EDITORIAL

In common with other London branches of CAMRA, my own Branch is embarking on the long road to produce a local beer guide for our area (SW London). In our case, it is 8 years since our last effort and as I have been designated to survey a couple of postal districts I looked forward to a few bevies with some mates in strange pubs which I would usually pass by 'en route' to one of my regular haunts. I took with me a copy of the old guide for a reference and took the plunge into my own SW2.

What I found lurking there shocked and depressed me. Not only were some pubs unchanged from their previous poor state, but others had positively disintegrated not only in the fabric of the building, but in the state of the bars and toilets. This has never been an area blessed with much real ale either, so it proved to be a sobering experience in more ways than one! Most, if not all of the pubs visited belonged to the big six breweries and judging by their estate in this part of London, their actions, or non actions to be more precise, has been wilful and vindictive.

Many of these pubs have few customers and such a turnover of managers/tenants that they are just waiting for closure. The cross-channel smugglers have obviously hit the area hard and prices in the pubs are expensive by comparison. Some have tried to retaliate by having a 'happy hour' when some beers are reduced and others offer bog-standard beer at £1 a pint. This seems to have had short term gains, but with the standard of facilities at such a low level it is understandable why customers prefer to drink at home.

For the draught beer drinker like me, the position is hopeless. I don't like English Draught Guinness or Lagers, bottled Guinness is now all keg so I am reduced to soft drinks or tentative halves of what is laughingly described as real beer in these establishments.

Insipid near-beers like Websters, Ruddles, Flowers, Worthington Best, Charrington IPA and the once great Draught Bass are offered to the unwary visitor while the locals stick to lager, Guinness of the optics. When nobody else in sight is drinking real beer it is probably because they know better, especially the landlord!

We have been sold the most diabolical concoctions masquerading as real beer. Most of these are drinkable if kept in peak condition, but, although there were about six pubs where this was the case, the others offered warm, cloudy slops at 90p or so a half, which is an insult. I always try to think of the best of people and be positive in my criticisms, but this was soon blown away after some of these offerings. My colleagues in other areas, especially in the East London and City branch suffer more than we do and there must be some desperate pubs in North London, but at least we who live in S W London, don't have far to travel to the nearest Young's pub, where the landlords at least make an effort to keep draught beer as it should be kept.

The big brewers must have lost all interest in their tied estate in some parts of London, and all they can think of is to off load them onto equally dubious pub-chains who lack the financial muscle of the brewers and who are often out for a fast buck themselves in a short time, before they sell them on again.

It is no only quality draught beer that is under threat, it is the London pub itself!





LETTERS TO THE EDITORS

Dear Editors,

Having browsed through your Dec/Jan issue, I particularly noticed your comments on the Magic Pub Company. May I give you one example of what Mr. Canon has done for us.

Myself and my partner, were employed by The Pub Trading Company for Chef and Brewer, and we moved into the 'Flintgate' on March 28th 1994. The pub was in such a sad state, it had been badly neglected and had adopted a bad reputation due to mismanagement. We worked exceedingly hard to clean the pub and try to prove that things were looking up. However, our efforts were fruitless as the pub's decor was so appalling, the public wouldn't set foot in the door.

Albeit, we had a small clientele with a lot of faith. At that time we sold Websters Yorkshire Bitter and Courage Best, but sales were so bad on real ale, we were struggling to keep the beer in good condition. It was considered a lager house.

On June 20th 1994, it was announced that the new owners were The Magic Pub Co. This was followed by introductions and presentations, in order that we could learn about the Company's intentions.

On November 1st 1994, 'The Flintgate' commenced its long awaited refurbishment and the pub was renamed to try to change its bad image. The Pickled Newt seemed a bit horrifying at the time, but it was better than 'Orange Kipper'! So we were happy.

The refurbishment took a team of 30 men approximately 4 hours and about two weeks thereafter doing the kitchen and any snagging.

During all of this we were still open as usual. The Pickled Newt is now one of the busiest pubs in Weybridge. Our takings are 8 times more than they ever were. We have an excellent menu and are now selling in good quantity — Old Speckled Hen, Theakstons, Bass, Boddingtons and Websters Green Label.

So in conclusion, whether you be Pickled, Cross Eyed, Rat and Carrot and Hungry as a Horse, don't be bitter, Mr Canon certainly knows his stuff!


Since the middle of February, West London brewer, Fuller, Smith & Turner has been offering something different to its customers, India Pale Ale. Fuller's previously produced an India Pale Ale at the turn of the

century on which the current recipe is based, although the alcohol content has been somewhat reduced – from 7.32 to 4.8%!

India Pale Ale was first brewed in Burton-on-Trent in 1822 and was so named because it was in the Indian Empire that it found its market.

The ale sent to India was heavily hopped and brewed to a high gravity so that it could slowly ferment throughout the long journey reaching the peak of its condition as it arrived.

Like its early nineteenth century predecessor, Fuller's 1995 India Pale Ale is a pale amber colour and an all malt brew with a distinctive, pleasant bitterness, originating from

the Kentish Goldings Hops. This exciting new beer is supported by a selection of stylish new Point of Sale Material.

India Pale Ale is the latest seasonal beer brewed by Fuller's to keep up with the demand for guest ales in its pubs and will be available until the end of April from the majority of its houses at around £1.77 per pint. It follows on from the success of their winter draught, Mr Harry and precedes the "Mild Month of May" brew, Hock and the summer special, Summer Ale.

Dave and Deborah have always been very supportive to us in our activities, especially when we were forced to change the venue of our beer festival from the Borough Halls in Greenwich to the Lewisham theatre in Catford. They run an excellent pub serving top quality Shepherd Neame beers in a friendly and comfortable atmosphere, and thoroughly deserve the award."

After being presented with the award, a framed certificate, David Head said, "Real Ale, Real People, Real Hard work; thats what it takes to be the best in London. We are really proud to have received this prestigious award, and are grateful to CAMRA for recognising our hard work and commitment to real ale."

BOOK REVIEW BEXLEY PUBS

I have been sent a copy of the above publication for review and I have found it to be a fascinating area. It is published by Bexley Libraries and Museums and is compiled by one James Packer who has visited all 8 pubs in what he describes as 'field' research after the monthly meetings of the Erith & Belvedere Local History Society, so he is well placed to produce such a volume.

This is a beautifully bound book and it is laid out in parish areas of Bexley. Most of the pubs are illustrated, either with old photos or engravings and a brief history is given of each, though frustrating, the beers only get a historical mention on the odd occasion and no current beers are mentioned for the pubs, so this is not a pub guide as such, but, nevertheless, it is well worth getting hold of a copy if you are interested in the traditions of the English Pub.

The guide can be obtained from Bexley Libraries and Museums, London Borough of Bexley, so a letter to the above should elicit further details of how to obtain it.

GRAND MET CHIEFS RUN THE GAUNTLET

Lord Sheppard, the Grand Métropolitan chairman, was attacked by angry shareholders yesterday about his £1.34 million pay and share options package last year.

Together with his deputy, Richard Giordano, who also heads the remuneration committee, he faced a barrage of questions from small shareholders at the annual general meeting at the Grosvenor House Hotel in London's Park Lane. They contrasted the level of directors' pay with the dismal share-price performance of the food and drink group, which has highly successful brands like Haagen-Daz, Burger King and Smirnoff.

In addition to his near £930,000 remuneration, Lord Sheppard made a £415,000 profit from the exercise of share options. Seven other directors exercised options worth about £4 million in total and chief executive George Bull topped up a basic £400,000 salary with a £105,000 performance-related bonus payment.

"The only value we seem to have been adding to GrandMet over the past few years is to directors' pay packets," one shareholder argued.

Another, John Archer, said that Lord Sheppard's pay was in excess of £900,000 before the exercise of options and said: "Pay at this level is obscene. It's greed taken to the ultimate." One questioned the supplementary option arrangements that would allow options to be granted to executives when their current holding reached four times salary limit.

"It's a scheme designed to give directors more jam tomorrow," said one disgruntled member of the audience.

Mr Giordano, defended the option arrangements, saying the new scheme would avoid the "revolving door" of directors exercising existing options for short-term gain and then being granted new shares straight away. He said: "The effect of the new scheme will be to keep directors at risk with their existing options for much longer periods."

He defended directors' salaries, saying that pay was related to the size and complexity of the task ahead.

To loud applause, Lord Sheppard said he would "resign here and now if he could not recruit the best executives that the market had to offer".

Then he added: "As a mark of my confidence in GrandMet and its future, 99 per cent of my personal wealth is invested in the company. If GrandMet goes bust...so do I!"

He explained GrandMet's poor share price performance by saying the City had "misunderstood" the group's long-term strategy to build brands and refocus the business.

The shares stood at a peak of 518p three years ago but yesterday stood at 383p. Had they managed to keep up with the FTSE index of leading shares they would have been worth 450p.

PUBS WITH A HEART

A tiny pub that stages charity concerts in front of full houses at the London Palladium – and has even booked New York's Carnegie Hall – has won the second annual Pubs with a Heart award.

Customers and staff from the Black Horse at Addlestone, Surrey, performed excerpts from their next Palladium sell-out when they received their award at a ceremony at the Palladium.

The concerts – which began modestly with a karaoke night at the pub five years ago – have raised tens of thousands of pounds for charity, most of it to provide two £17,000 incubators at St Peter's Hospital, Weybridge.

Licensees Barry and Christ Stoakes – spurred on by the memory of losing one of their own children in 1987 – hit on the idea of hiring the Palladium after local theates in Woking and Guildford proved too small.

Barry, who produced the shows with a cast consisting mainly of pub regulars, said: "We first appeared at the Palladium in 1992\93, the week after Jack Jones topped the bill. He didn't fill the threatre but we sold every one of the 2.700 tickets available.

"We then booked Carnegie Hall and struck a deal with British Airways to charter seven Jumbo jets to fly the cast and customers there and back at £99 a head. We pulled out only when we were told of the prohibitive cost of the planes being grounded in New York if the weather turned bad."

The Pubs with a Heart awards are organised by the Association of London Brewers and Licensed Retailers to give recognition to the huge amount of charity work carried out by pubs and their customers in London area.

The association's chairman, Anthony Fuller, said it has been estimated that pubs in and around London raise more than £2 million for charity each year.

HIDDEN GEMS - No. 1 THE WENLOCK ARMS, N1

Danny Blyth starts a new series on London's hidden gems – those cracking pubs you'll find by going just a little out of your way ...

The Wenlock is a superb, traditional free house run by three life members of CAMRA who have put their money where their hearts lie.

A year back the three pooled their available cash and took the plunge to buy the Wenlock Arms, Wenlock Road, London N1, a mere four minute walk from Old Street tube.

It was a bold move. While Robin (38) had five years experience of running a pub, Will (50) and Steve (39), brought just experience of skills gained at various CAMRA beer festivals. But all three share a passionate interest in real ale.

Says Will: "We knew that running a pub was hard work over long hours – we had no illusions about that – but until you've actually done it yourself you cannot appreciate how demanding it is."

Says Will: "We have little passing trade and there's heavy unemployment around here, so we've had to battle to win business. The real ale afficionados aren't enough, so we've had to work hard with our locals and regulars, getting them into the real stuff.

"It has been a real joy seeing people turn away from their usual Fosters and Courage Best on to beers they have never even dreamed of.

"We have to keep things lively too, like regular jazz sessions on Sundays. We also ran a very successful cider festival last year, which brought in 350 visitors specially. Fresh, traditional cider and perry are available at all times."

The upstairs function room is increasingly busy too, hosting events as 'diverse' as psychology lectures and beer tasting seminars by Dr Keith Thomas of Brewlab. It is also a regular venue for CAMRA meetings.

It is the real ales that are the main draw. The lads keep a changing range of five. A typical line up would be Batemans Mild, Deuchars IPA, Tomintoul and Reckless Eric. The one regular however, and perhaps surprisingly given the pro-CAMRA nature management, is a national brand, Tetley Bitter.

According to Will, "people in a local community pub like this feel comfortable with a beer they recognise straight away from TV and that's why we have Tetley. Selling it at £1.35 a pint in as good a nick as you'll find in Leeds has meant it is a regular success."

And true to their CAMRA principles, the Wenlock only serves its ales into over-size glasses. Any ullage from pouring is promptly disposed of down the sink in full view of customers. "It's just vital that we practice what we preach around here," says Steve, who specialises in the cellar management at the Wenlock.

"We choose our ales and suppliers carefully. We are supplied direct by people like Nethergate and Reckless Eric and the beers are ideal. From wholesalers we prefer ales from brewers with a reputation for quality, like Harveys and Hop Back."

Food at the Wenlock is quality, simple snacks with the emphasis on good value. Biggest seller is the salt beef sandwich with

gherkins and home-made mustard (£2) and pasties direct from Cornwall (£1.50). Also very popular is bacon and egg sandwiches (three rashers and two eggs at £2). And you can order a snack at any time during opening.

As to the future, Will feels that continuing to make time to socialise with customers is the key, "What is needed for pubs like ours is to set ourselves as far apart from the pub chains as possible. They lack the personal touch."

Pub chain staff will welcome you, establish eye contact inside the regulation twenty seconds, serve you with exactly what you want – then depart. They will repeat this 100 times an hour but with no real contact with the customer. They are becoming the McDonalds of the pub world – I even know of one chain where the staff have been instructed to avoid getting to know customers.

"Meanwhile, we'll continue to be a real traditional British pub, a friendly place where people can come to meet people and talk. When the pub loses that, it really will be time for us all to pack up."

CAMRA WELCOMES COURAGE GUEST BEER RULING

Courage have agreed to amend their policy on guest beers, which small brewers claimed was shutting them out of the market. The Office of Fair Trading intervened, following complaints from CAMRA and small brewers.

The specific complaint addressed by the OFT was South Yorkshire Brewery in Barnsley. However CAMRA believes the problem is much more widespread.

CAMRA warmly welcomed the news of the Courage decision. "This should strengthen the hand of tenants who want to take a genuine guest beer from a small brewery." said CAMRA Campaigns Manager Stephen Cox. "It should mean a wider choice of more interesting guest beers."

"The OFT were right to intervene, as in CAMRA's opinion, the Courage policy contravened the guest beer legislation."

It appears that discounts on various products would be removed if the tenant chose to take a guest beer from an outside supplier. CAMRA believes such a policy could breach the 1989 Beer Orders (the guest beer legislation) which seeks to prevent such discrimination. Clearly, very few tenants will stock guest beers if by doing so they receive worse terms on a whole range of other products.

CAMRA urges smaller brewers, tenants and drinkers to forward similar cases to the OFT, which has shown itself willing to act on such complaints.

LOCAL BEER NOW ON SALE IN SWEDEN!

Local independent family brewers KING & BARNES are very excited to have sent their first shipment of beer to Sweden as part of an export drive that has been developed over the last twelve months.

Two of King & Barnes' beers, namely Bottle-Conditioned Festive and Bottle-Conditioned Old Porter have been developed with the export trade in mind, as this bottling method lends itself to long storage with the beer actually improving with age!

Just prior to loading the first 40 foot

container bound for Sweden with Bottle-Conditioned Old Porter, Bill King, Managing Director of the Horsham Brewery, said "Over the last year we have been developing various contacts throughout the World in order to find new markets for our fine Sussex Ales. The container of beer bound for Sweden is our first major export order. A further container carrying Bottle-Conditioned Festive will be despatched shortly, followed by a shipment to the U.S.A.

"Given the static nature of off-trade sales in the U.K. and the severe damage being inflicted on the trade by illegal imports from France, we see the export trade as an important additional source of revenue. It is also very gratifying to know that other countries will have the opportunity to taste traditional English beers brewed in Sussex."

Over the last few months, King & Barnes have also despatched beer to Canada, Australia, France and St. Petersburg in Russia.

RICHMOND & HOUNSLOW NEWS

There is little to report on the pub scene this month. In Brentford, Labatts Retail have taken over the Windmill. Feltham has yet to see the opening of the Wetherspoon pub on the site of the Cricketers, but this may have taken place by the time you read this.

In Hounslow, it is reported that the Magic Pub Co have reopened Ruby Tuesday (originally the Honeycomb) on Staines Road and renamed it the Hungry Horse. As a result Wellington's Hungry Horse has reverted to the Duke of Wellington.

Finally, as the new guide to pubs in West London nears publication, work is starting on the new edition of the South West London guide. Please contact your local branch if you are willing to help with pub surveys.





MAC ATTACKS IN THE CAPITAL

LONDON is about to get its third regional brewery, complete with tied estate.

But while Young's and Fuller's are well into three figures with their estates, McDonnell's has just five pubs, all in south-east London.

Free trader John McDonnell used to brew at his headquarters pub, McDonnell's in Charlton, on plant inherited from the old Chudley's brewery, and Sledgehammer was very well-respected in the area.

Brewing stopped because of persistent production problems. But now he has five pubs in an area he describes as a real ale desert, Mr McDonnell has decided to start again and is looking for a brewer.


"The market has changed since I stopped brewing and there is definitely a great opportunity now," he said.

Apart from McDonnell's itself, his miniempire includes the Village Blacksmith in Woolwich, once owned by CAMRA Investments, the Prince Albert in Woolwich which regularly has 14 real ales on tap, the Cooper's Arms in Charlton, another ex-Midsummer Inns pub, and the Duke of Edinburgh in Lee Green.

The new brewery should produce up to 30 barrels a week but Mr McDonnell promises not to stop stocking guests from other micros in his pubs.

On the far side of the capital, the Fishery Inn overlooking the reservoir at Elstree has also got its brewery back.

The pub is owned by building group McNicolas, whose head office is nearby. It had its own brewery until 1960, when Benskin's bought it and closed it down.

FROM OUR ARCHIVES

FIFTEEN YEARS AGO the outer cover of the 20 page London Drinker was printed on pink paper. On the back was a list of outlets for the magazine at that time, 25 pubs and 8 off-licences. On the front was a photograph of the Express Hotel, Kew Bridge. Underneath were the phrases "Tramshed to close?", "Forward with the Ram" and "Merton Crawl". Dealing with these in order before the rest of the content: The Tramshed in Woolwich, a former electricity generating station for trams, was a theatre with free house bar and was under threat of demolition. The last I heard, it was still going strong. The Ram obviously referred to Young's, whose history, brewery and policy were described by Gaeron Davies. Lawrie Bishop outlined a crawl of Merton, visiting 8 pubs including the Nelson, which he described as one of the cheapest pubs in London, Charring IPA was 39p and Bass 40p in the public bar, 1p more each in the saloon.

Doug Bateman contributed his final article on naturally-conditioned bottled beers, in this case from independent breweries, which were none too easy to find.

King & Barnes had their first regular London outlet (rather than just as a "guest" beer) in the form of their bitter at the Ship in Croydon, priced at 44p a pint. Another beer originating in the same county was John Frailpool's Haywards Heath Bitter, o.g. 1043, available at one pub each in Cricklewood and Wanstead at 35p.

TEN YEARS AGO, seven of the 28 pages of the April 1985 edition used blue as the second colour. The back cover consisted of a full page advert for Kingston & Leatherhead Branch's 5th Beer Festival, under the grandstand of Sandown Park Racecourse. The front cover bore a photograph of the Old East Hill (now the Slug & Lettuce) in Wandsworth. If you have a copy of this edition, it is unique, as no two of the 4,500 issued were identical, due to a series of oversights. It was not realised until the end of the printing process that the date of the 9th Capital Beernight - in the City Pride, EC1 – had been omitted. At short notice labels were prepared in the school resources room, and a rubber stamper kit was purchased and assembled with the necessary information. Terry Hewitt, then London Treasurer, drove

the copies from the printer's to the house of a friend in Brixton, where a hastily-assembled workforce including four kids aged between 5 and 13 endorsed each cover in less than an hour. It cost CAMRA a fair bit in Cokes, crisps and beer as appropriate, but was worth the effort judging by the success of the event. From then onwards I made it my custom to read through each and every printer's plate before authorising a print run, and on occasions made last-minute correction by hand; even then errors still crept in!

The Editorial argued in favour of flexi-hours, which came in just over three years later.

"Compare.... Contrast.... Confused?" reprinted two conflicting press articles, one from the South London Press, the other from the Morning Advertise a week later, saying respectively that a particular landlord had, and had not, banned politics from his pub. Each had a quotation from the gentleman, a few words of each being "I am anti anything political in my pub" and "Politics are not banned here".

Not that London Drinker is above disseminating misinformation in a good cause. This being the April issue, it informed readers that Newton & Ridley's Best Bitter was to become available in London, and reproduced a beermat of that non-existent company. I am given to understand that handpumps are now in use in the fictional but nonetheless solid Rover's Return. In the same vein was a review of the spurious Crudgington's Brewery, complete with reproductions of the logos of Dogsbreath Ale and Crudgington Export. Also appearing were equally dubious adverts for a dandelion lager, and "Real Ale in Thamesmead", which didn't exist and then had no need to do so.

Opposite the two latter was a monumental howler, but unintentional – honest! And it wasn't even the printer's fault. When the map was prepared for the second part of "A Terminal Case" – Merton's Historicrawl of London's main stations – a mistake was made with the numbering and each location was one out' as a result London Bridge was shown in Victoria's location some miles to the west, while Waterloo appeared to the eastward where the former should be. It led to some leg-pulling at an Editorial get-

together. To misquote from a pop chart of long ago – *I know*, *I was that cartographer*.

"Country Drinker" gave a history of the Bat & Ball in the depths of West Sussex, where the then landlord had lived for 75 years. An enlarged framed copy of the article featured in the bar when I visited it last October.

"Wanstead Flats Walkabout" described a crawl planned for later in the month by East London & City Branch in that area, visiting a total of 8 pubs in E7, E11 and E12, and helpfully, if optimistically, quoting departure times from each. R.M.Rider provided another "Liquid Lunch", visiting 4 pubs in Whitehall.

FIVE YEARS AGO the 32 page issue used red as second colour for eight pages including both covers. The front panel, and also the whole of the back, bore the logo and information for the third Beer on Broadway beer festival in Ealing Town Hall; further details were included in the content. The resident gremlin printed the volume number as 14 – rather than 12. The casual reader should have been made wary by the date of the issue, printed as 1st April 1990 rather than just the month. They might otherwise have been tempted to search our Blitzkrieg ME 109, described as a full page advert as "A harmfully strong Traditional Ale," allegedly produced by Dr. O'Reilly's Beer and Agrochemicals Ltd. In the same vein, potential drinkers might, if unaverted, have tried to be in at the Newgate Bar's opening on St. Paul's Thameslink Station. As the station was not due to open for 3 weeks after the stated date – (April 1st, when else?) it would have been impossible to obtain the products of the Metropolitan District Brewery, supposedly installed in a tunnel under Smithfield Market and using an old steam locomotive as the source of power.

Bruce's Brewery (by then over a year into new ownership) was about to launch a new ale, "Golden Glory", o.g. 1047. There was to be a competition on the day at the Ferret & Firkin, the prize being a day's brewing and 9 free gallon of the winner's Brew.

In an entry to the London Drinker's Writers' Competition, that inveterate correspondent Keith Flett presented "Six Ways to a More Social Pub", covering as his topics Opening Hours, Food, Smoking, Games, Music and Children, I think his views are best summed up by one of his own points:

"Public houses should be social venues, not part of a grand marketing strategy."

Idle Moments featured the usual numbers and brewery anagram puzzles, as well as the solution to the previous month's variation on the latter theme, "A MAD PROSE", which unscrambled as "MA PARDOES". It turns out that my surmise was correct at the last issue, that the opening words "TURN MARTIN RED – HE'S FULL" was a joke on me – it translates into "FULLER, SMITH AND TURNER". Now here's a rhetorical question – if Chris Cobbold gets a free pint when he announces my name in a Tolly pub, how come I don't in houses of the previously mentioned company, or, for that matter, those of my northern namesakes Sam and John?

"Eagle Eyed" presented "Drinking in Oxted", visiting four pubs in the village.

A Capital Beer Night (un-numbered, as I guess there was no point at that stage) was announced for the Plough, WC1 – the advert was the only admission ticket.

That more or less wraps things up for now. Cheers!

NEWS FROM YOUNG'S BREWERY

A Government Minister was the target of a blistering attach by a group of Britain's leading independent brewery chairmen, angry over threats to the future of the brewing industry posed by the high level of duty on beer.

The Paymaster General, David Heathcoat-Amory—whose portfolio includes Customs and Excise—met five chairmen and six other directors from breweries all over England when he visited Young's Brewery in south London.

The brewers — all members of the Independent Family Brewers of Britain, which has 38 member companies — are protesting that the duty on British beer is seven fimes higher than in France and that Britain's brewing industry contributes more in excise duty than brewers in all the other European Union countries put together.

They are concerned about what has become a flood of illegal imports of beer from the Continent.

Peter Robinson, chairman of Robinson's Brewery of Stockport, Greater Manchester, told Mr Heath-coat-Amory that vans were going back and forward across the Channel every day. Their cargoes of bootlegged beer were transferred to lorries and distributed all over Britain.

Patrick Read, Managing Director of Youngs, who claimed that 600 vans a day were now carrying bootlegged beer across the Channel, appealed to the Paymaster General to help bring about a cut in British rates of duty.

"It's naive to expect the French to increase duty," he said. "The French brewers are having a ball selling beer to Britain."

Anthony Fuller, chairman of Fuller, Smith and Turner of west London and Chairman of Independent Family Brewers of Britain, said the criminal underworld had become involved in the British drinks industry for the first time.

"We, as small brewers, are reliant on sales through our traditional pubs," he added, "If things are not sorted out soon, we are going to see a decline in small brewers."

David McMullen, chairman of McMullen of Hertford, reported that sales in pubs nationally were down 27 per cent since the Conservatives had been in power. People in the industry were getting restless, he said.

Christopher Pope, chairman of Dorchester-based Eldridge Pope, spoke of his admiration for much of what the Government had achieved.

"But as a natural Conservative," he continued, "what bothers me the most is that a new crime has been invented by the party that claims to want to combat crime. The Customs and Excise have a thoroughly unenviable job in trying to police the situation."

Mr Heathcoat-Amory reminded the brewery directors that the level of duty on beer in Britain "far predates the single market" and said the Government faced a difficult task in trying to put things right.

"We held duty last year as long as we could, until a hole was knocked in the Chancellor's Budget," he said, referring to Conservative backbenchers who had voted against the Government's plans to increase VAT on fuel, "We are now working hard to reconcile the figures,"



"The Sorcerer", a new seasonal cask ale is to be introduced by East Anglian brewers Greene King. "The Sorcerer" has an ABV of 4.5% and will be available to the regional brewers' own estate of 900 pubs, as well as to a further 2,500 free houses.



OFFICE OF FAIR TRADING REVIEW OF THE TIE

The Office of Fair Trading is launching a review of the tie, at the request of the European Commission. This comes out of the investigation into Inntrepeneur, which has been running in Brussels for years.

They will pay particular attention to the package of rent and beer prices paid by tied tenants to see if this disadvantages them compared with free trade customers

Hopefully this will provide some useful constraints on the larger companies to bleed their pubs dry, and some more sense on discounting into the free trade.

We want the enquiry to take a broad view on beer choice, not concentrate purely on tenancy prices. It might help tenants if the OFT decide that they should be allowed to buy their tied national brands from wholesalers – but that wouldn't improve choice!

MAYONNAISE

Next time you visit your local theme pub, keep an eye open for Tony O'Rourke. He'll be the one brandishing a piece of paper and talking excitedly to the staff about mayonnaise. Tony, a freelance TV and radio presenter from Middlesex, recently had a spot of difficulty at the Moon and Sixpence, Hatch End. An odd business. Tony had ordered a cheeseburger, only to be refused a blob of mayonnaise to go with it. Order a chickenburger, he had pointed out, and you get mayonnaise automatically. That may be so, but this was a cheeseburger. Might he pay extra for a blob of mayonnaise? No. Tony was miffed and baffled to boot. They just said, "We don't do it,' over and over again." So he wrote to the JD Wetherspoon chain for an explanation. Back came an apologetic letter saying that the relevant area manager had now been told to ensure mayonnaise was available with all meals. In future, Tony will be carrying the letter with him, just in case. And he won't be afraid to use it.

OVERNIGHT IN WANDSWORTH

Beer connoisseurs visiting Wandsworth – the home of independent brewers Youngs – can now stay overnight in a hotel offering real ale in traditional pub surroundings.

The Brewers Inn in East Hill, along the road from the Ram Brewery, is the first residential hotel in central Wandsworth for many years.

It was officially opened by the Mayor of Wandsworth, Councillor Beryl Jeffrey, who arrived on board a horse-drawn Young's dray.

The hotel has been created from the Two Brewers pub, which dates back to 1800 and was rebuilt in its present form in 1900.

The building has now been beautifully restored to its original glory and the bars refurbished in comfortable, traditional style.

In common with all Young's hotels, the bars serve a full range of traditional draught beers to provide a contrast with the stuffy cocktail bars found in many hotels.

All the bedrooms have private bathrooms and colour televisions, with prices ranging from £40 a night for a single room at weekends to £85 for two people sharing a twin or double room during the week. Children under 12 stay at the hotel free if they share with their parents.

The Brewers Inn, which is opposite Wandsworth town hall, joins three other Young's houses that have been converted into three-star hotels over the past five years — the Bridge at Greenford, Middlesex; the Crown at Chertsey, Surrey; and the Windmill on the Common at Clapham, south London.


