

EDITORIAL

This has been a depressing time for me looking back over the past year's drinking. There have been so many disappointments for London Drinkers in 1994/5, it is difficult to know where to begin. The Brewery closest to my heart is Youngs and this has been a year of variable beer and price increases as well to put the boot into their dwindling number of regulars. I just think back to the days when the company had simple aims – excellent, quality beer in decent pubs. The beer was also one of the cheapest in London.

Wetherspoons now are making that claim about the truly awful 'Scotch Bitter' and their tired range of beers is only enlivened at weekends by a small independent beer as a guest. However, these guests are usually sweet, strong beers, so often there is not a true bitter beer available at all. The company that holds a comparable position to Youngs in Manchester is Joseph Holt. The company still holds to the adage of good quality, cheap beer (96p) in decent surroundings with equally good profits. Oh, how the shareholders have benefited from this unenlightened traditional policy! The shares are almost unobtainable and cost a staggering £33 each. Such are the volumes of beer sold, that most are sold in 54 gallon hogsheads. They don't muck about discounting their beers to the Big Six Breweries to maintain volumes at the brewery. All expansion is carefully planned and is used to capacity to supply their tied houses. Supplies to the free trade are immediately stopped if they cannot keep pace with demand from their tied estate, most of them being packed with loyal regulars. It reminds me of most Young's pubs when I first acquired the taste of the 'amber nectar'.

Now, in London, I first and foremost seek a quality product and if the price is right as well-heaven! Apart from the Hop Back's Sultan, I have to look to the free trade and to the growing number of tied houses that are allowed to stock a guest beer of their choice. But even here, the beers of excellence are few and far between. One of the best must be Harvey's, where the most excellent Miles

Jenner, is liberated to brew the beer from his own chosen ingredients. None of this nonsense about having to buy the cheapest on the open market here! Miles has encouraged local farmers to grow the barley he requires and has started a new Sussex Hop Farm to produce solely for the Brewery. Just listening to the man enthuse about the ingredients and finished product is so refreshing. Apart from the occasional Fuller's product, I now have to wait for my favourite beers to appear at Free Houses or at Beer Festivals. I cannot think of a 'big six' beer worth enthusing about, with the honourable exception of the Highgate products. Draught Bass used to be superb in a couple of London outlets, but now this is a mere shadow of the great beer it once was.

So, now I wait with baited taste buds for the likes of Adnams, Bathams, Holdens, Nethergate, Crouch Vale, Woodfordes and Yates. More and more beers of quality are now being produced for the free trade, and, if the owner is not too greedy with pour-backs, or serving beer on delivery or on price swindles, then I would suggest to our readers to get out there and give them a go.

I do realise that a lot of our readers are very happy with Courage Best, Boddingtons, Wadworth 6X and Tetleys and good luck to you. All I ask is that you risk your taste-buds occasionally by trying an 'unknown' beer in a strange pub or at a beer festival. Some of the best pubs advertise in the magazine and they will always to tell you in advance which products will be available on the date of your intended visit.

After all these ramblings, however, if I get a wonderful pint of Young's Ordinary or a pint of Fuller's Chiswick, I will stick like glue to the pub for as long as the quality lasts! It's my age I suppose!

Did you know that there are now Great British Beer Festival over 1100 real ales being regularly brewed. Compare this back to 1977, the year of the first Great British Beer Festival when only around 330 beers were being brewed and you can see how the choice for the beer loving public has grown.

But its not all good news. Of the breweries known in 1977, 34 have shut and over 80 beers lost forever. In some cases the name of a beer may remain but it is produced elsewhere. Like good wine, change the environment that a beer is brewed in and the beer will never taste the same.

The first Great British Beer Festival boasted 136 beers from 76 breweries of which almost a quarter have now vanished. Despite the loss, every year new small breweries are being set up to take their place. In the last year there were 35 new ones. With this enormous choice, how does the Great British Beer Festival choose? Fortunately, with the increase in size, the beer order now



consists of over 300 real ales, which is almost a third of all real ales brewed. The Festival is a show case for British real ales and so the order is balanced by a breakdown of alcohol strengths and beer styles. This is to ensure that anyone going to the Festival can find a beer style

that they want to try. Then there is the geographical spread to allow representations from all parts of the UK. And finally, there is a balance between regional brewers, which are the most popular beers, and the small brewers who need more exposure.

Whether big or small, a beer is only ordered if the beer quality is known to be good, for bland, indifferent beer is no use to anyone. Every beer is cooled to ensure that the beer is tasted in the best possible condition. If you would like to come to the Beer Festival with the biggest choice of draught beers in the world, make a note in your diary now: 1-5th August 1995, Olympia, London. The favourite beers of the festivals were:

MILD: dead heat in this category, Hop Back, Batemans and Old Mill Bitter. Not having a headbanger category to vote on Golden Pride (really a barley wine) and Butterknowle Banner came out top in this category.

STOUT: Hop Back followed by Orkney Dragonhead and Deep Shaft.

PORTER: Pickwick and Beer Engine tied.

OLD: Hardington followed by Xmas Noggin. Only six people bothered to fill out anything to do with eider and perry. FOREIGN: Two votes for the smoked foreign one.

OVERALL BEER OF THE FESTIVAL: considering Yates got only four and Summer Lightening three votes in the bitters category, it was surprising both these beers tied with eight votes for overall beer of the festival.

BEER FOR NEXT YEAR: Crippledick, it was ordered this year but was unobtainable. Second came Yakima Grande Porter, Surprising this considering there was a half page in October's What's Brewing on the brewery's demise! Not reading the WB these days then chaps? some asked for Youngs beers and we have tried in the past only to be told to pick it up from the brewery. In 1992 letters and phone calls went unanswered and we have not bothered since. One vote was for Uncle Igor's Famous Falling Over Water!

Finally, if you would like to see any changes at Pigs Ear there is always the opportunity to join the committee. This coming April at the AGM there will be several posts that need filling. Date and venue are to be confirmed but please turn up at the March meeting on the 6th which is to be held at the supporters of Leyton Orient Football Club, junction of Brisbane Road and Buckingham Road E10 at 8pm. One trusts they will still be in existence.

NEWS FROM YOUNGS BREWERY

The chairman of one of Britain's best known independent breweries is so angry about the Government's policy on beer duty that he has produced price lists openly accusing Chancellor Kenneth Clarke of helping cross-Channel bootleggers.

John Young, head of Young's Brewery in Wandworth, South London, has emblazoned the words "Chancellor's bootlegging surcharge" in large red letters above the new prices, which came into effect on New Year's Day as a result of Mr Clark's post-Budget penny on a pint.

Mr Young, who has been at the forefront of a national campaign to persuade the Chancellor to cut duty, said: "Illegal imports of beer from the Continent are now running at a million pints a day.

"Duty on beer in Britain is a scandalous seven times higher than in France, and the latest increase makes it even more attractive for smugglers to flood the British market with cheap European brews.

"We have no alternative but to spell out exactly what effect the Chancellor's greed is having on the British brewing industry. Thousands of jobs are now threatened and many of Britain's valued pubs face permanent closure.


"We cannot stand silently by while the Government's only action is to support the French brewing industry and encourage smuggling."

EXPRESS REBIRTH AT BRENTFORD

Good news for West London drinkers is that the Express Hotel in Kew Bridge Road, Brentford reopened on Thursday 8th December.

Since it was closed last March the exterior has been repaired and new indoor toilets have been added to the rear of the building, including one for the disabled. The word "Hotel" has been dropped in favour of "Tavern", but apart from that very little has changed. The interior has been spruced up where necessary but the layout, with the separate "Chiswick" bar, is unaltered. The pub remains free of games and music is so subdued that much of the time you would swear there is none (a Cliff Richard LP could be faintly heard at Christmas).

The Express, built between 1794 and 1797 by Hawkes & Co., has been owned by the Aldington family since 1882 and when it closed there were concerns that it might be sold. Thankfully, this has not happened and Gordon and Elizabeth Rough have been brought in as managers.

As if the reopening itself were not publicity enough, Mrs. Rough ensured nationwide coverage of the event by giving birth on reopening night without even realising that she was pregnant! A 6lb 8oz boy resulted from what she thought were stomach cramps or indigestion.

As before the draught beers available at the express are Bass and Young's Bitter (still known in the pub as PA) and Special, plus currently Winter Warmer.

LONDON PUBS WITH A HEART

Six pubs that have raised a combined total of £56,000 in once year have reached the final of Pubs with a Heart, a contest to find the most generous licensees and drinkers in the London area.

They are the **Rose Inn**, in New Cross Road, New Cross; the **Thicket Tavern**, in Anerley Road, Crystal Palace; the **Black Horse**, in New Haw Road, Addlestone, Surrey; the **Richmond Arms**, in The Square, Richmond-upon-Thames; the **Albert Arms**, in Kingston-Hill, Kingston-upon-Thames; and the **Swan**, in Fulham Broadway.

Pubs with a Heart, being run for the second year by the Association of London Brewers and Licensed Retailers, is aimed at rewarding pubs that raise money for charity and at the same time highlighting the vast amount of work carried out voluntarily by publicans and pub-goers.

The winner will receive an engraved plaque and £2,000 to give to a charity of the pub's choice.

The **Rose Inn** raised £6,700 for charity during the 12-month qualifying period, most

of it for the Caner Relief Macmillan Fund, in memory of licensee Bonnie Davison's husband Harry, who died of cancer in 1991.

The **Thicket Tavern** handed over £14,125 to the Across Trust – which provides a specially adapted bus to take handicapped children to Lourdes – to the Rupert Bear ward at Mayday Hospital in Croydon and to local people in need.

Licensees Barry and Chris Stoakes and customers of the **Black Horse** staged a concert at the London Palladium at raise £17,172, most of it for an incubator appeal fund at St Peter's Hospital, Chertsey.

Regulars at the Richmond Arms contributed £4,380 to London Lighthouse and Body Positive.


Customer at the **Albert Arms** handed over £6,147 to the British Heart Foundation, from a London-to-Brighton cycle ride, and £1,062 divided equally between Children in Need and Age Concern.

Licensee Noreen Prendergast and customers of the **Swan** raised £6,200 for a variety of charities through music evenings in the pub.

WEST FEST 94

If, like me, you enjoy real ale, real music, real food and real people but find standing for hours in a huge concrete barn in London W14 in the middle of summer a strain, then perhaps the following alternative may inspire you to wander further afield next year (or you could be gross and do both as I did this year!).

On August Bank Holiday (A.B.H.) Saturday, I had cause to travel to Swindon to watch football. As on previous occasions this involved drinking excellent Arkells at the Black Horse in Wanborough and super Archers in the Glue Pot, Swindon, and then being bored rigid at the County Ground: Swindon I Watford 0 (yet again).

This year, however, I had noticed a small advert in "What's Brewing" for "West Fest 94" at Wiveliscombe over the A.B.H. Realising that Wiveliscombe is 'only' about 80 miles past Swindon I suggested to my mate Geoff that a visit to Somerset might just be the exercise his nice, new, comfortable, large car might need. Geoff saw through my pathetic ruse, but as he knows that Exmoor and Cotleigh breweries both reside in Wiveliscombe he instantly agreed to my idea.

After Swindon, we made one more mistake. We though that Taunton might be an interesting drinking town – it isn't, although, to be fair, the GBG-listed pubs serve decent ale. One amusing incident occurred at the end of an interesting evening, however, when a landlord rushed around putting on a new barrel of Wadworth 6X just for us. We were most impressed until he told us that he always insists on the highest standards, so that is why he keeps his beers under nitrogen!!! This misguided soul shall remain nameless but his pub is the Black Horse.

Wiveliscombe is 10 miles from Taunton set prettily amongst the Somerset Hills (Quantocks I believe, if you'll pardon my language). Firstly we had to get the pronunciation of the place right. Would the emphasis be on the "Wiv", the "veli" or the "scombe"? One Taunton local further confused us by pronouncing it "Witheliscombe", but the general agreement is for Withel-IS-combe. All this proved totally and literally academic as everyone who lives in the town calls it "Wivvy".

Wivvy, then, is a typical small west-country town. A few thousand inhabitants, a school, a bank, two pubs, two hotels, a garage, a dozen or so shops. Untypically, though, it has these two independent breweries both working flat-out producing over 10,000 pints a week each.

West Fest is Wiveliscombe's annual community event. Over the past five years it has developed 'organically', i.e. to suit and reflect the interests of the local people. It now runs over four days and includes:

- (i) a summer fayre (or fête);
- (ii) two (count 'em) beer festivals, one housed in the unlikely surrounds of the school canteen with 30+ beers (mainly from small west-country breweries) and another housed in the Courtyard Hotel with 10 more beers;
- (iii) a fun run;
- (iv) a four day music festival with 10 acts performing rock, folk, cajun etc in the school hall;
- (v) barbecued food, including beer sausages
- (vi) a car boot sale;
- (vii) quizzes and games in the pubs;
- (viii) a cricket match and
- (ix) brewery tours.

All activities seemed well-organised and enthusiastically supported.

30-40 people attended the brewery tours, which took place on Sunday morning. Exmoor Brewery still resides in an old, large, dusty part of the ex-Hancocks brewery (closed 1959). They appear never to have had time to do anything other than trying to keep up with the demand for their excellent range of ales. The various vats and tuns were cobbled together with Meccano, string and hope in a delightfully Heath Robinson style. The products and hospitality were firstrate, however, with 'Gold', 'Old', 'Beast' (sic) and 'Summer Ale' available.

By chance Cotleigh used to lease another part of the Golden Hill brewery. They have long since moved 200 yards to a unit on a small industrial estate. Here, in complete contrast to Exmoor, everything is modern, computerised and painted. The two breweries share a dedication to excellence and the "Harrier" and "Old Buzzard" were again first-rate. We noticed no discord between the two fine brewing companies, merely mutual respect and pride in their products.

Geoff and I thoroughly enjoyed our visit to West Fest 94. The good people of Wivvy had obviously spent a long time preparing it and made us and the other visitors welcome. They said they were already preparing next year's event, so, if I've whetted your appetite, look out for the adverts next year or contact either of the breweries for details.

FROM OUR ARCHIVES

FIFTEEN YEARS AGO the pastel green cover of the 20 page February 1980 London Drinker bore a photograph of the Star & Garter by Kew Bridge, a Fuller house, to tie-in with an article on that company's history. This was written by Jim Scanlon to intersperse the series on the Big Six.

The introduction to "Drops in the Desert" read: "If you think that real ale is everywhere and that CAMRA has made itself redundant, hearken unto John Ward as he leads you through the barren wastes of North London." It covered Palmers Green (N.13) which only had 4 real ale pubs.

Godson's, the first of London's new breweries, had been in operation for a few months, and was going through all kinds of change. It had already stopped producing one beer — Anchor Bitter — and had one draught beer, Black Horse (o.g. 1048). I quote one section of an article listing its 16 outlets: "Godson's are full of surprises. What other brewery produced a Jubilee Ale — in 1979? Did no-one tell them that Idi Amin had got the chop? Also, their bitter has tended to change in appearance and flavour almost from one week to the next, while a story went round that on one of their brews, they forgot to add the hops!"

In "WoT about the workers?", to quote: "B.J. Dickson takes a robust swipe at those who dare to come between a working man and his pint of real ale." One of his main points was that fake handpumps were being used to serve keg, passed off as real ale. His last paragraph read: "I am not a snob. I am a working class man who works in a factory, but I don't drink any old crap the breweries advertise heavily on TV. Surely, even the working man has got some mind of his own; and doesn't just drink lager because all his mates in the football club do?"

TEN YEARS AGO the "guest" colour on the covers of the 28 page February 1985 L.D. was yellow. The front featured a photograph of the King & Barnes dray emerging from the Horsham Brewery. The caption 'Awaydray to Horsham' drew the reader's attention to an article by John Gilbert, outlining a history of that company,

following a visit by the author and the Editorial Team some weeks beforehand. Our host at the time was the late Peter King, then Joint Managing Director, and, as he and I were friends, I join far more august writers in mourning his early death last year.

The back cover consisted of an advert for the first London Drinker Beer Festival, near St. Pancras Station.

The Editorial, in a sub-heading, used the phrase "CAMRA - the biggest pain in the arse." This was taken from an extract, which we re-print in full, from a local South London newspaper, using the words of an anonymous London licensee: "some governors put all the old slops back that have been hanging around the bar for hours, but I don't agree with that. You can put a couple of gallons of water in the barrel and nobody would notice. You can put two gallons of water in 22 gallons of beer without risk that's £16. This gain is £16 for every 2 gallons of water in one session and that's £32 a day seven days a week. But you can do your trade in if you are not careful because some people like the CAMRA mob can tell the difference between a good pint and a bad

In fact they are the biggest pain in the arse you have ever come across to be quite honest. The normal average person can't tell the difference."

Chris Cobbold and Ian Worden, who penned the Editorial, discussed the various ways of "recycling" waste beer and watering casks, and pointed out that many landlords would have nothing to do with the practise.

In "Liquid Lunch", R.M.Rider (pen-name for a writer who did a great deal of travelling on the then ubiquitous Routemaster buses, i.e. R.Ms.) described a crawl "Up and down the City Road" — his sub-heading — visiting four pubs.

A Capital Mild Night was announced. At the venue, the White Horse, Parsons Green, Mitchell & Butler's Highgate Best (light) and Dark were offered at 50p a pint.

Hall & Woodhouse, of Blandford Forum, Dorset, had acquired four London houses the Woodman, Battersea; the Railway Tavern, Mortlake; the Eel Pie, Twickenham; and the King's Arms, Hampton Court.

In "Out of Town", Chris profiled the Blue Ship at The Haven, West Sussex.

The first (and, to the best of my knowledge only) London Drinker draw had taken place. The first three prizes were £1,000, £250 and £50 respectively, and 60 runners-up won a copy each of the 1985 Good Beer Guide.

The Battersea Brewery had introduced Nine Elms Mild (o.g. 1038-42) at 76p a pint. The advert concluded: "Lit by gas — we don't close during power cuts!"

The Argyll Arms, W1 was one of only two southern pubs among the six winners of the Pub Preservation Group's annual awards. The other was in Weybridge; both were Nicholson's pubs.

FIVE YEARS AGO, green featured on both covers of the February 1990 issue, and was also used on five other pages. The front cover bore the logo of the first Battersea Beer Exhibition — the Power Station with handpumps instead of chimneys. Details were in the content; and the Fuller's

Chiswick Bitter beermat with the splash "Fullers Chiswick Trail Card enclosed". This referred to the centre spread, a successor to the Fuller's passport, with space for stamps at 71 outlets of Chiswick — the prizes for those completing it were a special Passport Jug with two mugs for the first 200 and, thereafter, a "Fullers Goodie Bag full of gifts," the content of which was not stated. Six months were allowed for completion.


In his Editorial, Chris reflected on the content of a glass of beer, following an illness where certain substances were ruled out — but not beer.

Shepherd Neame had launched Bishop's Finger on draught, o.g. 1051-5, ABV 5.4.

Ken Hubberd, of the Nottingham Branch, contributed "The New York Beer Scene", and Alma Books had just published "The Best Pubs in London" by Roger Protz. Finally, the back cover announced the forthcoming LD Beer Festival, whose predecessor was mentioned earlier in this article.

LORD NELSON STANHOPE STREET, NW1

This is a rather splendid looking hostelry which for the last sixty years has been called the Lord Nelson in commemoration of one of England's great old naval heroes of the 1700's. Raised in 1803 and rebuilt in 1899 and thus becoming a part of the Charrington empire, but is now run as a free house serving a good range of real ales together with an excellent range of good bar meals well as snacks.

The fayre includes an excellent selection of



sandwiches in the door-step style presently retailing at £1.80. "Nelson's Breakfast" is a good and popular seller. The menu sports a full range of hot main courses as well. The prices of which are in the range of £2.50-£2.70. Seasonal prices also apply depending on what the markets offer for their produce.

The bar is decorated in battle scenes, SANTA CRUZ, SEPTEMBER 1797 TRAFALGER 1805 and is reflected in the facade of the building itself.

During 1995 Fuller Smith & Turner P.L.C. will be celebrating their 150th anniversary. They are delighted to be able to announce that the celebrations will be officially launched by HRH Prince Charles the Prince of Wales during a visit to the Griffin Brewery at the beginning of February.

There will be countless other special events taking place for both Fuller's staff and their customers throughout the year with 20th to 28th May being designated **150th Week** when a number of special promotions, including a Pub Trail, will be running in all of Fuller's pubs and shops.

Fuller's 1845, a new bottled beer (abv 6.3%) based on an original recipe from that time, will become available in March and there will also be a new range of 150th promotional merchandise including T-Shirts, Rugby Shirts, Beer Mats, Bar Towels, Pens, Mugs, Polo Shirts and Baseball Hats. All of these items will be available from the Griffin Brewery.

Although beer has been brewed on the site of the Griffin Brewery in Chiswick for over 325 years, it was not until the early part of the nineteenth century that the first Fuller became involved in the brewing industry.

At this time the brewery was in some financial difficulty and the then owners Douglas and Henry Thompson and Philip Wood approached John Fuller of Neston Park, Wiltshire to see if he would inject some much needed capital into the business. In 1829 he agreed and joined the enterprise, but the partnership proved a difficult one and in 1841 Douglas Thompson fled to France to flee his debtors and the partnership was dissolved.

It soon became apparent that it was impossible for one man to run a brewery of that size alone, so in 1845 John Fuller's son, John Bird Fuller, was joined by Henry Smith from the Romford Brewery of Ind & Smith and his brother-in-law, their Head Brewer, John Turner, thereby forming Fuller Smith & Turner as it is known today.

Since that date the Griffin Brewery has gone from strength to strength and descendants of those first partners are still heavily involved in the day to day running of the Company.

If you are interested in finding out more about Fuller's history a book called "London Pride – 150 Years of Fuller Smith & Turner 1845-1995" was commissioned last year and is now available from the Marketing Department at the Griffin Brewery priced £6.99 + £1.50 P&P (please allow 28 days for delivery).
