EDITORIAL

A few weeks ago at one of our branch socials I was questioned by a member of my local branch over editorial policy on bylines - the name of the author of an article placed at the start or end of a piece. He had read the article "Profiteers or Victims?" in the July edition of the Drinker and while he agreed that it made a lot of very valid points he felt that it did not carry as much weight as it would have done if the author had been named instead of remaining anonymous.

In this particular instance, not knowing personally who had written the piece, I could not state categorically whether or not the author's name had been left off as an oversight. It is, however, my personal view that unless there are specific reasons for not doing so we should acknowledge the source of all material. We generally do not pay for articles and so the person passing on the benefit of his knowledge, experience, wit etc. should at least receive acknowledgement for his efforts.

We come now, however, to a problem and the particular article to which my friend was referring is a very good case in point; that is protection of the individual's anonymity. If we are going to have anything worthwhile to say as representatives of a consumers' organisation we are bound to say things from time to time that the producers in the industry would prefer us not to say and we are bound to express opinions that they will (publicly at least) disagree with most vehemently.

Now, many landlords of pubs are CAMRA members as well and agree with our views but they also find themselves in the invidious position of relying on those breweries for a living. Many of our articles of the type exemplified by "Profiteers or Victims?" carry much more weight when they are written from first hand experience. If, however, the author of such a piece were able to be

identified by his brewery it would put his position, and his livelihood, in jeopardy.

Although it was clear from the text of this particular article that the author does not currently run a pub, we must allow for the possibility that he may wish (or need) to take a pub again at some time in the future. Consequently, I am afraid that although the simple device of adding a name at the end of an article would give it an air of greater authority, there are times when you must trust to our integrity and not demand something that could be most dangerous to a supporter's living

The alternative would be that the articles would not get written and the brewers would be given a freer hand to maximise their profitability at the expense of us, the drinking public.

On another matter completely, the deadline for large breweries to divest themselves of some of their tied houses is beginning to loom large - it is actually 2nd November and signs of changes are now beginning to appear in my own area. Two pubs in one area have already changed from being tied to Grand Metropolitan (one ex Courage, one Watney) to Morland of Abingdon who recently successfully fought off a hostile takeover bid from Greene King. Meanwhile the tenant of another Watney pub in the area has told us that (to suit his own timetable) it will become a free house on 7th November and within six months he plans to have his own brewery operating on the premises. We shall have more details on these pubs in the next edition.

Finally, I should like to express my personal gratitude to all those of you who attended our beer festival in Feltham at the beginning of September, especially those who gave up valuable spare time to work. Thanks to all of you.

Changing now to the various forms of silly alphabet, I have had further correspondence from Derek Edwards of High Wycombe whose earlier letter was published in August. He writes:

"I had a go at your Silent Alphabet [Actually it was Michael Stevens' - AP] and, having spent two days' intensive effort, both with and without a pint pot at my side, I have decided to send you what I have come up with, even though I am not really happy with some of it. I want to go back to following the sense of what I read, instead or just looking at the letters.

"First, the set of rules I was working to, so I can hide behind them when you publish your alphabet and it turns out better than mine:

- 1. (Compulsory) The letter must not contribute in any way to the pronunciation anywhere in the word.
- 2. The correct pronunciation should be the obvious one when the letter is taken out (perhaps with one or two other letters too).
- 3. Words preferred such that removing the letter makes another word (or, failing that, sounds like one).
- 4. The shorter the better.
- 5. The commoner the better.
- 6 Desperation overrides rules 1-5.

"Now here's the alphabet:

A: Bread; B: Lamb (you were too modest about lamb; lam is a valid American word); C: Scent; D: Adjust; E:Heart (are is shorter but not so good on rule 3); F: Twelfth (pronounced twelth [Actually, I tend to sound the F myself - API) or Trottiscliffe (in Kent, pronounced Trosley) - see rule 6; G: High; H: Hour (better than your Whine on rules 4 & 5); I: Friend; J: Mijnheer (Dutch word; what English people used to call a Dutchman - see rule 6); K: Knot; L: Would; M: Mnemonic; N: Damn; O: Young; P: Bathing (all right, then: Psalm); Q: Raquet; R: Colour (as opposed to Color and all the words where Americans pronounce the R's); S: Isle: T: Castle: U: Four; V: Gonville & Caius College (pronounced Keys - see rule

6); W. Whole; X: Sioux [you could use this for I as well - AP]; Y: Prayer; Z: Rendezvous.

"I hope you had better luck with F, J and V. In the above, all letters except J obey my rule 1; all except F, J, V and R also obey rule 2 and most of them obey 3-5 as well.

"In the comments on the spelling/ pronunciation of your name, you must be referring to George Bernard Shaw's illustration of why we need phonetic spelling: GHOTI (pronounced "fish" from "enouGH", wOmen" and naTlions"). A very quick go at your name gives Eatherstonddigh Ppearcain (from Featherstonhaugh - pronounced Fanshawe, Fiddle, Denbigh, Apple, Heard, City and Curtain).

Or, if we don't want you to answer your name, we could take the letters from Dead, Damned, Grudging, Prayer, Psychotic, Friendly, Favoured, Island, People, Damn.

Note that the GBS one does, and the second tries to, make a meaningful message (eg. "enough women and nations!") - whether you agree with it is irrelevant. Another thing to try for when spelling words to people.



Having read Peter Campbell's letter in September's London Drinker, I felt compelled to comment on some observations he made on the SE1 area and in particular the Wheatsheaf. Exactly what is a "Victorian appearance"? A glance at "Victorian Public Houses" by Brian Spiller (Publishers: David & Charles, 1972) illustrates that there are many varieties of pub from this period ranging from basic and unpretentious locals like the Wheatsheaf to highly ornate and palatial establishments which can be found in many parts of London, especially the centre.

The main point I take issue with however, are in the comments, or rather lack of them, regarding the beers served. This pub deserves much more than simply the mention that it serves Imperial Russian Stout. The quality of the beers served, both Courage Best and guest ales is always excellent and a mild is permanently on offer, a rarity in London. In addition the landlord has links

with CAMRA and provides real choice in the guest beers served, recent examples include Exmoor Ale, Hop Back GFB, Cotleigh Harrier, Woodfordes Mild and the GBBF champion; Norfolk Nog. (A much more imaginitive selection than many other pubs in the area, some of whom serve beer in a condition that, putting it generously, leaves much to be desired). These are sold at prices which are very reasonable for Central London and the pub often gets crowded which speaks for itself.

This pub is one of the few in the City and London Bridge area not to have been "renovated" and its original character totally changed. It still retains two distinct bars and is one of the fast-disappearing breed of pubs not subjected to the whims of brewery marketing executives and design consultants. Finally, the Borough Market area is threatened with partial demolition as a result of railway expansion plans; I would not want real ale drinkers to be put off visiting an excellent pub with a limited lifespan by a description which does not really do justice to it.

BODDINGTON'S CAN MISLEAD!

We have received correspondence from Stephen Fothergill about the ridiculous Boddington adverts that have been appearing in the National papers, which imply that Whitbread's beer is 'draught'. The advert is clearly designed to mislead. The 'creamy milk' theme, illustra-ted with milk churns and ice cream cones and is meant emphasise to Boddingtons is the 'cream of Manchester'. The dis-honest part of the advertising is that the stuff in the can is the same as that which you can now get in a pub. The wording is as follows:

"Courtesy of the ingenious draught flow system you can now enjoy the smooth flavour and creamy head of handpulled Boddingtons from a can."

This is untrue. Beer in cans is filtered and pasteurised. Handpumped beer isn't (or shouldn't be). There is no way that anything that comes from a can could begin to resemble true cask conditioned beer.

BREWERS CLOSE THE DIVIDE - THEN RULE

Des Tuddenham looks at the effect on London of the "heady brews" from Ooop North

The last ten years has seen a quiet invasion on London - Northern ales, complete with their noted tight, creamy heads. This invasion ought to be resisted.

Being a near-wrinkly, I can remember Courage ales brewed here in the capital - now we have John Smiths. We also used to have real Charringtons and Taylor Walker from the East End together with other brews developed for the London palate. Now we have Stones and Tetley Bitter.

Taste is such a subjective thing - but I'll stick my southern neck out and tell you that these Northern brews are bland and lacking in character. They are also noticably short on the hop.

They are fine in their place (their locality) and often kept in much better condition than they are to be found in the capital. But London's taste and resulting styles of ale were developed not on the soft and creamy, but rather in accordance with our sharper and harder water.

Of course there is one great benefit to brewers of flogging us northern beers in true style. This is the head - which conveniently prevents customers from receiving a full 20 fluid ounces of beer.

Assume you get 19 fl oz of a Yorkshire bitter in a "pint" costing £1.60 - just one ounce

short. And this is the case in 500 London pubs belonging to one brewery, with each pub selling two barrels a week. The total "cream" to the brewery is a grand £1,198,080 per year.

Work it out for yourself - over £1mn buckshea. But let's for a moment live in the real world - the chances are with a northern beer that you'll get *less* than 19 fl oz of beer!

The invasion has other repercussions. it has virtually knocked London-brewed beer off the drinking map. Thank god for Youngs and Fullers.

Even London trading names have been relegated to the brewing Vauxhall Conference. When did anyone last see Taylor Walker Bitter (brewed in Burton incidentally) actually be added to a beer range?

Meanwhile, our creamy-headed Northern rivals continue to attract all the marketing spend and TV slots.

However, as with any conflict, some good does accrue. To keep a northern brew in tip top fettle and get that much sought-after head, requires a lot of care. Glasses and beer lines must be completely clean and that is always a good thing.

Nevertheless, the Northern Git proping up the bar has to push further, telling us our ale

is "lifeless and flat as bloody dish water". They are generally too biased to take stock that a good, flat *looking* London pint is in fact usually much fuller in condition.

Forcing ale through tight sparklers (agitating devices that help produce a head) knocks the condition out of a beer, leaving it light and ultra soft in texture. And they call us softies!

FULLERS BREWERY AGM - New Developments

In a revealing turn of events at the Brewery AGM at the Chiswick Brewery on 21 August, Anthony Fuller confirmed that Fullers are to start producing a Cask conditioned mild next March.

The Mild, which will be a cask version of the present keg mild, will be test marketed on a limited basis to judge support and to discern the appropriate level of gravity the beer will be sold at. This is likely to be higher than the current keg.

It was also confirmed that the brewers are to make Mr Harry, the winter brew, available for some four months between Nov. and Feb. next year. It is to be made more widely available in both the tied and free trade.

Additionally, in what must be an amazing departure, the group's Golden Pride barley wine is to be made available at Xmas in minipins for pubs to order but in a limited batch availability. The beer will be sold in half pints only.

Finally the brewers do not rule out a porter but will watch the market.

On pub sales they confirmed that they are no longer currently interested in package deals but are looking at one off higher barrelage pubs. They are also keen to extend their area to the outer M25 but particularly the Reading/Newbury areas.

FELTHAM BEER FESTIVAL

The first Feltham Festival of traditional beers and ciders organised by the Richmond & Hounslow Branch of CAMRA was held on Friday 4th and Saturday 5th September at Feltham Assembly Hall. Over thirty traditional beers were on offer including champions like Woodforde's Norfolk Nog (this year's Champion Beer of Britain); Timothy Taylor's Landlord and Bateman's Salem Porter.

Star of the show was, however, a special cask conditioned version of Fuller's Golden Pride which was brewed specially for the event by Fuller's Head Brewer, Reg Drury. We believe that this is the first time ever that this magnificent beer has been available to the public in cask form - a treat previously reserved for Directors of the brewery. It was a treat to be savoured in smaller measures though, as at around 9% alcohol by volume it demanded treating with care. Also, at this gravity the price was quite high though remarkable value for its strength.

In addition to the traditional cask beers, the

three beers from the Anchor Brewery of San Francisco and a good range of Belgian beers all in bottles were enjoyed by the 800 people who attended the festival. Traditional ciders and perries were available for the lovers of the apple and pear and these included St. Mary's Dry Cider produced in Middlesex (believed to be another first for a beer festival).

This was the first festival for the branch but it could well become an annual fixture given the response by the CAMRA members and non-members alike who came to sample the wide range of beers and ciders on tap.

We would like to express our sincere thanks to all those who attended the event and particularly those members from neighbouring branches who boosted the staff numbers and worked so hard to bring such variety and goodwill to the Feltham area well known locally as something of a beer desert in comparison with the rest of this part of London.

FROM OUR ARCHIVES

TEN YEARS AGO the October 1982 issue of London Drinker used light blue for the cover of its 24 pages, the front of which featured a photo of the Warrington Hotel, W9, with the caption "Made of Ale - See inside". This referred to a pub crawl of the Maida Vale area, and I won't tantalise you with the prices of the time, which were about a third of the present ones.

Martyn Lewis contributed a résumé of the history of Huggins' Brewery of Westminster, taken over by Watney etc. ... in 1929, of which a relic survives in the form of a painted sign on the side of the Horseshoe pub next to Bermondsey Square SE1, the Horseshoe being the symbol of that company. The sign came to light when the adjacent Star Music Hall was demolished in the mid 70's, revealing it in partially preserved form. In the same article was the history of the Lion Brewery which occupied the site of the Royal Festival Hall, and whose sign - a lion built in synthetic Coade Stone - now graces the southern approach to Westminster Bridge.

The eighth update of Real Beer in London revealed 29 new real ale outlets, and 40 deletions. Eleven of the new entries were reported as selling some beers by means of a DCL Air Pressure Pump (remember them?). It was stated that they were due for replacement soon.

Advance publicity was given of the first Pig's Ear beer festival, from the 14th to 16th October.

Howard Gladwin described his drinking experiences in Sweden, which sounded less than satisfying. Alan Greenwood, in his Beer Notes discussed beer-drinking vessels and all matters appertaining to them. A full-page advert announced the opening of the B & W Beer Company's Union Brewery at Hayes, Middlesex. Its emblem bore the words "In association with the Sun Freehouse & Moon Freehouse, and its beers were listed as Union Bitter, og 1034, and Union Extra Bitter, og 1050. I don't remember anything about the concern or the beers - it was listed in the 1983 Good Beer Guide, but not thereafter,

and nothing about it appears in Real Beer in West London, so obviously it went the way of so many other small concerns in the 80s.

FIVE YEARS AGO the October 1987 edition used green on 7 of its inside pages. The cover illustrated the Chelsea Ram, and a gremlin in the printing department directed readers to the area rife with such snobbery. The page indicated was actually Dipsy's feature, but we received no complaints! The cover frame of this 32 page edition was black with grey "headstone" and white title - one of our more successful colour experiments. Also on the cover was a flash reading "Whitbread close 2 breweries" and indicated the correct page. The report was a "Stop press" in the literal sense of the phrase - the news about the impending closure of Wethereds at Marlow and Chesters in Salford, Manchester, involving the loss of a total of 186 jobs, arrived too late to have the article typeset. In consequence it appeared "camera ready", that is typed out (on the same ancient machine I am using to prepare this item) and photographically reduced to fit the page. Whitbread blamed the closures on what they described as the public's preference for lager. That's the power of advertising for which, ultimately we the drinker pay willy-nilly.

It was reported that with the opening of the Flamingo & Firkin in September 1987, David Bruce had become the fifth largest operator of breweries in the country, with 9 of his premises producing their own beer. It was originally the Three Tuns of the Isleworth Brewery, both facts still proclaimed in ceramic on its exterior. Within eleven months it had been taken back by Grand Met after David sold the Firkin chain, and it now bears the title The Flamingo Brewery, operated by Clifton Inns. In this age of ridiculous and unnecessary renamings and in view of the fact that a uniform company image in titles was no longer needed, it is arguable that the original name would have been more appropriate.

The 7th Essex Beer Guide had just been issued, listing 1600 pubs. Its successor

WHERE TO FIND CIDER IN LONDON

The pubs listed below sell real cider. The ciders range from Taunton and Bulmers Traditional from the largest producers to Westons and Inch in the middle to farm ciders from small makers from all over the country.

If you visit either of the Chimes English Wine and Cider Houses look out for the Westons Perry.

Most of these dispense it using either handpumps or straight from the cask. If you don't see any then ask for the scrumpy, especially if you go into any of the J D Weatherspoons pubs. But beware there is one brand that uses a handpump when it is a keg cider this is Symonds Scrumpy Jack. There is also Showerings Addlestones which uses a gas assisted handpump, this is a fake handpump. If you see Addlestones dispensed from a cask this is real cider.

OLYMPIA 1992

The arrival of the accompanying set of photos from Dave Paterson prompted me into attempting a summary of the August Great British Beer Festival (GBBF).

Many hundreds of London Drinker readers attended the first festival at this prestigious venue which proved to be a vast improvement on the ill-fated Docklands Arena with its attendant 'Mickey-Mouse' transport system. This year customers were able to catch a normal tube right to the door and, rather than be kept waiting for fiteen minutes at the door, were usually admitted in no longer than five minutes.



The initial outlay was high for the customer this year, but the beer was cheaper and usually kept in better condition than in other years (opening evening excepted). CAMRA has invested heavily in a cooling system which cooled the outside of the cask rather than the beer itself. As this was an unknown system to the bar managers, teething

problems were inevitable, with cooling units cutting out with monotonous regularity. However, as the week went on, most beers I tested were of a good temperature given the very hot atmosphere of the Great Hall.



Much appreciated this year was the amount of seating provided in a carnival atmosphere (à la Battersea) and this section, complete



with food stands, cider bar and foreign beer bar was always crowded. Here the customer could also escape from the entertainment though the standard of acts was very high



this year. Particularly popular were the Sumaj Rumi, the Bolivian band, and the Chaminade String Quartet.




The crowds totalled 38,000 over the week and there was a large beer re-order. Hence customers on the Saturday were able to enjoy a large selection of beers, unlike other years.

The Firkin lorry does a lot more than just deliver Firkin's ales between its ten London pubs. It also transports quantities of malt, hops and yeast to its six in-house pub breweries. Special tanks allow it to carry beer in bulk. "And it also ferries our brewers between the pubs too", adds Simon Keep. "It must be the closest thing London has to a mobile brewery! Demand has never been as heavy as it is now for Firkin beers and so the days of our making do with a small transit are well past. We've invested £30,000 in this vehicle as part of a steady expansion of operations. Our only worry is that it is hailed down on the streets by home brewers wanting to borrow a cup of yeast!".

Re: Market Capitalism and Real Ale, [Sept]: I agree entirely with Chris Cobbold's editorial about the lack of choice in London pubs and the methods which the major brewers have found to frustrate choice despite the Monopolies Commission Report. As I am still working hard for the socialist revolution I might comment that this just proves that, even with State intervention, the free market will never work in the interests of ordinary people. But, as said revolution may be a year or two off yet, and as we will need to sink a pint or two in considering how to bring it about, something is needed in the interim. The post MMC Report problem is now recognised, now CAMRA must grasp the nettle and decide what to do about it. And what better place to start than in the heart of the beast: London?

I have remarked before about the Drinker using PR blurb as news items, but there you go again with Wetherspoons. Don't get me wrong. I appreciate that the Drinker is produced by voluntary effort and that even blurb contains nuggets of truth. Equally, despite Tim Martin's fervent belief in the free market. I have little but praise for Wetherspoons. However I think it behoves an independent organisation like CAMRA to pass some criticism. It is, of course, up to

Wetherspoons how fast they expand and whether they float themselves as a public company. However, and the comment is heard frequently amongst drinkers in the chain's pubs, one wonders if the rapid expansion will not lead to a takeover and the reversal of many of the things, such as the no music and guest ale policies, which we hold dear about Wetherspoons.

N16, to work out if I was about to buy another copy of the August issue or the latest September issue, it is quite possible to produce headlines which will last a month. I can understand why the men in suits, [ahem including Me] need to be charged more at the Hamilton Hall. We can, after all, afford it. But how come guest ale prices at the Elbow Room in Tottenham are consistently higher than elsewhere, [even the New Moon less than a mile away]. For the unfamiliar, the Elbow Room N17 is located in the area with the highest unemployment in the country, [Haringey/ Bruce Grove Ward: Adult Unemployment 35%]. Now tell me the free market works!

appeared last year, also listing about the same number. The South East London Beer Guide was reported as being sold out; the current one, which replaced it, was published in 1988. Real Beer in West London was in the final stages of surveying. In this issue an Update appeared for the East London & City Beer Guide, whose current edition appeared at the end of last year.

Eastender treated us to a crawl entitled "Barnsbury Bash", of that area between Caledonian Road and Holloway Road. Reflecting that contributor's profession, several references were on a rail-borne theme. Another crawl - of the Historical variety - was provided by Paul Thomas, of Battle, Sussex, where a certain contretempts took place in 1066, the end result being Normans, one - Saxons lost. Historical detail was provided by Merton in a rare joint effort, and judicious use was made of the second colour (which in this edition appeared in the centre spread) to show on a sketch map both modern features (including pubs) and the situation directly before the battle, which in fact took place seven miles from Hastings, by whose name history remembers it.

Aardvark described in an "Out of Town" article a visit to the Sair Inn at Linthwaite, West Yorkshire. At the time it had its own brewery with a 1½ barrel brew length, producing 7 beers ranging in o.g. from 1032 to 1080. Alas, no more, neither brewery nor pub

appears any longer in the Good Beer Guide.

Fullers were reported to have bought a hotel near to the planned point of surfacing of the Channel Tunnel in Ashford, Kent.
