

EDITORIAL

Just about everywhere we turn these days we can find people giving us advice about what is good for us – or rather what isn't good for us. There seem to be so any foods that we should be avoiding these days that if we tried to follow all the advice given to us, the biggest health problem of the nation would surely be malnutrition.

Anyway, that's not quite what I sat down here to write about. The discussion topic for today is the "unit of alcohol". Do you know what it is? I don't think you do, and I'll tell you why — I don't think that there is such a thing as a "unit of alcohol". Oh, I know that the concept exists and of course the term exists — I've used it twice already but I believe its definition is severely lacking. It is supposed to be a unit, right? Well, if it is, how big is it?

Let us think about what a unit is by considering the units that we come across every day. The pound - if you buy a pound of cheese in Tesco's and a pound of cheese in Sainsbury's you have an absolute legal right to expect that the standards used in both of those shops to be identical. Likewise a litre of petrol from your local Shell garage is the same as a litre of petrol from an Esso station at the other end of the M1. They are standard units of measurement, but what is a "unit of alcohol"? They haven't even given it a name. When did you last go shopping for ten "standard weight units" of potatoes? Let us, for the fun of it, give the "unit of alcohol" a name; as it seems to be referred to mainly in terms of its effect on health let's call it the Bottomley. There. Now I can stop using the term "unit of alcohol" for the rest of this article.

Over the last couple of years my day job has seen me working on projects for two well known organisations which have very strict rules on alcohol and work because they are both public transport bodies; they are Railtrack (or British Rail as it was when I first started) and London Underground Ltd. When I started these projects I had to attend a seminar or course which related to attending work while under the influence of alcohol. The BR one was a seminar for all staff working in the office specifically about their policy on alcohol and drugs while the

Underground one was a subject covered in a more general half day course on safety. At the BR course we were given a booklet on the policy for which we had to sign a slip of paper acknowledging that we had received it and that we would follow its guidelines.

The rule at BR applies to ALL employees and contractors so a typist is governed by the same rule as a train driver. It states that if somebody signs on for work with a blood alcohol level higher than 30 milligrams per 100 millilitres they will probably be dismissed or may "get away" with a final warning and a permanent entry on their personal record. Over 80 milligrams (the limit for driving a car) and it is instant dismissal with no alternative.

The BR booklet gives advice about average blood alcohol levels for the consumption of so many "units of alcohol" (In retrospect "Bottomleys" is a bit flippant for this subject) but under the heading "What is a UNIT (their capitals) of alcohol?" they say "The following drinks contain ABOUT (MY capitals) one unit of alcohol:

A half pint of beer

A single measure of whisky

A glass of wine."

The guideline given by LUL was put differently and went like this: "Before you sign on for duty you must have drunk no alcohol in the previous eight hours and no more than seven "units of alcohol" in the previous twenty four hours." As a hard and fast rule, I suspect that this is unenforceable but I consider that it is given as a guideline that if followed will protect the employee from failing a spot check like a breath test. The training officer described a "unit of alcohol" as equivalent to "half a pint of Sainsbury's cheapest bitter not something like Guinness."

So where does this leave us? How many "units of alcohol" are there in a pint of Old Peculier – or even London Pride? I strongly suspect that the "unit of alcohol" has deliberately not been defined because even if it were, the effect of a standardised unit would be so different on different people, or even the same person under different circumstances that it would not be vary helpful.



HIDDEN GEMS – NO. 2 THE PRIORY ARMS

Make your visit a priority

Danny Blyth continues his series on London's best pubs that are a little out of the way.

The Priory Arms is well worth seeking out – and you don't have to look that far. Exit left Stockwell tube, take the first sharp left and this will bring you on to Lansdowne Way. Hey bingo you're there in two minutes.

Inside you'll find a very well appointed free house. Standards of decor, orderliness and comfort are high throughout the 140 year-old premises. It was first taken on by hosts Gary and Nicky Morris in 1985, a couple who shared a past in hotel catering. They became free of tie in 1988 and trade has improved every year since.

The Priory is the perfect place for those new to the licensed trade to visit – living proof that even though you haven't a high street site and have to battle for trade – success does come through hard work.

For Gary and Nicky this has meant long hours over many years building up a reputation for quality real ales. They have recently picked up SW London CAMRA's gong for pub-of-the-year for the second time in three years. And hadn't it been for the usual CAMRA complications when it comes to voting on anything, they'd surely have had a three-in-arow success and been allowed to keep the trophy.

Says Nicky: "There are 847 pubs in this branch area so to win the award is really pleasing. However, to win a second time really is something special."

There are usually four or five real ales on tap.

Youngs Ordinary and Special are regular features, with the others coming in from the pick of the regionals and micros from all over the UK. Says Gary: "It is often the case that the smaller the brewer, the better and more interesting is the beer."

As if that wasn't enough, there's a superb selection of Belgian, Czech and German bottled goodies, real cider and perry and Gales country wines on offer. There are even five types of both coffee and tea. German wheat beer is very popular. Sometimes the Priory can shift over four cases in a single evening. "People are going more for genuine quality in their bottled beers these days, as opposed to things like Sol and Fosters Ice and it is good to see," says Gary.

This reputation for quality, choice and hospitality is spreading. Afficionados come from as far as Enfield on the misery line to pay their homage.

Extra custom has been attracted to Gary's "theme months" during which he features the entire range of certain brewers' ales over a four-week period. Last month it was the turn of Hop Back brewery,, the previous month, the stage was shared by the ranges from Ridleys and Adnams. Future themes are to include Woodfordes over June and a small German bierfest (draught and bottled wheat, smoked beer etc. at a date to be decided.)





FULLER'S UPDATE



The arrival of the Mild Month of May heralds the welcome return to the bar of Fuller's Mild, Hock. This rich, dark and malty ale at 3.2% ABV is for sale in the majority of Fuller's pubs at around £1.43 a pint. Fuller's revived Hock in 1993 and it is now part of the exciting new range of seasonal beers that the Chiswick Brewery is producing; Mr Harry in the winter, India Pale for spring, Hock for May and Summer Ale for the balmy months. Not only does Fuller's offer the beer lover something different for every season, together with the legendary London Pride, ESB and Chiswick Bitter but 1995 also sees the arrival of the Brewery's only bottle conditioned beer, 1845 Ale, the celebration ale brewed to commemorate Fuller's 150th Anniversary. A study of Fuller's oldest Brewing Book, dated 1848, showed that a typical gravity of beer 150 years ago was about 1060°. A mild beer marked X or XX was

frequently brewed and besides pale malt, the grist included 25% of Amber Malt. All beers had high hop rates in those days and therefore even milds would be expected to have considerable bitterness. As Reg Drury, Fuller's Brewing Director explains, "In the creation of 1845 Ale I have tried to combine the biscuity flavour of the Amber Malt with a traditional hop character from Kent Goldings, the oldest variety currently grown. The result has been a bottle conditioned beer of a rich amber colour, well hopped and with an ABV of 6.3%." The beer comes in a uniquely moulded and embossed 550ml bottle and is priced at £1.65 a bottle in Fuller's Quality Wine Merchants and £2.10 a bottle in the majority of their pubs.

FROM OUR ARCHIVES

FIFTEEN YEARS AGO the light blue front cover of the 20 page May 1980 issue bore a line drawing of Arkell's Brewery in Swindon. This linked with an article entitled "Beer from the Ark", the first in a series of independent brewers who were regularly selling their beers in London. Dave Backhouse wrote about Arkell's with a history and profile of the brewery and its ales, interspersed with local dialect for various orders, and thoughtfully providing a glossary. At the time 14 London pubs were stocking their products.

"Profile of a Bishop" was about the Bishop Out of Residence, a Young's house recently opened in Kingston. On the same page was news that the local council had granted approval for building another pub next door, the Gazebo, despite opposition by the company last mentioned plus Courage and Whitbread. It is a Sam Smith's tied house.

The 1980 Good Beer Guide was on sale, priced £2.60.

"The Canonbury Circle" covered a crawl of nine pubs in that area.

The back cover bore a list of the 37 outlets of the magazine, including 11 off-licenses.

TEN YEARS AGO in May 1985 the theme colour of magenta appeared on 8 of its 28 pages, including the front cover, which featured a photograph of the Pakenham Arms, WC1, a free house, which had undergone refurbishment.

In his Editorial, Chris wrote about brewery takeovers and how in the 60s, 147 breweries had closed, 41% of the total at the beginning of that decade, which had also seen the upsurge of the Big Six. At the time it was written, a similar situation seemed about to recur.

The Pineapple, SE1, which had been a frequent venue for L.D. pickups, had just changed hands. Meanwhile, the Two Woodcocks, SW2 had been entirely refurbished and re-opened as a Conway Tavern, serving the products of the Brixton and Battersea Breweries, a fact for which I was duly grateful as it became my local the same month. David Bruce's seventh pub, the Flounder and Firkin in Holloway Road, had opened in the well-established style.

It was confirmed that, contrary to rumours previously circulating, Webster's really was being brewed at Halifax, not Mortlake or elsewhere.


In a Letter to the Editors, Ian Worden corrected two mistakes and updated one detail in Merton's "Terminal Case" the previous month. The author conceded, and presented his shortest ever contribution, just two words: "Sorry! – Merton". It was preceded by a drawing of an inverted ancient train, carrying equally inverted casks, the content of which can be easily guessed.

"Production and Reproduction", from the Editorial Team, explained the rather complicated procedure of producing, printing and distributing London Drinker. It was rather detailed and technical, and you've probably read it all before!

"Out of Town" was Chris's crawl of his favourite six pubs in Oxford.

Mild was making a minor come-back – Mitchell & Butler's Highgate Mild (o.g. 1036) had appeared in Surbiton, while Shepherd Neame's 5X had been introduced in the Royal George, Greenwich, at 82p a pint.

NEWS FROM YOUNG'S BREWERY

Youngs, the London brewers who defied airraids, bombs and black-outs to brew beer throughout the war, have launched a cutprice ale to celebrate the 50th anniversary of VE Day.

Victory Ale is available in Young's pubs, free houses and clubs from 3rd April 1995 until the end of May. It is being sold at £1.35 a pint in Young's managed houses.

The Wandsworth brewery, owned by Youngs since 1831, was hit by 14 bombs in the war, with considerable damage to buildings and barrels. But Youngs continued brewing uninterrupted and overcame petrol rationing by delivering much of their beer by horse-drawn dray.

Brewery chairman John Young, a distinguished wartime fighter pilot in the Fleet Air Arm, said: "We are very proud of the people who kept the brewery going for six difficult years during the war.


"Young's beer helped to lift the spirits both the troops and of the people who worked so hard at home to achieve victory."

The new beer is brewed at 5 per cent alcohol by volume from the finest English malt and hops and is dry-hopped in the cask.

A bottled version, along with a bottled Victory Lager, also at 5 per cent ABV, was introduced in the middle of April, with 5p from the sale of each bottle being donated to The Royal Star and Garter Home for disabled ex-service men and women at Richmond-upon-Thames, Surrey.

NEW BREW FROM CROUCH VALE

Crouch Vale have announced the introduction of Kursaal Flyer (ABV 4.5%), the first in a series of new beers brewed to celebrate different aspects of life (both past and present), in the county of Essex.

The Kursaal was a Victorian amusement and leisure complex in Southend and has been referred to as the 'Thorpe Park' of its time. From one of the country's biggest amusement parks in its heyday of the 1930s & 40s, the arrival of the foreign package holiday led to a sad decline and ultimate closure of the park in 1986. Today, only 3 of the original 16 acres remain and the whole site is sadly delapidated. The Kursaal remains however an important part of the history of Southend alongside the famous pier, the head of which was almost completely destroyed by fire in 1975.



The word "Kursaal" derives from the German word for "spa or place of healthy amusement" and the "Flyer" was a train (with a top speed of perhaps 10 mph!) which circulated around the park.

Kursaal Flyer is a pale mid-strength beer with a pronounced malt & hop character, brewed from 100% maris otter malted barley. It would have been much enjoyed by those who came to see the illuminations, visit Never Never Land and Peter Pans playground and feed on fish, chips & jellied eels! It would certainly have been preferable to the ghastly keg beers of the 60s, all of which have now thankfully passed to the great Red Barrel in the sky!

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

Chris Cobbold very accurately points to the decline of most of those London pubs which are still in the ownership of the big brewers or pub chains which are usually closely related to them in some way, (April Editorial). It is not just cheap continental imports which are killing these pubs, otherwise Youngs and Fullers pubs, which are certainly not cheap, would be going the same way.

It is a deliberate strategy by the men in suits and accountants who see pubs not places for a social drink or community chat, but for profit. Fewer, but more profitable pubs would suit them. Would it suit CAMRA if the beer quality was better and the beers on offer more varied? I hope not.

So, to take matters on shouldn't CAMRA be pressurising the Labour Party for a

commitment that it will bring in legislation to protect the traditional pub from the ravages of the free market? Perhaps by the same kind of subsidy that is given to some bus and rail routes and for the same reason. Pubs are more than beer, they are life itself.

superbly organised and extremely popular, representing a wonderful opportunity for traditional ale to be introduced or reintroduced to a wider drinking public.

The publicity that some of the festivals generate is such that many of those attending have little knowledge of the cask ale scene and are ready to hear and "drink" the arguments "for and against" drinking our country's heritage.

Apart from wishing to praise CAMRA's army of volunteers for planning and running such good festivals I would like to air one of my areas of concern.

Looking at one of Londons most recent festivals (London Drinker, Camden Centre) it shows that over half of the featured breweries are 5 or less years old. Of the 25 breweries listed only 3 or 4 are southern brewers and by far the majority of featured brewers would fit most peoples definition of 'micro-brewers' or 'pub-brewery's '

Let me be the first to say that microbrewers, pub brewery's, beers from the Midlands, West, East and North are just as able to produce good beer as anybody else. They probably produce better beer than most. Being a new brewery too is no barrier in the production of cask ale.

My point is this... Assuming anybody

attending a festival for the first time enjoys the fruits of the brewers labour, where will he be able to repeat the experience?

Wouldn't it be better to offer a better combination of regional brewers beers and micro's enabling the converts the opportunity to realistically badger his local "governor" to get some in. There would be a good chance too that our newly converted ale drinker would re-discover his old favourites whilst away from the capital at weekends, holidays, business trips etc.

There are many regional brewers still under exposed in London, presumably having elected not to opt for nationalised exposure from the BIG 5 i.e. King & Barnes, Arkells, Batemans, Felinfoel, Robinsons, Adnams, Mansfield, Everards, Tolly, Ridleys, Brains etc, etc.

The promotion of these beers need not be at the expense of new, micro brewers, but hopefully side by side; the festivals would appeal to both the knowledgeable CAMRA drinker as well as the all important converts. Yours faithfully,

The South East London Pub Guide (4th edition) was published in January 1995 and covers the SE London postal districtsonly. As a result of delays in printing, much of the survey material dates from early 1994, hence information on pubs in the area included in recent London Drinker updates has not generally been included in the guide. In addition, there are a number of omissions and errors, and former names of renamed pubs (since the last edition) are not comprehensively included. The listings below therefore include a compendium of all known information to date necessary to bring the new guide up to date with cross references to the relevant page numbers.

Outer south east London areas in Bexley, Bromley and Croydon Boroughs are not covered in the 4th edition. Real ale pubs in Bexley and Bromley (at the time of survey) were included in the Kent guide (8th edition) but the guide was not comprehensive. A new guide covering Croydon Borough is planned. Consequently until such time as comprehensive guides are published for Bexley, Bromley and Croydon Boroughs, the updates will continue to refer to the relevant pages in the S.E. The new guide lists a few pubs now demolished or converted to other uses, but it is not comprehensive in this respect. For the record, the following additional pubs have also been 'lost' over the six year period since the last guide was printed.

SE1, DUKE OF KENT, 365 Old Kent Road. Ind Coope, converted to Nigerian Muslim centre.

SE1, GOOSEBERIES, 86 Old Kent Road. Belhaven, renamed **CAESARS.** Now a `nite spot' with entry fee. Previously UNCLE SAMS.

SE1, HORSESHOE, 115 Tower Bridge Road. Grand Met (Watney), demolished.

SE1, ROYAL GEORGE, 27 Carlisle Lane. Free House, demolished for Channel Tunnel Terminal access railway lines.

SE1, ROYAL OAK, 97 Tooley Street. Whitbread, demolished.

SE6, GOVERNOR GENERAL, 360 Verdant Lane. Grand Met (Watney), demolished. Site used for petrol filling station. (Listed erroneously under Bromley in 3rd edition guide)

SE8, BROWN BEAR, 154 Deptford High Street. Free House, converted to community project accommodation and flats.

SE8, DOVER CASTLE, 7 Deptford Broadway. Free House, renamed BROADWAY TAP, demolished after fire. SE9, KING & QUEEN, 76 Kimmeridge Road. Grand Met (Truman), demolished for new housing development. SE15, TRAFALGAR, 47 Sumner Road. Grand Met (Watney), converted to private members club, ATTITUDE.

SE16, BLOOMERS, 37 Brunel Road. Free House, converted to Chinese restaurant. Formerly BRICKLAYERS ARMS.

SE23, TYROLS, 149 Stanstead Street. Grand Met (Watney), demolished for new housing development. Formerly SWISS COTTAGE.

SE26, NEW ELLERSLIE HOTEL, 2 Sydenham Hill. Renamed ASTRA PALACE HOTEL. Now an unlicensed residential hotel.

FIVE YEARS AGO orange featured as the second colour on both covers and six other pages of the May 1990 issue. The back advertised the Greenwich Real Ale Festival. The front, unusually, only bore words, "Guest Beers Arrive" and Boddington Under Threat", each followed by page number references. One for the latter led to an advert including the words "Don't drink it!" Both formed the content of Andy's Editorial, which dwelt largely on brewery closures and mergers.

King & Barnes took a full page advert to list their 25 London outlets.

"The Brewers Dray" was a survey and history of that organisation, a joint venture by several independent breweries to make their distribution in the London area more economical.

"Far from the London Crowd" described a visit by a group from S.E. London Branch to Dorset in order to sample the local ales, and visit the breweries.

Piers Todd had visited, and offered a description of, the Bridge, Topsham, where the cellarkeeper, a lady, had been pronounced the best in Britain.

It had been stated in Parliament that imperial measures for spirits were about to be phased out and replaced by measures of 25 ml, which became mandatory at the beginning of this year.

Taylor Walker had been making their pubs more accessible for the disabled.

That's about all for this month.

Notwithstanding this, I have done a few sums to come up with an amount of alcohol that could be used as a standard "unit of alcohol". Because there is no such thing as a standard ordinary bitter, I went to the other end of the scale and looked at the bottles of spirits in my cabinet. There were several bottles of Scotch and a bottle of mother's ruin (I seem to be given them but hardly ever drink any) and they all (all eight bottles terrible isn't it!) proclaimed the strength of their contents to be 40% ABV. So here we have a standard starting point. Also since the beginning of the year the standard measure for spirits in pubs throughout Great Britain has been set at 25 millilitres (a little under 1 fluid ounce). From this we can say that a standard measure of a standard spirit contains 40% of 25 ml which is 10 millilitres of alcohol. So let us say (and I have never seen this in print before) that one "unit of alcohol" is ten millilitres of alcohol. There, now we have a standard, even if it is unofficial, that we can use to compare different strengths of beer.

Now assuming that when we go to our local pub tonight we get a full pint of beer, this will contain 568 millilitres of liquid some of which will be alcohol and to try to get back to standards a half pint will contain 284 millilitres (unless it's a "half pint" bottle which actually contains 275 ml). If our half pint were to contain exactly one "new standardised unit of alcohol", ie 10 millilitres, its alcoholic strength would be 3.52% ABV (quite an easy sum - it's 10 times 100 divided by 284). So now we can compare this to some sample beers picked not quite at random from the back of the Good Beer Guide. The following little list gives the number of "new standardised units of alcohol" per half pint of the beers in question:

Fuller: Hock (3.2%) – 0.91 units

Chiswick Bitter (3.5%) - 0.99 units London Pride (4.1%) - 1.16 units

ESB (5.5%) – 1.56 units

Young: Bitter (3.7%) - 1.05 units

Special (4.6%) – 1.31 units Winter Warmer (5%) – 1.42 units

You can do the sums for any other beer yourselves by dividing the ABV of the beer in question by 3.52.

Finally, I did learn one thing new at the BR seminar that I referred to earlier and it was this. When you do all your calculations about how long it takes to get rid of the alcohol in your bloodstream at the standard one unit per hour, do not count the time from when you start drinking, count the time from an hour AFTER you STOP drinking. The reason for this is that your liver does not start breaking the alcohol down until it senses that the blood alcohol level has stopped rising and that is some time after you stop drinking. So now you know; however slowly you drink your blood alcohol level peaks about one hour after you stop.

Sorry to have gone on so long but I wanted to get it all said in one go.

THE CITY HOUSE

The Lord Mayor of London has reopened what is believed to have been the last pub wrecked by the IRA before the Northern Ireland peace initiative got under way.

The City House, a Young's pub in Bishopsgate, City of the London, was ripped apart by a massive bomb in 1993 and was later demolished along with neighbouring buildings that were beyond repair.

Now the Lord Mayor, Alderman Christopher Walford, has declared the new pub open. He and brewery chairman John Young welcomed back the licensees, Nigel and Karolina Field, who were in charge of another Young's pub while the City House was being rebuilt. The pub was closed for the weekend, in common with most City pubs, when the bombers struck. The Fields were six miles away at their home in Bayswater, but Mr Field had been intending to pop into the City House to do some paperwork.

"The alarm went off and I switched it off," he recalled. "Then I turned over and went back to sleep. Tiredness saved my life."

The City House – taken over by Youngs in 1991 – was the only one of the brewery's 180 pubs not to serve draught beer, because there was no proper cellar. But cellar facilities have been incorporated into the new building and Young's Special is now quenching City workers' thirsts.

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
