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EDITORIAL OR A PERSONAL VIEW OF THE YEAR

As another year draws to a close it is perhaps time to take stock of what has been happening over the past twelve months, well ten actually — as I am writing this at the beginning of November, such is the deadline situation.

In the February editorial Tony Hedger started by wondering what would be the consequences of Scottish & Newcastle taking over of the ex Watney Chef & Brewer estate. The outcome of that seems to be that a lot of former Watney and Courage pubs are now selling things like Theakston's XB alongside Courage Best Bitter and John Smith's Bitter with nary a mention that it is more likely to be brewed at the Newcastle brewery than Masham.

The other effect has been the selling on of 123 of these pubs to two other chains and one to Whitbread. Ninety nine of them went to the Magic Pub Co. under the chairmanship of Michael Cannon who presided over the demise of Devenish which is now part of the Greenall estate. The other 24 were sold to the Canadian brewers, Labatts.

These two companies, along with a lot of other pub groups, both label their pubs as "Free Houses". It is a sad fact that this term is being greatly devalued, not to say dishonoured these days. Granted, many of the pubs are technically free from brewery tie but a lot are effectively tied by loans or by trading agreements between their parent companies and the brewers. No longer does the term "Free House" promise even a good chance of finding a beer outside the totally predictable range of such things as Wadworth 6X — a good beer but hardly a rarity nowadays. Moreover, is it right that Labatts should call their pubs free houses — they are actually brewers after all is said and done.

And there is another side effect of these takeovers, particularly the Magic Pub Co ones. I am referring to the absolutely ridiculous renamings of many of the pubs involved. Perfectly good relevant names are supplanted by unwelcome combinations of rats, parrots, carrots and newts (cross-eyed, pickled or otherwise). Let me state my opinion quite clearly that these stupid names have no place in an estate which would have

us believe that it is running good traditional pubs.

Enough for the moment of that, what else has been happening in the area. Well, we are seeing a lot of new pubs opening in premises that used to range from carpet shops and restaurants to cinemas. Many of these are of course part of the Wetherspoon chain but from the regular Beer Guide Updates column quite a number — mainly in north London it seems to me — are owned by Irish chains and of these very few, if any, sell real ale.

F***** and Firkins (No that's not rude—it's just your mind) continue to pop up all over the place; the difference now is that some of them are conversions of pubs within the Carlsberg-Tetley estate of which the Firkin chain is just a part.

Now for the high points of the year. The first of these was Fuller's reduction of the prices of Hock and Chiswick Bitter to £1.19 and £1.29 a pint respectively. Significantly, these prices are still being held (well, except that the production of Hock has been suspended while Mr. Harry is on the go). And by the time that this hits the streets we shall all know whether the Chancellor has decided to cut the excise duty on beer, as the papers are predicting, in an attempt to reduce the amount of personal beer imports from France—and particularly that which is illegally sold on at car boot sales and the like.


Finally, May saw the reopening of a pub in SW19 and it's a tied pub — no pretending it's a free house here. Of course the brewer isn't Courage or Whitbread but our very good friend John Gilbert aka the Hop Back Brewery. Of course you don't need me to tell you that it is the Sultan in Norman Road, South Wimbledon. Mind you, if you have been doing Rip van Winkle impressions you can always get back numbers from Stan which will give you all the low down. You will even learn that my old mate Ted Higgins was the first Joe Grundy in the Archers (That was probably the last time I listened to the programme).

Anyway, have an excellent Christmas and even better New Year from me and everybody else on the London Drinker team.

Rather than the normal venues most of the ale is sold from two bars set up in two large engine sheds, whilst most of the seating comprises various old trains and vans on the sidings between them.

Many of the staff, who were mainly members from various Essex CAMRA branches, camped out in the adjacent field which made it a very enjoyable, albeit hard working five days (excluding the setting up and down time) several members of the Museum were also on site and provided essential assistance on both sides of the bar.





They may offer verbal support to small companies in general but then they let them sink or whatever. It is a major bone of contention among small brewers that in the matter of duty, for example, the regulations very much favour the large breweries that can make huge investments in plant to minimise waste. If small breweries in this country were treated like those on the continent, the first ten barrels of every week's production would not be subject to duty.

On the second subject, I am afraid that you have rather missed the point of the article. It is rather that Radio I is losing audience because of a perception, right or wrong, that it contains too much talk and not enough pop music. I don't think that their problems would be solved by having another talk show by somebody they regard as an old bloke telling them that their favourite trendy drinks are rubbish and they ought to be drinking what their granddads drank. I'm afraid that this is the old story of us knowing we are right but 90% of the population thinking we are wrong.



At Easter '94, I noticed such a change in flavour or Morland Old Speckled Hen that I suspected the landlord of connecting the wrong barrel. However, a second tasting elsewhere proved similar; still a full-bodied pint but lacking in its distinctive, if unsubtle, flavour. Bottled OSH at my local (Leo) supermarket although gassy tasted the way I remembered it.

Now in place of bottles we have "New in-can Draught System" OSH in 480 ml.

cans, of which I innocently purchased a 4-pack. I can't post you a can but I quote the pouring instructions printed thereon: (capitals are theirs)

"POURING. Modern packaging techniques help ensure that the taste and presentation of "Old Speckled Hen" closely match that of our traditional draught ale. To enjoy it fully:

- CHILL AT LEAST 6 HOURS IN FRIDGE, OR OVERNIGHT (prevents beer suddenly overflowing upon opening).
- 2. HAVE GLASS READY.
- 3. OPEN AND WAIT FOR HEAD TO RISE TO THE BRIM OF THE CAN.
- POUR INTO GLASS IN ONE SMOOTH MOTION.

Now you can have Old Speckled Hen at its very best."

Six hours in the 'fridge' indeed! Just the way I like it — I don't think!

If this is morland's idea of how to serve beer, maybe Greene King should take them over!

I feel I must respond to Mr Durrance's churlish remarks about the Wheatsheaf in October's London Drinker.

While I would not wish to detract from John's many (indeed ample) talents, it was not unknown for the condition of beers to be less than satisfactory and for the selection to be occasionally eccentric. Since his departure, the guest ales range has remained interesting and their quality generally up to scratch. As an example, a 48 hour period last week saw beers from Ringwood Goachers, Arundel, Hopback and Robinsons — all very drinkable.

Any pub which experiences a change of management is likely to undergo a period of transition. On present showing, despite teething problems, the Wheatsheaf continues to show its mettle. I suggest Mr Durrance endeavours to develop his more charitable instincts.

HOP BACK LANDLORD HAS "POWERHOUSE" TEAM ON TAP

Wimbledon landlord Steve Wright of The Sultan pub at De Burgh Road is a lucky man—he has his own version of the Gladiators to help with heavy tasks.

The team, pub regulars Lennox Able and Vicky Fielding, came in handy last week when The Sultan took its first deliveries of a new Winter Ale from Hop Back Brewery called "Powerhouse".

Explains Steve: "We have a lot of very fit customers here, proving you don't have to sport a beer gut to appreciate quality real ales. Lennox is in fact a fitness trainer, who runs several of my customers through their paces at his circuit training classes."

Powerhouse (5% ABV) is a rich and dark winter ale, described by the brewery as "nicely bitter but with Hop Back's refreshing aftertaste". Among its first customers next week will be the London-based free houses chain J D Wetherspoons, who are having it as a guest beer in their pubs in the run up to Christmas. It will sell for around £1.40 a pint and is available through East West beer wholesalers of Tunbridge Wells.

Powerhouse was first brewed as a one-off for CAMRA's Battersea Beer Festival earlier this year, but now brewery MD John Gilbert suspects it might be a permanent addition to his range, saying: "After all, our Summer Lightning was first intended purely as a summer brew."



A PUB CRAWL OF READING?

- not such a daft idea these days!

There was a time, no so very long ago, when the thought of a pub crawl around Reading would make any respectable beer drinker cringe in his pint! Courage dominated the town and, apart from a few Morland and Brakspear's pubs, that was all you could drink. Wethereds beers had vanished and there were no true free houses.

Well, how things have changed, for not only has the beer range improved, but we actually have three new pubs opened in the town, so let's go for a pint!


Arriving by train, we will leave the new station bar until later and head down Forbury Road, past The Pink Elephant (Apex Plaza) and into the new Fuller's pub THE CORN STORES. This interesting bar has been a conversion of an old merchants premises and all the original fixtures and fittings have been retained wherever possible. Chiswick, Pride and ESB are on handpump and the beer is usually good. However, be warned, smart dress is required and the bottom car closes at 7 p.m. Tow doors down the road is THE RISING SUN which sells Brakspears, but has had its problems. The MTV can be overpowering. We head off through Forbury Gardens, past the lion (not a pub but a statue!) and under the arch to find THE FORBURY VAULTS. This open-plan bar is a Morland pub but does offer three guest ales (often Arkells/Wells and Bass). The pub caters mainly for office-workers and may close early in the evening and at weekends (after 3 p.m. on Saturday). Round the corner and over the canal and we reach the WARWICK ARMS. This is another Morland pub but trades as a Free House, with six beers on tap (Morland; Youngs plus four others — often Landlord; 6X plus a regularly changed range). Again, popular with office staff and may close on Saturday afternoons. Good value food, Sky sports and a mini-skittle alley. We now head back towards the town centre and make for THE HOBGOBLIN. This small pub, formerly The London Tavern is a haven/heaven for beer buffs and scoopers, as it serves weird and wonderful brews from all over the country usually from mini or micro breweries!

The seven handpumps offer two/three

Wychwood ales; usually one mild and a range of guest beers that can change daily. Real cider and perry are also available. Don't miss it; it's often packed and the little snugs at the back are very popular.

Turning into the Market Place, we pass the Coopers which is soon to become a Rat & Parrot bar (one of a chain of themed bars owned by the Jocks and Georgies Brewery!) The Coopers presently sells Courage. Passing Marks & Spencers, we reach THE MONKS RETREAT which was once an electrical store, but is now a Wetherspoons pub with the usual range of beers available, plus a weekly guest ale. Standard JDS decor and operation with the non-smoking bar at the rear.

Across the square is the old town hall and the THREE B's BAR. This is a council-run cafe style establishment with four real ales normally available; and although the beer is sometimes a bit warm, it is worth a visit to see what's on offer (often Bunces/Hop Back/Taylors). The bar has a display of old Readingalia — Beer: Biscuits and Bulbs — hence the name (3B's) — clever, ch! The bar closes in the afternoons.



Heading back towards the station we come the THE BLAGRAVE ARMS (Courage) which offers 3 beers; marble-topped table; woodblock floor and gas lighting. Just across the road, is CHRONICLES which is a wine bar and bistro but does sell Arkells 3B's.

Back at the station we pass the JOLLY PORTER (Courage) and head for THE THREE GUINEAS which is a new bar created from the old station booking hall—and a welcome addition it is too! The theme is naturally Great Western Railway and there

are even monitors in the bar to keep you up to date with departures and arrivals! The central bar has eight handpumps and beers included Bass; Brakspears; Adnams; Brains; Gales Theakstons and Great Western Bitter (which we are told is Hancocks Bitter from Cardiff). There are guest beers — at least one anyway! The pub is a gricer's paradise but be prepared for an invasion by the younger set on weekend evenings! You should now be ready for a quick train ride home, but if you do fancy a longer tour, you could try the

excellent WALLINGFORD ARMS (Morlands); ELDON ARMS (Wadworth); BUTLER (Fullers)' and hopefully the refurbishment HOP LEAF will be open. This is a Hop Back Brewery pub in Southampton Street and should have the full range!

I hope you'll agree, that Reading is a much improved Real Ale town than a few years ago and that with the possibility of a Yates Wine Lodge and a new Greene King pub, it will get even better in 1995.

E4: LARKSHALL are selling Theakston XB and Best on trial.

Forest Hotel is closed and appears to be Chef & Brewer run and not free house as stated in the East London & City Guide. EC1:

Harrow: Change of use applied for, to entertainment and conference hall. St John of Jerusalem: Signs that the demolishers balls soon to be active. New Wetherspoon pub allied for at the corner of Bunhill Road and Old Street. Work started mid October and past Post Office directories indicate a pub called the White Hart was previously on the site.

East India Arms: Reverted to Bass Charrington after 21 years on lease to Youngs.

I am indebted to Howard Dyer, Chairman and Chief Executive of Ascot Holdings for information on those pubs that the East London & City Beer Guide that were formally run by "Belhaven". It would appear that ten of the pubs listed as Belhaven run were either not, or are not now run by Ascot Holdings.

The following pubs are not owned by Ascot Holdings but were shown in the Guide as owned by "Belhaven":

E1: Rose & Punchbowl. E2: Black Horse (currently closed), King & Queen (currently closed due to fire damage), Queen Victoria (currently for sale). E3: Albion, Crown Hotel (currently closed and for lease). E8: Brewery Tap (currently closed). E9: Lord Nelson (currently closed), Royal Hotel. E14: Sir Charles Napier.

The following pubs were not shown as belonging to "Belhaven" but are now owned

by Ascot:

E1: Anchor & Hope. E2: Sportsman, Three Loggerheads. E3: Rising Sun (currently a cafe), Duke of Wellington. E8: Robin Hood. E14: Chimes, Lord Stanley, Manor Arms. EC1: Harlequin.

There would have been updates since the Guide to indicate the following pubs were not shown as "Belhaven" owned by subsequently were and are now confirmed as Ascot owned: E2: Chiltons (now Britannia), Dover Castle, Stick of Rock (currently closed). E5: Shamps. To confuse matters an update of the Whitethorn (E3 closed) may of indicated it was "Belhaven" owned but is not on the Ascot list.

My Dyer confirmed that their tenants are able to chose any real ales on their nominated supplier's list, providing the brand is owned by the nominated brewer.

ANCHOR CHRISTMAS ALE IS 20

1994 marks the 20th year that the brewers at San Francisco's Anchor Brewing Company have produced a special Christmas brew that they call "Our Special Ale" and again this year they have produced a traditional type ale for the season using special spices and flavourings.

After the official launch on 24th November, which is of course Thanksgiving Day, the beer will be available in specialist outfits including Selfridges, Harrods, Fullers off licences and The Beer Shop in N1. The standard 12 fl. oz. bottles will cost around £1.75 and a limited number of magnums will be available at around £8.00.

When it was first produced in 1975 "Our Special Ale" was originally similar to the Brewery's Liberty Ale — a golden straw coloured, hugely piney, hoppy beer. These days it resembles the famous medieval brew comprising a blend of natural spices and roasted malts to achieve a complex warm winter bouquet and taste.

Every year since its inception, Anchor has brewed its Christmas Ale in limited quantities for sale only between Thanksgiving and New Year and the recipe changes every year. The bottle label which also changes each year always has a tree (a different one each time) as part of its design — a traditional symbol for renewal.

The 1994 brew continues the tradition, this year's tree being a Christmas fir. The taste is a firmly kept secret until the beer goes on sale but once again promises to be a delicious combination of malt, herbs and spices. The recipe always remains a strict secret even afterwards and some additional enjoyment can be derived from trying to ascertain what spices have been used in the beer's production — not that you will ever know if you are correct.

Apart from single bottles, the Beer Shop is promoting a mixed case of a dozen Anchor bottles — three each of Steam Beer, Liberty Ale, Porter and the Christmas Ale. The case costs £27.99 from the Beer Shop at 8 Pitfield Street, N1 or you can telephone on 0171-739 3701 and they will send you a case anywhere in the British Isles for an additional £2.99 to cover postage and packing.

1995 GOOD BEER GUIDE CORRECTIONS

South-East London branch would like to correct some errors which have appeared in the 1995 edition of the Good Beer guide.

Firstly, the Crystal Palace Tavern in SE22 should not have appeared this year. The licensee has changed recently and we always allow a settling-in period of at least six months before considering any pub for inclusion.

The Hare & Billet in SE3 does NOT allow outside drinking on Blackheath, but does have a separate pub garden.

Finally the details of availability of meals has been transposed in two SE26 pubs. The Dulwich Wood House DOES sell lunches on Sundays, whilst the Bricklayers Arms sells meals every day EXCEPT Sundays.

South-West London branch would also like to correct two errors which crept into the Good Beer Guide.

Firstly, the County Arms in SW18 has got a Car Park and, more importantly, has very good home cooked food including Sunday Lunchtime.

Secondly, Streatham is in SW16, not as stated in the Guide.

It also sells guest beers from smaller breweries each week throughout the year.

Sandy Ward said: "Our 300 members research more than 300 pubs in both boroughs during the year, and they are looking for a high level of quality and consistency from the beers.

"The ambience of the pub is also very important and on both counts the Moon Under Water is a worthy winner."


MORE BEER THAN EVER!!

After a record breaking attendance of 45,000 at this year's Great British Beer Festival, plans are in hand to order even more beer for the 1995 event. A total of 226,816 pints of real ale, cider, perry and imported beer came into Olympia last August and although the Festival didn't run out, stocks were much depleted on the Saturday evening.

In 1995 the drinks order will exceed 230,000 pints and arrangements to ship in an extra 44,000 pints during the time the Festival is open are being sought. The Festival organisers are determined that the 1995 Festival will not run dry.

Among the changes planned for 1995 are a bigger range of ciders and perries and a trial carried out to cool the cider was so successful that it is intended to implement it across the whole of the week. The imported beer bar is due to expand and a reorganisation of the layout should enable people to see what is available more easily. But last and not least, the Festival is investigating having an unusual British beer bar with non traditional bees such as wheat beers, bees with honey and beers with lavender. 

PIZZA CHAIN FINED £1,000 OVER ALE CLAIM

Major restaurant chain Pizza Hut has been fined £1,000 after falsely claiming its Winter Warmer Pizza — advertised nationally early this year — contained real ale in its sauce topping.

The chain was prosecuted by the county council's trading standards department after a complaint from a freelance writer planning a story for CAMRA.

The trading watchdogs carried out checks on the topping to investigate claims on printed tablemats in Pizza Hut restaurants that the Winter Warmer Pizza contained "Cumberland sausage and onion in a real ale sauce".

Checks revealed that while the sauce did contain beer the type used was Whitbread Gold Label, which is not commonly accepted as "real ale".

St Albans Crown Court heard that to fit the specific and widely accepted definition of real ale — which is accepted by CAMRA, major brewers and other experts — the beer in question would have had to contain live yeast and the beer actually used was pasteurised.

While pleading guilty to the offence, the company said it had used the term real ale to distinguish the fact that the topping contained actual beer and not just a flavouring.

Prosecuting officer Clive Horton said it was accepted Pizza Hut had not intended to mislead, but without making checks to find the proper definition of real ale they were committing an offence.

FLOWER POWER AT CLUTTERBUCKS

Blooming well done to Clutterbucks, 803 High Road, Tottenham, N17. The Taylor Walker pub is the successful winner of the Haringey in Bloom competition. Flowers flourished and buds blossomed all around the pub helping to place it third in the London in Bloom competition of which 31 boroughs took part.

The competition which had a particularly high standard of entry was set up in Haringey

to encourage all businesses to brighten up the area. With a highly qualified panel of judges entrants were marked on the colour, sustainability and the planting of their flowers. An overall look of beauty, colour and perfection made Clutterbucks pick of the bunch! The pub was put through to the finals of the London in Bloom competition and with 31 boroughs entered, there was some very tough competition!

FROM OUR ARCHIVES

FIFTEEN YEARS AGO the first "double" issue of London Drinker appeared, serving for December 1979 and January 1980. The cover of this 24 page issue was tangerine in colour and depicted the Bishop Out Of Residence in Kingston, newly opened, for which an article in the content stated that the local council had refused permission for the main sign, the reason being that due to its length it would be "too prominent". An appeal had been lodged with the Department of the Environment and, as a recent visit confirmed, it is certainly prominent, but not untasteful. The rear cover invited sympathetic landlords to start stocking the magazine, and a listing of all outlets was planned. This was the first edition printed in the London area, by Daru Graphic of Harmondsworth.

Ian Mihill outlined the history of Grand Metropolitan, from the beginning of Truman's in 1666, covering the various take-overs, Watney's change of heart about cask-conditioned beer, with Fined Bitter — later called Stage — and London Bitter, plus Truman Tap. Also discussed was the controversy over the County Hand Pump, which rather than drawing beer forced it out of the cask by air pressure. This was the fourth in a series about the Big Six.


Whitbread head launched nationally in "draught" — i.e. keg — and bottled form Royal Kaltenberg Diat Pils.

Fuller's were about to withdraw traditional "Hock" — draught mild — and market it in keg form. The reason given, justifiably, was lack of demand for the real thing. Meanwhile Fuller's had in the two previous years almost doubled — to 54 — the amount of their houses with hand pumps, of a total then of 116.

At the Goose & Firkin, David Bruce was producing a new winter brew, "Earth stopper", e.g. 1075. Canada Dry (UK) Limited had launched Barbican, claimed to be the first alcohol-free lager in Britain. On my only sit it tasted of nothing so much as orange squash.

In the second of three articles about bottled beers, Doug Bateman discussed such continental delights as Chimay inter alia from Belgium, and others from Germany.

Ind Coope had regionalised and the old names of Taylor Walker an Friary Meux were to be revived. New, or revived beers were expected.



A list was provided of outlets, either definite, or understood to be real, of Ind Coope KK light Mild, for which they were doing no promotion.

Mostyn Lewis, in "An Extended Holiday — A Plea for extended pub hours" discussed the fact that the festive season brought about extended pub hours, whereas at other times hours were inflexible, and he contended that pubs should be allowed to open to suit local needs. As we now know, this is catered for by the 1988 Licensing Act, but are we any better off?

TEN YEARS AGO the December 1984/January 1985 bumper issue sported red as its second colour on five of its 36 pages including the front cover, on which the printers had shown the months but not the years! Luckily that is the only time it has happened, or your archivist would have a hard time. Its frame enclosed a cartoon by Eileen graves, showing a rather inebriated Santa on a pub roof on Christmas morning; beer spilt from his tankard was dripping into the mouth of a contented-looking Rudolph. In the sack was a perplexed-looking teddy bear which may have been startled by an erratic sleigh ride, or was possibly about the be adopted by a problem brat! (Now, whatever brought that idea to mind?) Also in the background was a rather hung-over owl. Eileen's cartoons are invariably full of details; on one occasion I was depicted twice in the same drawing, on my favourite tandem, in the (then) present-day form, and on the back as a very juvenile Merton, to tie-in with an Historicrawl. The images were based on photographs taken some 20 years apart.

The Editorial cited a case where some misbehaviour a year previously by a reveller who had already been drinking elsewhere had caused him to have to pay something over £500, about 200 times the cost of the beer he consumed in the pub concerned — £100 fine, £50 court costs, £350 damages, a court order excluding him from the premises, a night in the cells, and his job — in the police force. The informant was the landlord concerned, and our comment was "enough's enough; too much is plain stupid. Beer drinkers can do without such a reputation."

The Beehive in Peckham, A Shepherd Neame pub, had just re-opened after a £32,000 improvements programme. At the time the company had 18 London pubs.

Rail Rover contributed "Lourdes Drinker", a chronicle of his impressions of beer and the railways plus the shrine as part of a tour in France, taking in the location of the title.

In "The Great Autumn Rip-Off", Ian Worden outlined the recent price rises, leading to a mean average of 80p a pint in Greater and 90 p in Central London, while in the West Midlands 60p or less was more the norm.

The Battersea Brewery was about to market a Premium Mild, o.g. 1038-40, at around 74p. This was to be launched at the 8th Capital Beer Night in the Prince of Wales, Battersea — where the brewery was located — in mid January.

Young's had opened its 144th pub, the Coborn Arms in Bow.

"Dear Dipsy..." read a heavy-type heading above a side-view cartoon of that troubled columnist crying into his beer, followed by "...is on holiday. For an answer to all problems see page...". On the page cited, was reproduced in a decorative scroll frame the words of a drinking song, dated 1420 with two modern verses in mediaeval spelling and grammar, which the Editors' seasonal greeting challenged the readers to spot. It was entitled "Bring us in Good Ale!" How to be Firkin Successful" chronicled the history to date of

David Bruce's seven pubs, with more to come. It was signed "Firkin nuisance no. 1267".

CAMRA CAMERA portrayed photographically the Allison Arms, Glasgow — LD's most northerly outlet; the Volunteer, Ventnor, then selling Britain's cheapest beer, Burt's Mild; The New Inn, Hadlow Down in Sussex; and Campbell's Free House, Islington, our longest-standing advertiser.

JPaul Everitt and Terry Hewitt presented a Shopper's Guide to Croydon Pubs, and RM Rider — another bus traveller as the pseudonym suggests, produced "Liquid Lunch", described as "The first in a series exploring prospects for the Real Ale drinker in Central London."

The history of the Norwood Brewery was chronicled, from its first listing in 1855 as Richard Bennet & Co, later known successively as George Wadley & Son, Duberley & Brookers, A C Beaton & Co and Hoare & Co, who were taken over in 1933 by Charringtons. No signs of it still remain;

FIVE YEARS AGO the red frame of the December 1989/January 1990 enclosed another of Eileen's topical cartoons, featuring four revellers using an upside-down book of carols (presumably antipodeans who can't handle real ale) and a very startled cat. Red also appeared on seven of its 48 pages; this included the rear cover, the major part of which bore the wording of Edwardian music hall song, "Glorious Beer", with an additional verse especially written for the occasion. Naturally, it contained CAMRA sentiments.

This section is rather nostalgic from my point of view, as the edition under discussion was the last in which I participated as one of the production and editorial team, though obviously I still contribute from the distance. Shortly after its publication, domestic circumstances found me in Wales, where at the time of writing I remain. As, in the preceding months, I had spent a great deal of time in the Principality, the editorial (mine, for the last time except once as a guest), described the attempts in West Wales by certain ill-disposed parties to swing the referendum which had just taken place, against Sunday opening. My other major contribution was "A Winter's Tale", about a stagecoach accident due to intoxication, in 1835, culminating with a pub crawl entitled "Real Ale in Llandovery" - the

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area in which I am now domiciled, and serve as local i.e. only CAMRA rep.) and I can confirm the latter is now well out of date.

Merton presented an Historicrawl entitled "Within a City Wall" following the course of the Walls of the City of London, which I know (having been involved) took over two years to prepare.

The First Battersea Beerex was advertised for February. I guess that the sixth is advertised in this edition — see you there!

"Idle Moments" produced two mirror nonrhyming limericks, one of which included YAWOH, the reverse of the Geordie HOWAY. Andy, who had also included the brewery anagrams and numbers/initials problems, signed off "TTFN". Anyone remember the significance of that?

In "Not a Tramday", Colin Price explored the pubs adjacent to the Romford to Upminster line.

The Sekforde Arms, Clerkenwell had been bought by Young's and refurbished.

That concludes my current offering, except to offer the customary compliments of the season. Iechyd da!

EDITOR SPELLS OUT QUALITY THREAT

Real ale sales are rising at 9% a year and thousands more pubs and clubs are now stocking real ale. 'That's the good news,' claimed Good Beer Guide editor Jeff Evans. However, he warned that this growth was being jeopardised by worries about beer quality.

'As the Good Beer Guide shows, you are never far from a beautifully-kept pint of ale, and drinkers now have their best opportunity for years to sample interesting, well-brewed beers. But there is a real danger that drinkers new to real ale may be put off by a bad first experience in a pub where quality has been sacrificed to quick profit. We are not the campaign for tasteless or poorly kept beer and we wish to see standards raised.'

Evans cited pressures like high rents and ever-tighter financial targets which encourage licensees to pour waste beer or water back into the cask — although this is officially discouraged by brewers and is illegal under food hygiene and customs laws. 'Such adulteration ruins perfectly good beer and the reputation of the pub is easily tarnished', Evans said. 'The publican may gain a few pence a pint now but will undoubtedly lose out in the long term.'

He also pointed to the pubs which sell more beers than their turnover can justify. 'Whilst it is a pleasure to see a variety of beers on sale, that counts for nothing if the beers are not worth drinking,' he said. 'We'd rather see a pub serving two or three beers in good nick than six in mediocre or poor condition.'

And he singled out licensees who rush their beer onto sale, not giving if the time it requires to mature in the cellar. 'Just because a beer has settled and is clear, does not mean it is ready to serve,' said Evans. 'Those brewers who market their beers to pubs on how quickly they settle should know better. It is their reputation which is suffering.'

TEN WAYS TO IMPROVE YOUR PUB — OVERNIGHT!

Good Beer Guide editor Jeff Evans praised the work of thousands of licensees in raising pub standards. But, speaking at the launch of Good Beer Guide 1995, he criticised those pubs which failed to deliver what customers expected and deserved.

'Whilst many of our landlords do a fantastic job in upholding the traditions of hospitality and comfort associated with our pubs, others are letting the side down and failing to meet simple standards,' said Evans. 'They are losing business as a result, yet most of the problems are so easily resolved.'

Evans offered ten tips for improving pubs — and increasing trade — in some cases overnight:

- Remember dirty pubs and dirty loos put off more customers than anything else. And staff smoking whilst serving is both unhygienic and illegal.
- Make sure your price lists are clearly visible
- · Introduce over-sized, lined glasses to ensure

your customers always get a full measure.

- Display your opening hours outside not knowing when the pub will open is infuriating!
- Don't mislead the public: rip out fake handpumps for keg cider and beer, and don't sell 'house beers' without telling your customers what the beer actually is and where it is from.
- Confine noisy video games and jukeboxes to one area. Some people prefer a quieter atmosphere!
- Disabled access have you done everything feasible for your pub?
- No-smoking areas have you tried them?
- If you stock a guest beer, try one from a small independent brewery, and if you are allowed to stock a guest but haven't yet done so, make the effort. Your customers will appreciate the variety.
- Finally, if you don't stock real ale, now is the time to begin. Sales are rising 9% every year, so don't miss out!

SUCCESSFUL LAUNCH AT WANDSWORTH BREWERY

The culmination of 30 years' research by Keith Chivers — the foremost authority on the history of the Shire Horse — saw the successful launch of his most recent book *The Four Oaks* at the Ram Brewery in Wandsworth, London on 20th October.

The book, a portrayal of the Age of the Horse, looks back on a now almost-vanished way of life yet one with a great growing appeal. 'The Four Oaks' the family on whom the book is based, were the leaders through four generations of the Forshaw family, the foremost proprietors of heavy draught stallions in the country and pre-eminent in international Shire Horse breeding from the time of Waterloo until the end of the second world war. Most important, was the family's share in the movement for improving the working horse in towns. Largely thanks to them, by 1914, the English Shire was the most efficient draught horse in existence.

This cheerful and often humorous biography requires in the reader no knowledge of horses and will appeal to anyone interested in rural social history and curious about those who were engaged in an occupation which was once as important to urban transport as to farming.

The location for the launch — The Ram Brewery (Young's Brewery) in Wandsworth — as well as being well attended by both the media and members of the Forshaw family, was particularly appropriate as working Shires are still used, and guests were able to see them in their working surroundings.

Keith Chivers is the author of many other books and papers on the Shire Horse including *The Shire Horse, The Heavy Horse Manual* and *History with a Future.* He was honorary historian of the Shire Horse Society from 1963, and more recently – since 1990 – has been responsible for establishing a Shire Horse Archive.

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A REVIEW OF BELLE VUE -UP THE GUEUZE WITHOUT A KRIEK


CAMRA run British beer festivals are the only festivals in Europe I know of that sell foreign beer. There are however some members of the Campaign for Real Ale that believe we should campaign only for our own beers and not those from abroad. furthermore they would insist that these foreign beers should conform to Campaign for Real Ale British standards! They would deny us tasting some classic traditional foreign beer styles.

The ensure these ales are traditional to the country of origin the organisers of the foreign beer bar at the Great British Beer Festival sought the recommendations of their sister organisations in the Netherlands (PINT) and Belgium (OBP) in compiling a list of what they considered to be those beers that are brewed in traditional style. Those lists are available to any CAMRA beer festival organiser but it is noticeable that the odd non recommendations creep in as the foreign beer "expert" orders his own favourites. Banana juice and Ribena rule OK?

When I read the September London Drinker article 'A Potted History' I thought that if the products from Belle Vue were so good why had they not appeared in the Belgium 'list', they did after all include 80 kilos of fresh cherries where most brewers use syrup, so I sought the advice from an OBP member. Here are his observations.

The claims made about the authenticity of Bell Vue Lambic production — the fact is that the description holds true for less than 50% of the fermented worts. The other half, mainly produced at the plant in Zuin is 100% ordinary top-fermented beer, not the traditional "spontaneous" lambic; all of which is later blended together. The only exception being the new "Selection Lambic" which is entirely spontaneously fermented but represents only 1.5%-2.5% of gueuze production.

There are also some other items which ought to be corrected. Least important page 22 is the reference to the term medieval should read 19th century. There is no more true medieval Belgian ale, and neither would



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

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we like it, I'm afraid. Another point of correction is a micro-biological one. The two main "brettanomyces" strains involved are not as thought by the author, responsible for a sour taste, as they are on the contrary suspected to use organic acids as substrate, i.e. eliminating them. An important brettanomyces-influence would rather result in a bitterish lambic! The tart taste of old lambic or gueuze has to be attributed to strains of lactobacillus and pediococcus, probably. I consider this not as a major mistake, however, as an in-depth study of the determinating flavour-factors in lambic, has still yet to be made. In addition, page 24 compares lambic-blending to whiskyblending, which makes me unhappy too, as a blended whisky is inferior to an all-malt. On the other hand, it is impossible to manufacture gueuze without blending lambics! I would rather compare what Belle Vue does (mixing lambic with highfermentation beer) with the blending done at United Distilleries...



But the main problem with the article is not in what it says, but in what it says not! It carefully avoids to speak about what happens AFTER the blending process, and before the bottling, which means what you get served. All Belle Vue products, with the exception again of the new "Selection Lambic" are filtered, pasteurised and sweetened derivates of the "real" thing.

Your bottle of Belle Vue will taste sweetish, not tart. Thank God, the 1960-70's saccharine has been replaced by real sugar in the mid-eighties; but the use of sugar in bottled gueuze implies filtering. An unfiltered sugared gueuze, is more universally known as a Molotov-cocktail (or falling under the Geneva-convention nuclear, biological and chemical weapons). There is a real unsweetened version as mentioned earlier called "Selection Lambic", but it is virtually unfindable; worse, there exists no such thing as a "Selection Kriek", let alone a "real" Framboos... And THAT'S what's missing in this article.

Finally the article reiterates the irritating and eternally frustrating misconception (more alarmingly so within CAMRA) that the German Reinheitsgebot is some sort of consumers law. It isn't, and has never been one; it was a genuine taxation law and efficient taxation its only reason for its birth.

I hope the above will be of interest to your readers and despite my criticisms it is encouraging to see the increasing level of interest in Belgian beers within the pages of London Drinker.

My thanks to Joris Pattyn for the article and Roger Warhurst for the editing. My personal recommendation for kriek would come from Giradin and Hanssen, but try buying it over here.

HAVING YOUR CHRISTMAS CHEER AT HOME

Once you've gone to all that trouble getting in the very best food and other goodies for Christmas, why settle for second best when it comes to ale? It is very easy to have the best of real ale at home over Christmas — and on tap too.

The answer comes in the form of 34 or 36 pint containers called Polypins. These are plastic containers encased in sturdy cardboard boxes and come with their own pouring tap ready attached. They are as easy to operate as falling off a bar stool. And they are a great bargain too.

Polypins are available in London from pubs, off-licences and direct from the brewery. Remember though that you often have to order yours by telephone a few days in advance.

Polypins come with simple instructions as to how to set up the beer for home service. This boils down to placing on a firm surface, with the rear of the box supported a couple of inches so as to prevent sediment coming into your pint.

The plastic containers do not impart a taste to the beer, allowing you to enjoy excellent ale for up to a week. As the beer is drawn off, the inner container collapses, without taking in air that would make the beer go "off".

However, there are a couple of pitfalls. With most Polypins you must first wait a day or so for the beer to settle before getting stuck in. And Christmas being as boozy as it is, some clumsy person is more than likely to bang into your beer while heading for thirds of turkey — making you ale go cloudy for some time.

However, guaranteed protection against this is now at hand through the Sultan pub at Wimbledon. This Hop Back Brewery pub sells Polypins that have been "racked off" casks that are conditioning in the brewery cellar.

Manager Steve Wright explains the benefit: "What we offer is top-notch real ale as good as we serve in the pub, and it will last for about five days in just as good a condition. But being racked off in this way means that

as opposed to the everyday Polypin, ours can be set up to drink right away without waiting 24 to 36 hours for the beer to settle.

"And of course, an accidental bump into the Polypin will not turn your beer cloudy for a day."



Note these are traditional 36 pint pins.

Late last year Grand Metropolitan sold its entire 'Chef & Brewer' estate to Scottish & Newcastle. In London the estate largely consisted of managed pulsa inherited from Watney, Truman and Courage, whose badging is often still displayed outside. A number of these pulsa were subsequently sold in May to the new Magie puls Co. set up by Michael Canon, late of Devenish/Inn Leisure. He in turn immediately sold some on to the Canadian brewer Labatts with a few going to Whitbread.

Pubs now owned by Magie (99), Labatts (24) or Whithread (1) in Greater London are listed below cross-referenced to guides and updates. The pre-Chef & Brewer originating brewery is shown in brackets. "Magie' pubs are gradually being renamed with variations of 'Rat' and 'Newt' names, although in many cases the original names, or new subsidiary names, are also still displayed, albeit in smaller lettering, along with the words 'Free Houses'. Renamings so far discovered are listed below with the original or new subsidiary name in brackets where still displayed. Beers include Bass, Boddington Bitter and Webster Green Label at 99p a pint together with guests from provincial breweries. Labatts pubs are also being badged as 'Free Houses' and generally have beers from the Bass and Whitbread stables. The compilers would welcome information on renamings, current beer ranges etc in Magie and Labatts pubs.
