EDITORIAL

Begorrah, bejasus and Top o' the Mornin' to ye - and that is about as authentic a piece of Irish as my topic this month; the new wave of "Irish" Pubs that has recently appeared across London.

I am fascinated by the number of London pubs which have recently adopted an Irish theme. It isn't just Taylor Walker and its Scruffy Murphys establishments, they are all at it! The new Fullers pub, P Shannon & Sons, in Putney is one, Greene King are refurbishing the former Three Stags in Lambeth North as another and even well-known pubs such as Graftons in Strutton Ground where the Goon Show originated have gone that way. I wonder what Irish citizen Spike Milligan thinks of that? And where is it leading us?

It is not my intention to criticise individual pubs or their managements as, from what I have seen, most of these pubs have had a lot of money spent on them and are perfectly decent drinking places. Similarly I am in no way questioning the very professional and often colourful contribution that Irish publicans make to London's pub scene. I also am a great fan of the Irish pub, from the historic Dublin City Centre ones to the little ones out in the West.

My doubts centre on the actual notion of theme pubs in themselves. No doubt some will say that it is only a bit of fun and I am overreacting. I do not think so. There is an important point of principle here. To me, the enjoyment in visiting a pub is essentially a good pint in good company in friendly, well-run premises. Those circumstances will provide their own atmosphere. The atmosphere in a pub is not something that can be dictated by the decor and applied like a veneer at the whim of interior designers and marketing whiz-kids.

No Pub which through either or both its management and custom has an Irish influence on it is likely to lack in atmosphere and if the pub isn't an Irish pub then it really is fatuous gimmick to try to make it into one just by hanging a couple of hurling sticks and a bodhran on the wall. Indeed, might it not be an insult to a substantial part of London's drinking population to assume that their culture can be replicated in this instant manner?

This is all, of course, a fad. We have been here before to a greater or lesser degree and I wonder what the next fad will be? What will all of these expensive fixtures and fittings be ripped out in favour of two or three years

hence? Perhaps Jamaican rhum shops - almost certainly with no thought as to whether there will be any black faces on either side of the counter.

I know they have their critics because of the limitations of their beer range but there is a lot to be said for J D Wetherspoon pubs in this context. There is all the difference in the world between a good standard of neutral interior design and the sort of decor which seeks to impose a theme on the customers because presumably it is believed that those who go to pubs are such sad little people that they are incapable of enjoying their surroundings without such help.

Why can't brewers and pub chains forget the gimmicks and spend the money on keeping beer prices down, their pubs clean and simply well-decorated and their toilets properly maintained. If they are hooked on the need for building works, why not reinstate some second - if not necessarily Public - bars so that the admission of children into pubs can be properly managed. They may be pleasantly surprised by the results...

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



Following previous, mildly adverse, correspondence on the Hop Back Brewery, I thought you might be interested to know that I took a 20 strong coach party to the Downton premises on a recent Saturday. We were met by John Gilbert and Greig Futcher and were immediately offered tastings of the excellent GFB (3.5% ABV) and the Special (4.0% ABV), both of which were tiptop. This was the first brewery trip I've been on where beer preceeded the presentation!

We also saw for ourselves the list of 13 festival awards picked up so far this year mostly for Summer Lightning, GFB and Entire Stout, my personal favourite. I think most people would struggle to suggest the name of any other smallish brewer which such a good range of high quality beers.

After an interesting and informative couple of hours, we moved on to the Hop Back's tied house in Salisbury, the Wyndham Arms, now run by Steve Wright, formerly of the Sultan in South Wimbledon and well-known to many of London Drinker readers. It was difficult to leave and particularly amusing to watch the behaviour of the 'first timers' on the Summer Lightning. A magnificent day out and thoroughly recommended. Of note, I was also told that the new, one-off brew of "Rye and Coriander" (only five barrels were produced) might reappear towards the end of the year. This is a truly innovative beer!

As I say, I drink regularly at the Alexandra and have never found fault with either the beer or the service, which are both of the highest quality.

I could go on to question much of the content of your article but will merely express the view that the comments therein do nothing to enhance the credibility of your organisation which, I have always understood, exists to promote the appreciation of Real Ales and not to indulge in ill-informed gossip, and vilification of a company such as Young's – one of the leading producers of quality Real Ales. 

I am not a scientist, but common sense must suggest that stale beer on the business end of dispensers is a haven for bacteria and microorganisms of various kinds.

I would like to see "northern style" dispense practices outlawed if they can be proved unhygienic or worse; perhaps expert advice and facts will be forthcoming in following issues? I think we should be told!

Editor's Comment:

While I appreciate your concern, I think that you are almost certainly over reacting to what gathers on the end of a swan neck sparkler. I am not a bacteriologist but I am an engineer and thus do make a habit of looking at things analytically. We must not forget that the spout of every handpump (and indeed every tap used for gravity dispense) will hold a drip or two of beer which is exposed to the bacteria laden atmosphere and these drips will be the first into your glass when the pump is operated or the tap opened. So long as there is a reasonable turnover of beer through the spout then the bacteria will not have time to multiply and you will be in about as much danger of catching a dire illness off a swan neck as from the sandwich you eat with freshly washed hands. Let us not spoil our argument by overstating the case.

Let us not forget that the swan neck was only developed in the last ten years or so and if environmental health officers considered it a health hazard it would not have got into production. Where I think a much greater danger lies is with this spout being dipped into a dirty glass and getting the customers' germs back onto the spout; I therefore consider it important that if swan necks are used then a fresh glass must be used every time.

Also let us not forget what the swan neck was developed to replace the Autovac, a device which recirculated the prodigious amounts of overspill which ran over the barperson's fingers back into the beer line from the cask to the pump inlet - now there was a breeding ground for bacteria! Andy Pirson

FROM OUR ARCHIVES

FIFTEEN YEARS AGO the November 1980 issue's pink cover bore a photograph of the Courage brewery at Horsleydown with the words: "A Drinker special report COURAGE CONVICTION". This referred to the central four of its 20 pages, also printed on pink paper, chronicling that company's disastrous policy involving the closure of a number of breweries and diminishing choice for the drinker.

Within the EEC there was a proposal to bring taxes on wine and beer closer together. Effectively it seemed to mean 6p on a pint.

Vaughan Hully charted the history of Greene King Brewery, then expanding its London trade. At the time 20 pubs in the London area were selling the beers, principally Abbot.

Alan Greenwood, in his Beer Diary, then a regular feature, discussed the connection between the licensed trade, music halls and theatres (the latter automatically allowed to sell alcohol, being the only places not required to hold a Justice Liquor Licence for the purpose).

"South London Sampling" was Roger Farenden's six-pub crawl of Carshalton.

TEN YEARS AGO mid green was the theme colour for seven of the November 1985 issue's 36 pages, including both covers. The front portrayed the White Cross, Richmond, then celebrating its 150th Anniversary described in the content.

The 1986 Good Beer Guide was on sale featuring 5,000 pubs nationwide, there were 251 entries in the London area of which 111 had not been in the 1985 version. The cover price was £4.95 or £3.50 for members.

The second and final part of the history of Watney's appeared. It ended with the words: "It's been a long time since we fell out with Watneys – may it never happen again!".

"Rayment's Revisited" was a history of that brewery and crawl of some of their houses in Essex, presented by two authors under the pseudonyms of Holmes & Watson. Their most expensive pint cost 80p.

FIVE YEARS AGO the frontage of the Earl Russell, Hounslow was depicted in the continued on page 30

A latecomer was served with mild from the same barrel apparently as this had the same taste. So much for the Firkin chain.

Tim Bobbin – Adnams Extra was on and was fine following a change of barrel, we were a bit unlucky here, I think. The Broadside was not available.

Manor Arms – This Whitbread pub has Hawtons Pedigree in good form.

Surprise – Popular Youngs pub, again beers a bit on the warm side. The Dirty Dicks was getting to the end of its useful life.

Priory Arms - saved the best to last,

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everything has been said about this pub. The Woodforde's Wherry was excellent, and I gather the other beers tested were in this league.

We then braved the tube and underground home.

Our joint social with West Middlesex Branch at the Land of Liberty Heronsgate was well attended, a good selection of real ales plus Belgian beers on draught were tried by those attending making for a jolly evening.


PUBLIC BARS IN THE NEWS

Regular readers of the Evening Standard will have seen an article on Tuesday 19th September relating how the public bar at the Wotton Hatch at Wotton, to the west of Dorking, a cause which they espoused, has been saved. The Wotton Hatch was recently transferred from Fullers to Bass and the public bar was destined to go when the pub is refurbished. However, following representations by the regulars including a petition to Mole Valley District Council Bass have acceded to demands and agreed to keep the public bar in the refurbishment.

However, in our own area the public bar has now gone from the Duke of Cumberland just across the road from Parsons Green on the new Kings Road, SW6. The impending loss of the public (to provide space for a food area) in this Young's pub was highlighted some months ago in our letters pages by regular correspondent Stephen Fothergill. We are not sure how big the support for the public at the Duke of Cumberland was but it did not benefit from an article in the Evening Standard.

On the other hand, it should be remembered that when the regulars have made representations to Youngs public bars have been saved. The partition between the two bars was kept (though not the price differential) when the Hare & Hounds in East Sheen, SW13 was refurbished a couple of years ago and Youngs have also agreed to maintain the public bar in the Popes Grotto in Twickenham when this is extended into an hotel (though this scheme seems to have been put on ice for an indefinite period).

CAMRA SLAMS BODDINGTONS TAKEOVER

The Greenalls Pub company is to acquire Boddingtons Pub Company. This will create a giant retailer with 2,370 pubs.

CAMRA has condemned the move, saying that:

It will reduce local competition between Greenalls and Boddingtons pubs in the NorthWest. Customers will lose out.

It shows the failure of Boddington Pub Co and its abandoning of its heritage as a regional brewery. Far from being a trailblazer, Boddingtons has simply lost its identity.

The administrative benefits of the merger are grossly exaggerated.

The merger of the two companies' wholesaling businesses might also prove anticompetitive.

CAMRA also points to the irony that if either company still owned a brewery, they would be subject to different rules.

"This shows the flaw in the 1989 Beer Orders, which limited the number of pubs a brewer could own, but put no limits on non-brewing chains," said CAMRA Campaigns Manager Stephen Cox.

"We will see a mad rush towards size for the sake of it, both in brewing, and in pub retailing. The customer and the tenant do not benefit."

BELFAST BEER FESTIVAL

Real Ale is hard to find in Northern Ireland where the beer business is dominated by a "Big Two" (as in Scotland) except that in this case Bass are partnered by Guinness; Hilden being the only micro-brewer. The holding of CAMRA's 1st Belfast Beer Festival in mid-September really was a case of David taking on Goliath. The three-day festival was a sellout success despite additional supplies of beer being brought in on the second day! This startling demonstration of demand for decent cask beer along with extensive press, radio and television coverage before, during and even after the event must surely pave the way for a better deal for the province's beer drinkers.

Support from British brewers was strong with Adnams/Brewers Dray, Cains, Caledonian, Maclays and S&N Theakstons

providing beer along with hand pumps, cooling equipment and personnel. S&N's repertoire included Home Bitter and very tasty it was. There were beers from England, Scotland, Wales, Northern Ireland (3) and Republic of Ireland (1) and the Beers of the Festival were Hilden Special Reserve and Black Biddie Stout from a new micro in the Republic. All beers were dispensed by hand-pump as a significant head is accepted practice but line measure glasses ensured full pints. Support also came from CAMRA members from "across the water" with England, Scotland and Wales all represented including about 10 from London branches. The Northern Ireland members turned out as a formation pint pulling team wearing festival T-shirts with "STAFF" printed on the back.

The event was best summed up by one customer who, gesturing to his glass, said to his friend "I was a bit iffy about this to start with but I've kinda took a shine to it". It is planned to run a 1996 festival so look out for details in the Drinker and get across and enjoy the beer and the "crack" next year.

Ushers have bought a number of pubs in west London of which two in Hounslow have so far been discovered (more information welcome). More Wychwood pubs are reported. A comprehensive survey of Sam Smith pubs has revealed that 13 out of the 27 in Greater london no longer sell real ale and the remaining 14 sell only one beer, Museum Ale having been withdrawn. Cross referencing to the new North London guide has been postponed until next month to allow a list of updates, errors and omissions to be compiled.

COOKING WITH BEER

Once again it's time to pinch another idea from the pen of CCC Leisure. This time we have BEEF IN ALE which is intended to produce four servings and should be served with dumplings. Use your own recipe (or your mum's) for those.

INGREDIENTS:

11/2 lbs stewing steak

11/2 oz plain flour

1/2 teaspoon ground nutmeg

I teaspoon mustard powder

Salt and pepper

4 tablespoons oil

1 sliced onion

3/4 pint strong ale

1/2 pint beef stock

2 bay leaves

2 sprigs thyme

1 teaspoon brown sugar

2 carrots thick sliced

2 parsnips thick sliced

2 leeks thick sliced

METHOD:

Mix together the flour, nutmeg, mustard and seasoning. Roll the meat in the mixture, coating it thoroughly. Heat the oil in a heavy based pan, add the onion and cook for 3 minutes. Add the beef and cook for 4/5 minutes until it is "sealed". Add the ale and stock, stir and bring slowly to the boil. Add the bay leaves, thyme and sugar. Cover the pan and cook over a low heat for 1 hour, stirring occasionaley (sic). Add the vegetables and cook for a further 30 minutes. Don't forget your dumplings; put these into the stew for the last 20 minutes of the cooking time.



CAMRA CONDEMNS WARRINGTON BREWERY CLOSURE

CAMRA has condemned the proposed closure of the Tetley Walker brewery in Warrington, and has promised a campaign against the closure.

"This brewery produces no less than sixteen different real ales, six of them milds. We believe that closure will inevitably lead to some beers disappearing – in the medium to longer term," said CAMRA Campaigns Manager Stephen Cox.

"Warrington is one of the largest cask beer breweries in the country. As cask beer sales are actually rising, blaming falling beer sales is not really an explanation."

Warrington brews for the Greenalls pub chain. "It is a matter of record that the taste of Shipstones and Davenports beers altered when brewed in Burton-on-Trent, and Greenalls wanted these beers brought back to Warrington. Now they are being shipped back to Burton. This could finish them off. Davenports has now been brewed in four different locations in seven years."

"Will the Peter Walker name disappear from Merseyside?"

This could end hundreds of years of brewing tradition in Warrington, and represent another downward turn in the industry.

These proposals, along with other changes, mean over five hundred job losses across the whole of Carlsberg Tetley.


