GUEST EDITORIAL

It may seem odd for London Dfinker to make common cause with Whitbread but we are in complete agreement with the brewing giant on the scandal of importing cheap beer from Europe.

The irrefutable figures produced by Whitbread show the British exchequer is losing £470 million a year as a result of the flood of imported cheap booze. What was a mess is now turning into a nightmare.

In the beginning thousands of Britons legitimately took advantage of the Open Market to visit Calais and other channel ports to snap up beer and wine at a third of the price in this country. Then small-time "entrepreneurs" — many of them bearing a close resemblance to bit actors in EastEnders — moved in, setting up discount warehouses in France and shipping large amounts of booze across the Channel.

The authorities have turned a blind eye to cheap booze being sold illegally at car boot sales. But now the situation has escalated. Bootlegging has become big business. The criminal underworld is moving in to control this easy supply of soft drugs, with terrifying consequences.

Equally disturbing is the threat to British pubs and off-licences, and the other industries that supply them. Supporters of high rates of duty in Britain, such as the kill-joys at Alcohol Concern, say that a reduction in British duty rates would not lead to a switch from cheap imports to British-made products.

The health freaks ignore the effects of decreasing sales in this country. People who prefer to visit Calais several times a month to fill their boots with booze stop going to pubs and off-licences. Pubs offer more than just sales of alcohol. They serve food, often provide entertainment and are the centres for sporting and social clubs.

If people stop using pubs then profits will slump, pubs will close and staff will be made redundant. Companies that supply pubs with food, dart boards, pool tables, and fruit machines will be hit by the backlash and may also be forced to close.

This is the grim reality of the refusal of the British government to bring duty rates into line with the rest of the European Union. Chancellor Kenneth Clarke made a small genuflection in his autumn Budget by freezing excise duties. But a freeze does not make him a jolly good fellow.


What is required is a substantial cut. We appreciate that it may not be possible to bring British rates down in one fell swoop to those in the rest of the EU. But Mr Clarke should announce his intention of a staged reduction of rates over a five-year period.

Unless he does so then Britain's membership of the Union becomes an object of ridicule, harmonisation a sick joke. And unless he, the President of the Board of Trade and the Home Secretary take action in concert then British pubs and off-licences will be driven from business, thousands of people will lose their jobs, sooner rather than later one or two breweries will close as a consequence, and the Mafia will start to control sales of illicit booze.

It is a matter of grave importance, demanding urgent action. We urge every London Drinker reader to use the European elections to ask pertinent questions of the candidates in an attempt to heighten awareness of what is becoming a crisis for the British pub trade and brewing industry. (Editorial from 'What's Brewing')

I notice that the government have been wheeling out the 'big guns' on radio and TV just recently to rubbish the Brewers' figures; but an independent City Analyst backed the industry and said the government will be throwing away more millions of the taxpayers money when the revenue taken from the pub trade falls. This, they say, has not been taken into account by ministers. So, support the British Pub, not only in Kent and London, but all over the country against this trade.




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LETTERS TO THE EDITORS

The new guvnor at the Cumberland Arms, Parsons Green SW6, tells patrons that Young & Co are shortly to shut the public bar; it doesn't cover overheads.

There's a roof light; it's a single storey building, good ventilation and also heating, for winter.

Two years ago the passing of the late Bill Davies, who had worked at Charing Cross Hospital and in commercial television, left a yawing gap of character, wit and anecdote of horseracing; is there now anyone big-hearted enough to liven the place up a bit?

Living locally there are many who may reproach themselves for the fact that this is a public bar become quiet, somewhat suddenly.

Yet the quality of the cellarmanship is as good as ever, Young's ale a great standby. Surely renewed popular support may effect a stay of execution for the Cumberland's public bar?

Dear Chris.

Recent changes locally; the Truscot on the corner of Curtain Road and Worship Street, to the North of Liverpool Street station, was awarded the CAMRA/English Heritage award as best pub conversion on the 14th of March when twelve varieties of real ale were on offer. The conversion, from a spice warehouse, was designed by the local architectural practice of Stock Woolstencroft which intends to develop this line of activity.

Slightly to the East almost immediately to the South the Owl and the Pussycat changed landlords over the summer, a wider variety of food seems to be available over a longer timescale, there are usually at least five real ales on offer and live music has become a feature of weekend evenings, on Saturdays usually a skiffle group.

The Little Wonder in Hackney Road is now closed.

To the South of the Hackney Road in Horatio Street the Lord Nelson's Head has changed hands. The new manager, Andie Latchford retains some of the Batemans beers and has introduced Courage Directors and John Smiths bitter. Her plans include a range of social and theme activities.

John Smiths bitter is now available at the Cavalier on the junction of Brady Street and Three Colts Lane.

Last month 40 local members travelled to the Hop Back Brewery at Downton, near Salisbury to present John Gilbert, the owner, with a certificate to celebrate his beer 'Summer Lightning' being voted "Best Beer of Battersea 1994". Chairman Chris Cobbold presented John with his award after a brewery trip.

However the really good news announced at the ceremony was that Hop Back have acquired 'The Sultan' in Norman Road, South Wimbledon, SW19 from Taylor Walker. The pub has ceased trading for the last few months and Hop Back's offer was immediately accepted by the Allied Company.

This will be Hop Back's only venture into the capital city in the foreseeable future and we are grateful that John Gilbert has returned to sell his award winning beers in his old branch area. The Sultan was opened on 27th May and can be accessed by alighting at either Colliers Wood or South Wimbledon and locate Haydons Road, walking north, pass Gilbert Road on the right, then turn next right into De Burgh Road, opposite the church you will see 'The Sultan'.

Taylor Walker installed a pub sign depicting a gentleman in a Turban, but 'The Sultan' is named after a famous 19th century race horse. The 1803 pub stands on the site of Lord Nelson's Merton Place and was bombed in

1944 and not rebuilt until 1969. This is a two bar pub with an upstairs function room and a garden.

Having viewed the cellar myself, the beers will be sold in tip-top condition and should include most of the wide range of Hop Back beers at competitive prices for the area.

John also plans to use the pub as a base for Hop Back beers for the London free trade who wish to come and collect his beers for themselves.

South West London CAMRA wish Steve and Wendy Wright, the new licensees, all the best for a long and prosperous future in 'The Sultan'.

EXCISE DUTY BRIEFING

THE FULL PINT CONTROVERSY CONTINUES

John Pye, Lewisham councils Chief Trading Standards Officer, recently expressed his "extreme concern" following the government's decision not to implement full pint legislation. Speaking to South-East London CAMRA chairman Andrew Padgham, he advised that in a report last year his department found that pubs in the borough were "complying with trade recommendations that a pint should consist of not less than 95% liquid, but rarely serving full pints. Unfortunately unless more extreme short measures are offered, we are unlikely to successfully prosecutre a licensee. However this does not mean we agree with the governments view that a pint of beer needs only to be 19 fluid ounces" he said. The local CAMRA branch have requested that a further sample of pubs be inspected, and the results of this will be available at the Catford Beer Festival, which John Pye will formerly open; accompanied by national CAMRA chairman John Cryne.



RICHMOND & HOUNSLOW NEWS

A new pub has opened in Water Lane, Richmond opposite the White Cross. It is called the SLUG & LETTUCE and is one of a chain of the same name. I am informed that despite the fitting of no less than eight handpumps the only cask beer currently on offer is Courage Best Bitter.

In Isleworth, the redecoration of the COACH & HORSES, London Road is now complete. A partition has been installed separating the pub once again into two rooms — a saloon bar and a lounge (as described by the names etched in the glass of the doors). The elevated section around the bar now has a wooden floor and wooden wall panelling. In the lounge (at the car park end of the pub) the carpet has been renewed and the chairs reupholstered; the original internal doors with etched glass panels have been retained though one has been moved. At present there are no plans to reduce prices in the saloon bar.

On a similar note, as we reported in April, the refurbishment of another Young's pub in our area — the HARE & HOUNDS in Upper Richmond Road, Sheen was to retain the public bar. This has indeed happened but in spite of this the pub now has a single price list in all areas.

Finally, as we were about to go to press we heard that the Inspector for the Department of the Environment has upheld the appeal from McDonalds in support of their planning application to demolish the HOPE & ANCHOR in Hanworth and build a drive-through "restaurant" so the fate of the pub is finally sealed. We have no news yet about how soon the pub will be closed but as we go to press the pub remains open selling Greene King Abbot Ale as its one handpumped beer.





Eighty-year-old Mr Fox, who comes from Elland in West Yorkshire, was a sergeant in the Royal Artillery when he landed in Normandy in 1944. He has been living at the Royal Hospital, Chelsea, for the past three years.

His verdict on the new beer: "Marvellous, This is just how beer used to be when I was a young 'un."

THE ALBION BREWERY 1808-1994

Later this year what is left of the Albion Brewery in Whitechapel will be no more. A Sainsburys will open on the site but the clock at the front entrance will remain due to its local listing.

MANN

Though built in 1803 it was not until its purchase in 1819 that any of the names Mann, Crossman or Paulin came to be associated with the Albion Brewery. Philip Betts Blake and his junior partner at the Strandbridge Brewery, Narrow Wall, Lambeth, James Mann, bought the brewery from its bankrupt owners. P. Blake & Company became Blake & Mann and, by 1843, James Mann & Sons. James senior was to have left the brewery to his two older sons James and Edward but three weeks before James senior's death Edward died of typhus leaving James junior as the sole partner. Thomas, the youngest son was still working at the brewery.

CROSSMAN & PAULIN

Robert Crossman was managing the Border Brewery at Berwick when he bought a quarter share for £10,000 in 1846. Later that year Thomas Mann came into his share of the brewery and further shares were sold to Crossman and Thomas Paulin the manager of the Berwick Shipping Company. In those early days the brewery had no tied houses but five beerhouses were held on short leases, one of which was the William IV in Blackfriars Road.

As well as opening a further Albion Brewery in Burton, they took over other breweries. Stamford Hill Brewery cost £80,000 in 1919, Best's Brewery, Camberwell cost £46,000 in 1924, Hornchurch (Fielders) Brewery cost £171,000 in 1925, Luker's Brewery in Southend cost £285,000 in 1929 along with Burrow's Twickenham Brewery, Brandon's Putney Brewery, Daniel Watney's Richmond Brewery and the North Western Brewery, Dunstable in 1938. In 1958 they merged with Watney to form Watney Mann and thence the downward spiral into Grand Met. "Avoid at all costs" was the advice of the Good Beer Guide in 1974 if you wanted real ale. If you had the earlier edition then "Avoid like the plague" was the advice in respect of Watneys.

The Albion Brewery site is next to the Blind Beggar in Whitechapel Road, E1 and the brewery logo of Saint George on horseback slaying the dragon can still be seen on the windows of many East End pubs.

Danny Spencer, the Landlord of the Kelly Arms in Kingston, started off May Day the toast of the Kingston Round Tables.

For not only did he agree to run probably the biggest beer festival Kingston has ever seen, he also agreed to donate a large percentage of the day's takings to local charity.

The day started well with superb service from the team at Classic Ales giving their expert advice. Regulars from the pub staffed the beer tent.

After being interviewed by Kingston FM Radio, there was a surge of interest in the beer tent. The local branch of CAMRA were on hand to advise some of the newer Real Ale enthusiasts, many of whom will no doubt soon become members of CAMRA.

After nearly 5 hours and some 2,000 pints later, the Festival was declared sold out.

The day was a great success for Real Ale and local charity, but then disaster struck as one of the bar staff was mugged taking the entire day's takings back to the pub.

As Danny explained, the theft has left him somewhat financially "exposed" but the real disaster was the money that he had pledged to the Round Table charities.

In true "Dunkirk Spirit" disgruntled regulars at the pub decided that they would pull together and organise another Real Ale Festival at the Kelly Arms, Alfred Road, Kingston, Surrey (081-546 8450) from 30th June thru to 2nd July 1994.

It is hoped that with support from suppliers, charity will eventually win the day. Put the dates in your diary for all the best Ales, to include Hanby Treacleminer, Uley Pigor Mortis, Kelham Island Golden Eagle and Woods Wallop, to name but a few.

COOKING WITH BEER

In the April edition of London Drinker Roger Loiselle of CCC Leisure mentioned in a letter that he distributes recipes using beer to the managers of the group's pubs and offered to share these with us. Here is the first one which is called BEIR FISCH, though we think perhaps it should be BIER FISCH. Either way, it goes like this, the quantities shown being for six servings:

6 slices white fish – about 3 pounds (carp is recommended)

1 tablespoon of salt

1 cup diced onions

2.5 cups beer

I bay leaf

I teaspoon ground black pepper

3 slices of lemon

2 tablespoons sugar

6 gingersnaps - crushed

I tablespoon butter

Wash and drain the fish, sprinkle with salt and set aside for 15 minutes. In a deep skillet spread the onions and arrange the fish over them; add the beer, bay leaf, pepper, lemon and sugar. Bring to a gentle boil then cover loosely and cook on a low heat for 30 minutes. Transfer the fish to a serving dish. Stir the gingersnaps and butter into the stock and cook on a high heat for 2 minutes; taste for seasoning and pour over the fish.

"CUT BEER DUTY NOW"

Every drinker knows that they pay too much for their beer, but how many realise that nearly one third of the price of their pint is swallowed up by the Government in taxes?

"British beer drinkers pay nearly seven times more duty than most of their European counterparts, only the Irish pay more" said Andrew Padgham, the local CAMRA chairman, we drink more than 20% of all beer in the EC but pay over 50% of the beer duty. This massive gap in tax, an average of 20 pence per pint more than in France, threatens British pubs, British breweries and British jobs because of the flood in cheap imports from France. Already we are seeing pubs in the local area closing down through lost trade. The British Government must cut beer duty now, and show their full support for the single European Market."

Local MP Jim Dowd agrees. He will be holding a special press briefing at 5.45pm on Wednesday 15th June on the subject. This will be held in the main hall of the Lewisham Theatre, scene of the second Catford Beer Festival.

NEW SERIES OF ANTI-TAX PUB POSTERS UNDER WAY

Shepherd Neame, Britain's oldest brewers, have commissioned top cartoonist Bill Tidy to produce four new pub posters to hammer home the threat of high beer taxes.

The full-colour posters are being made available to breweries and pubs throughout the country.

The four new posters show...

- A taxman making a bonfire of a pile of innsigns with the message '10,000 pubs could close in the next six years — high taxes on British beer threaten your pub';
- Mountaineers scaling a huge pile of barrels of foreign-brewed beer, captioned 'Government taxes on beer are higher in Britain than in France, Germany, Holland, Spain, Belgium, Italy, Denmark, Luxembourg, Portugal and Greece....'
- Trumpet-blasting taxmen, blowing down the walls of a pub and a brewery — Jericho-style — with the message 'High Government taxes threaten your pub, your pint and your brewery'; and
- A hard-hitting cartoon of a pistolwielding brewery horse handler about to shoot the last drayhorse, with the caption 'The Government must cut taxes on beer.'

Each poster carries the line: 'Who pays? You pay! Write to your MP!'.

Brewers and pub chain operators who would like copies of the posters should contact Edwards Harvey Associates (Tel: 0622 674177).

Shepherd Neame chairman Robert Neame comments: "The pub posters are a humerous and different way of sustaining a message which is of such importance to every brewer, licensee and pub customer."

The new series was commissioned by Shepherd Neame following the success of two Bill Tidy posters, highlighting the tax situation, which were produced last year just ahead of the Budget. A framed pair were presented to Chancellor Kenneth Clarke by Brewers and Licensed Retailers Association Director, Robin Simpson.

CATFORD BEER FESTIVAL

Drinkers from all over South-East London will flock to the Lewisham Theatre in Rushey Green this week for the second Catford Beer Festival. The event is organised by the local branch of the Campaign for Real Ale and will offer a wide range of traditional beers and ciders from around the country.

Drinkers are assured full value as explained by branch chairman Andrew Padgham: "We believe drinkers should get what they pay for; a full liquid pint. The Government recently decided against this, having scrapped the full pint rule. If you buy a pint of milk, it must be a full pint by law, so why is beer different? At our festival oversize lined glasses will ensure full measures and allow space for the head."

John Pye, Chief Trading Standards offer for Lewisham Council will be photographed opening the event at 5pm on Wednesday 15th June, accompanied by local MP Jim Dowd, National CAMRA chairman John Cryne, and CAMRA branch chairman Andrew Padgham.

The festival open 5pm to 11pm on Wednesday 15th June, then noon until 11pm Thursday 16th to Saturday 18th of June. Admission is £2 after 5pm during the week and £1.50 all day Saturday.

FROM TODDLERS TO GOLDEN OLDIES!!

With the current English licensing laws it is difficult for families to enjoy a drink together in London. Very few places have areas where young and old are welcome unless its a garden. The biggest pub in the world, the Great British Beer Festival, has once again made special arrangements for families. In the Hall will be a wide selection of toys for all ages. Some have been kindly lent by this year's charity which is for cot deaths. "A DICKY IN YOUR BOTTLE..."

The recent correspondence on Wetherspoon's reminds me that there have been a few personnel changes in our local Wetherspoon's pubs.

Towards the end of last year Jon & Liz moved from the MILLER'S WELL, East Ham, to WETHERSPOON'S at Victoria Station, which is why East London & City CAMRA delivers "London Drinker" to an outlet in SW1! Readers with long memories may remember the rather grotty bar by Platform 9 — WETHERSPOON'S is more or less on the same site, albeit at first floor level, and is infinitely superior to its late and unlamented predecessor. The only snag is that it's almost always crowded, especially during the evening rush hour! Ten thousand commuters can't be wrong...

The MILLER'S WELL is now in the capable hands of Clive & Gaynor and is doing much better business than some of the other pubs in the area.

More recently Mark & Mel moved from THE DRUM, Lea Bridge Road, to the GEORGE, Wanstead, their places being taken by Jason & Jacqui Benneworth who were previously relief managers at the GEORGE.

"East Ender"

S.E. LONDON BEER GUIDE

A small group of devoted beer drinkers have visited every pub in South-East London in the last six months. The result of their efforts is a new guide which details all pubs in the area.

"There are nearly 900 pubs within South-East London" said Cliff Cork, the guide's editor, "The district stretches from Southwark in central London, through Peckham and out as far as Abbey Wood and Norwood, in one huge triangle. With so many pubs in the area there is a good selection to meet everyones tastes; from upmarket tourist pubs and quiet family restaurants to youngsters' disco bars and basic traditional beer, or real ale, have a description which includes facilities available, such as whether families are welcome, and when food is served."

The guide also features articles on the history of beer and other subjects of interest to the local drinker.

The new guide, produced by CAMRA will be launched at the Catford Beer Festival on Wednesday 15th June at a special price, and will then be on sale in bookshops at £4.95.

FROM OUR ARCHIVES

FIFTEEN YEARS AGO the pale green cover of the June 1979 London Drinker, proclaimed "Watney's Red is Dead!", beneath a photograph of revellers celebrating accordingly. The lead article, also bearing that heading, almost gloated over the fact that its demise was due largely to the public's preference for real ale despite the huge advertising budget for Red, and suggested that lager sales were reaching a plateau. However, it warned against complacency lest the Big Six change direction again. Elsewhere in the issue "A Nation Mourns" looked tongue-incheek at the far from sad situation, with spurious quotations from politicians with lightly disguised names, likewise well known personalities in other fields.

In the second article in the series about the Big Six, Neil Harris who was then CAMRA's National Liaison Officer for the Courage Group, outlined the Group's history from early mergers. At the time Courage was producing 8% of the country's beer; the opening of the mega-brewery at Worton Grange near Reading was not far over the horizon, as was the closure of the former Simond's Reading Brewery and (at that time only a possibility) of the Horseleydown Brewery near Tower Bridge.

The price of beer was, as always, topical. It was mooted that when the Government ended Price Restraint, the brewers would again raise prices over and above the 3p imposed in the recent Budget. The search was still on for cheap, and expensive beers. Cited among the former was Ind Coope Burton at 36p a pint in Merton, and in the latter case the same beer at 48p in Barnes. Contenders among the Best Value section were B.R. Traveller's Fare establishments on major railway stations. In pride of place was the Shires Bar at St Pancras with Rayment BBA at 34p and Green King Abbot at 39p.

Two "low carbohydrate" lagers had taken to the market, and it looked as though battle were about to be joined to collar the gullible.

Fourteen pubs were listed as having recently introduced (or should that be re-introduced?) real ale.

TEN YEARS AGO London Drinker underwent a radical change in presentation and image. The printing operation was switched to

South London, using semi-glossy paper and a colour for the cover frame. The typesetting was done locally, and photocopies of this were provided for us to paste-up into full-size mockups with appropriate space left for illustrations. A freelance layout artist took these as instructions for final artwork which was then processed by the printers, Purley Press of Dulwich. The "galleys" — typeset columns of print — were usually left at a pub frequented by two of the Editors, and often the pasting-up was done in the back room over copious Bass, to the amusement of regulars and their children.

The colour used for the 28 page June 1984 issue's cover frame was apple green, and a photograph of the Dulwich Wood House tied in with an Historicrawl by Merton of the Crystal Palace area. A little ingenuity in the layout department used an engraving of the Palace, with handpumps substituted for its two towers. The rear cover also used green, to advertise the Greenwich Real Ale Festival.

The House of Commons had blocked a Private Member's Bill to have the strength of all beers and lagers displayed on taps and containers.

In his Editorial, Chris reflected on the fact that some beers brewed in London were being sold at higher prices than beers of similar strength brought in from a great distance.

There had recently been a drop in pubs selling real ale (claiming to do so but not coming up with the goods) in certain areas; the article on the subject "Get out your camels".

In "London Drinker", Red Rover toured pubs in Woodford, Manor Park and Newham, and had a few horror stories about undrinkable or unavailable beer, with pubs to match. Luckily his profession gave him free transportation.

The four centre pages formed the largest advertising feature in London Drinker to date. It comprised the history of Charles Wells Ltd of Bedford. The text was written by Tom Wells, Advertising Manager of that company, which provided illustrations and photographs. This particular piece was my own baptism of fire in actually designing a layout, and despite the amount of expletives uttered during the planning in my classroom (in absentia bratorum) it turned out quite satisfactorily — I'm no mathematician and an awful lot of

scaling-up and down of illustrations was necessary — in consequence the Bass took quite a hammering that night.

"Passing Clouds" was a discussion of the reasons and excuses tendered for cloudy beer. It concluded with the words: "It all boils down to the one word I referred to earlier, a word which covers every fault in the book. If you haven't yet guessed, I refer to **incompetence**."

FIVE YEARS AGO sky blue was the theme colour of the 32 page June 1989 issue, whose cover featured a photograph of the King & Barnes dray and team — a reference to the third and final part of Merton's Historicrawl of Horsham, which included a history of that brewery and its predecessors.

Idle Moments featured three examples of mirror-writing, the longest of which covered four complete lines of print. A challenge was issued for a non-rhyming limerick in mirror-writing.

The announcement was made of the first Surrey Beer Festival, to be held towards the end of the month in Dorking, featuring 30 real ales and ciders. The story was recounted of how at a Great British Beer Festival one of the Editors had been designated interpreter. While explaining to some Italians the brewing process, the word for NEUTER — in the context of hops — was unforthcoming, but possibly consumption of perry resulted in the musical term CASTRATO being substituted. The piece was entitled Linguistic Gymnastics.

Clifton Inns had presented a two-day real ale festival in the Flamingo, Kingston, featuring beers from all 4 Clifton brew-pubs.

The deadline has almost overtaken my, so let me present an apology for a misprint in my last article. Despite modern technology a gremlin disrupted my quotation of the mirror-writing in the May 1989 London Drinker. It was rendered even more obscure by the transposition of the first two words — linguistically speaking — which appeared as the SECOND line. I'm sure anyone who troubled to check would have realised the error. Otherwise — what the hell?

Until the next occasion, if ever — Cheers.

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BEER BRIEFING LONDON BEER GUIDES UPDATE 92

We apologise that Beer Briefing did not appear last month; this was due to a lack of space and was not through any fault of the compilers and contributors. As a result we have a bumper two months of news to catch up on. We welcome a brand new Fullers pub in the City and two more 'Firkin' conversions in NI Islington and W2 Paddington. New free houses converted from shop and commercial premises continue apace with no less than 17 recorded all over London. These include two from Regent Inns in NWI Canden Town and W5 Ealing and a new Wetherspoon outlet in Romford. Grosvenor Inns have converted a wine bar into a riverside pub in Richmond and taken over an existing pub in SEI Waterloo - both show the David Bruce influence dispensing (expensive) Belcher beers. 'Ale House' conversions include a 'Clutterbucks' from Allied in EI Whitechapel; a 'Hogshead' from Whitbread in SEI3 Lewisham and one from Scottish & Newcastle in WC2 Covent Garden. Beer from the newest London brewery - Bishop's has been spotted - more information on outlets would be welcome. Sadly, two historic city pubs have been closed to pave the way for the controversial Palumbo office redevelopment scheme and a long established Brentford free house renowned for its steadfast championing of real the ale cause has also closed with its future remaining uncertain. 
