Ale or two down at the Grove now!".

Youngs, the Wandsworth independent brewers, have opened a new £300,000 laboratory to carry their real ales into the 21st Century.


Chairman John Young, who officially declared the new building open, said: "We have led the way for years in quality control, both in keeping expert eyes trained on the beer at every stage of the process and in ensuring that it is properly served in the pub.

"This new laboratory will enable us significantly to improve our reputation for top-notch beers at a time of increasing sales."

The upturn in Young's sales began last year, with a 5 per cent increase in output, and has continued with the takeover in August of Finch's, the London free house chain that owned 22 pubs and six wine bars.

The new laboratory building has been created out of the brewery's 19th-century engineering workshop, which has been extended in matching style, using second-hand bricks.

It also houses Young's free trade sales department, which used to be a quarter of a mile from the brewery in Buckhold Road. The old laboratory, which had become too small for the latest, sophisticated equipment used to analyse beer, has been converted into a wages office.



A PINT SHOULD BE A PINT

Pubs have been told that they will be fined if they "short-measure" customers by leaving a big head of foam on pints of beer.

Under new laws announced in the Commons by Mr Edward Leigh, Consumer Affairs Minister, the Government wants all pub glasses to be marked with a clear line immediately below the rim to indicate a full pint of liquid. Some pubs already use such glasses.

The laws would also apply to Guinness and other stouts, which many drinkers believe must be served with a head.

It is estimated by trading standards officers that the serving of short measures costs drinkers £225 million a year. But representatives of the brewers and the licensed trade predicted the regulations would push up the price of beer and cider as the trade would need to recoup the cost of replacing glasses.

The National Licensed Vctuallers' Association also said that the cost of a pint took account of the fact that a small part of the measure was made up of froth.

Mr Steven Cox, CAMRA's campaign manager, welcomed the intention to "clarify" the law, but he added: "It is not as simple as asking for a pound of sweets and getting two ounces short."

The Brewers' Society also said that the new law could cost drinkers more for their pint.

LONDON BEER GUIDES UPDATE 68

The pub and real ale scene in London is constantly changing. The aim of this column is to keep "London Drinker" readers up to date with events as they happen and record confirmed changes to pubs and beers as they are reported.

This month we welcome the latest Youngs acquisition, in SEI close to London Bridge Station. Three further Wetherspoon Free Houses have opened in the City, Barkingside and Twickenham. In East London and the City, the new guide (see below) has revealed 58 previously unrecorded outlets for real ale, but another 60 have ceased selling the real thing. In addition, the guide reveals a further 20 pubs as being closed and 12 more demolished or converted to other uses.

The numbers in brackets after each entry are intended to make it easy to update your London beer guides. They refer to page numbers in the East London & City Beer Guide, 2nd edition (E prefix); the North London Beer Guide, 2nd edition (N prefix); the South East London Pub Guide, 3rd edition (SE prefix), Real Beer in South West London (SW prefix); Real Beer in West London (W prefix); the Essex Beer Guide, 8th edition (X prefix) or previous updates (U prefix). Indicates guest beers introduced into Big Brewers pubs previous updates (U prefix). following recent legislation.

Additions, deletions and significant changes not already recorded in previous updates are included in the listings below to bring them into line with the new guide. All pubs are marked on the various maps - unfortunately these are not to scale - and are listed by postal district. There are brief notes on each area followed by the list of pubs for the area concerned. The text is broken up with photographs - mostly of demolished pubs - and a few advertisements.

No guide can ever be fully up to date, but this one does well on that score: the recent acquisition by Young's of "Holland's" and the Finches chain being denoted by a postscript at the end of the relevant pub descriptions.



He finished second to last in his category in the ballot of CIPFA's 10,000 plus members.

Given Whitbread's policies of brewing closures it is somewhat ironic that Whitbread should endow a chair in business studies, particularly in Luton where they have closed both the Phoenix Brewery (J W Green/Flower's) and the Megakeggory that replaced it. Whatever next, the King Herod Professor of Childcare?
