#### **EDITORIAL**

On 3rd January the West London Branch of CAMRA held a pub crawl around the Westminster area. Among the intended ports of call was the (1996 Good Beer Guide listed) Cardinal in Francis Street but when they got there they found the pub closed. The pub has now reopened following refurbishment but it has been taken over by Samuel Smith and all the real beer has disappeared along with the handpumps.

The Cardinal was formerly a Finch's run pub but reverted to Charrington management when Finch's were taken over by Youngs a couple of years ago. The Good beer Guide entry lists it as selling four beers: Bass, Worthington Best Bitter, Fullers London Pride and a guest beer. Now they have all gone in what we can only describe as a move of the utmost cynicism by Sam Smiths.

We are disgusted that they should hang on to their other pubs (mostly former good free houses) where they are not prepared to sell real beer to the drinking public - to take over another to deprive the public of a good real beer outlet beggars belief!

Our message to Sam Smiths is this: "IF YOU CANNOT SELL DECENT REAL BEER IN YOUR LONDON PUBS SELL THEM TO ONE OF THE MANY COMPANIES WHO CAN!"

While on the subject of Yorkshire's oldest brewers, we are told that they have removed their name from the outside of all their pubs where real ale is no longer available, leaving only the white rose emblem as a marker for those in the know. This makes us think that they are not very proud of themselves.

When this sorry story started as long ago as last May, Mr. Auton, Sam Smith's advertising manager rote to CAMRA's Brewery Liaison Officer saying that where pubs were very traditional they would be arranging the deliveries specially so that the beer reached them within twelve hours of leaving the brewery. With thirteen of their pubs still selling real ale at our last count, we are sceptical that this is an economic way of delivering beer over two hundred miles from home. Surely it would be far better to set up a London depot from which they could

deliver their real beers in a properly controlled manner to <u>all</u> their pubs in the region. Yes, we know that they used to have one - so why did they close it if they care about their customers?

Finally we gather that when the team came down from the brewery to rip out the handpumps the Gazebo in Kingston had a half full kil of beer on sale and another ready to go on. These were also taken away with no chance for the manager to sell the rest. And apparently the manager was not even told that the men were coming until they arrived with their tool kits in hand!

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

Dear Editors,

I dropped in to the Railway in Putney the other day and found it spotlessly clean and well ventilated. It is a Wetherspoon house and had two guest beers on offer – Arundel Old Knucker (5.5%) at £1.85 a pint and Smiles Hollyhops (5%) at £1.79. Both beers were dark with a liquorice tang, a bit like an old ale. [That's probably because they are old ales. AP]

All the washrooms in Wetherspoon houses are on the first floor; it's a point of corporate identity. [Not quite - Wetherspoon's in Twickenham hasn't got an upstairs; it's on the gound floor only - under an office block - Ed] Up the stairs, repro Eighteenth Century prints adorn the walls and there is also an upstairs non-smokers bar where I quaffed an Erdinger Wheat Beer that had Deutschland on the label, but what on earth does FLASCHENGARUNG do in translation? [It means yeast in the bottle, i.e. bottle conditioned. I trust you made sure that it was poured cloudy - Ed]

Across the river Young's have reopened the Duke of Cumberland with an additional fireplace where the dartboard used to be in the old public bar, now destroyed. It's a disappointing fireplace, being a hideous yellow brick monstrosity that looks like an incinerator, yet the firegrate is a pleasing example of the blacksmith's craft. On the opening night the fireplace belched smoke because the chimney did not draw and Head Office had to commission an extractor fan to be built into the chimney.

Pine boards and rugs are an improvement on the ghastly carpet we used to have and the emphasis on torchette style brass barraging of lights is a new design feature. The old saloon side is less dingy but much of the new woodwork has been painted instead of being varnished and the mahogany looks very heavy having been given a ghastly translucent puce glaze. I think the Spotted Horse in Putney was a better Young's renovation.

The last time I went into the Duke, I paid for my pint of Beamish while I persuaded the barmaid to "rest" the drink and let it settle once or twice. On completing pulling the pint, the barmaid asked me to pay again and I had to stand my ground bravely and insist that the till roll was rummaged before the manager

admitted I was right and had paid after all.

There is a new atmosphere with Young's nowadays and this is the kind of mid-market service environment where the new ventilation in the Duke is never switched on unless you ask for the fug to be dispersed.

I do hope Mr. John Young can visit the Duke of Cumberland and renew the kind and friendly service Young's used to be renowned for, but I'm scared stiff of the new Managing Director.

Nick Ward was CAMRA's Courage Brewery Liaison Officer at the time and orchestrated a really good campaign. I can remember the meetings as London Officer for South West Essex Branch at the time; I used to travel to the Windmill in Tabernacle Street, about ten minutes walk from Liverpool Street Station. There were always about six different beers on when we were there, having previously met at the Sugarloaf in Great Queen Street, Holborn.

Colin Riddett was Area Organiser and I think Jim Scanlon was the London Committee Chairman. I still have all the badges produced at the time including the "What a Cock Up" one.

Courage said that Directors would not travel and then moved brewing to Bristol from whence it was trunked by road to Kent. This caused some hot discussion and to this day I remember the late Keith Wildey being told to belt up. They were happy, good campaigning days with lots of enthusiasm, sadly missing today.

#### NEW PUB IN ENFIELD

Shortly before Christmas the former Ponders End Pumping Station off Wharf Road, EN3 was transformed into a pub and restaurant called the Navigation Inn. Located on the bank of the River Lea Navigation, this giant Beefeater has been rebuilt internally using a canal theme. Photographs and canal memorabilia adorn the bare brick walls and wooden beams.

Tucked away in one corner is the Discovery Room where harassed parents can deposit their children to jump, climb, slide, swing on ropes and re-enact their every Tarzan fantasy in soft padded surroundings. This facility costs £1 per hour per child and is watched over by uniformed staff. Parents are expected to be on hand during their child's session.

For the nice weather there is a fenced off canal side terrace with an outdoor children's playground. In recent years this site has been home to travellers' caravans, car boot sales and the Palladium Night Club (with occasional stabbings). Needless to say, this is the best use yet of the large site.

There is wheelchair access to the main building. The beers available are Boddington's Bitter, Flowers Original Bitter and Whitbread Fuggles Imperial IPA.

Since 1799 the name Greene King has been synonymous with fine ales. Over all those years, we've fiercely defended our independence and our brewing traditions. It means we've been able to consistently produce some of the finest ales in the country. We haven't sold out. But our beers often do.

#### NEWS FROM YOUNGS

Youngs are among the latest breweries to announce a coordinated programme of seasonal beers. Following on from the long established Winter Warmer in March will be Best Mild Ale, described as a dark refreshing beer at 3.2% ABV which will be available through April and May. Youngs say that the recipe for Best Malt Ale, last brewed in 1985 is being resurrected for this beer—those of who remember the old BMA will reserve judgement on this.

The next beer in the portfolio will be Wheat Beer, a 4.0% ABV brew which will be on sale between 3rd June and 30th August. In addition to malted barley hops and yeast, the recipe will include wheat (of course), orange peel and coriander.

In September Dirty Dick's Ale will be introduced for a six week period. Introduced last year to mark the 250th Anniversary of the eponymous pub in Bishopsgate, this year's brew will be from a completely new recipe at a strength of 4.1%. Finally the year will come full circle with the return of Winter Warmer at 5% ABV in mid-October.

Youngs have announced the appointment of a new board member. Stephen Goodyear, who is 40 years old, joined Youngs seven months ago as head of sales and marketing. Mr. Goodyear, who has spent most of his working life to date with Courage, will continue to be responsible for sales and marketing as an executive director of the brewery.

Lastly Youngs have announced the retirement, after 46 years in the pub trade, of Derek Gardner who, with his wife Yvonne, has been tenant of the Gardeners Arms (appropriately enough) in Merton Road, Wandsworth for the last seventeen years. Before that, Derek and Yvonne were managers at the Bridge in Greenford for five years. Now 67, Derek began working in the trade in 1950 and became one of the country's youngest licensees when he ran a hotel in Kings Lynn at the age of 22. He is a keen golfer and was founder and first chairman of the Young's brewery Licensees' Golfing Society; he intends to continue playing in the society's tournaments.

At the same time as Derek and Yvonne departed, barmaid Joan Evans also retired from the Gardeners Arms. Joan, who had worked at the Gardeners for 22 years was always there, "come rain hail and illness" according to Derek.

#### CAMRA SLAMS HOME BREWERY CLOSURE

The proposed closure of Home Brewery in Nottingham has bitterly angered CAMRA members in Nottingham and across Britain. And they have pledged to continue the campaign to keep it open.

"CAMRA calls for the brewery and its tied estate to be put up for sale, rather than closed", said Campaigns Manager Stephen Cox. "Several smaller breweries have been saved in the last few years by management buyouts or independent management."

Scottish said that they intended 'brewing units' with 'high-volume low-cost production'. They did not mention flavour, distinctiveness, originality, taste, tradition or local preferences.

Local CAMRA members are backing plans to save the brewery, working with trades unions and the local council. "Failure by Scottish and Newcastle to promote Home has led to its decline. The Robin Hood connection has international resonance – why has no attempt been made to distribute Home more widely, or export?" said Andrew Ludlow of

Nottingham CAMRA. "This closure will end the Home we know."

#### SCOTTISH COURAGE ANNOUNCES NEW STRUCTURE

Scottish Courage Ltd, the newly created beer division of Scottish & Newcastle plc, has announced its UK organisation structure for production, distribution and sales operations.

The announcement concludes a six month strategic review following the company's acquisition of Courage Ltd in August 1995.

According to the company the detailed investigation confirmed the existence of excess capacity arising from the combined total of nine Scottish Courage breweries and a priority for the business was to develop a plan addressing this and other related issues.

The plans announced will establish a national network of UK brewing units capable of high-volume, low-cost production. The rationalisation of sales and distribution facilities supposedly reflects the close proximity of a number of existing business sites and aims to provide a superior customer service.

Guy Dickson, Chairman of Scottish Courage said: "While our business continues to perform extremely well, our review has highlighted the need and opportunity for us to achieve a more streamlined structure which will allow us to progress in the increasingly competitive UK brewing industry.

"Implementation of our strategic plan will enable us to provide an unrivalled range of brands supported by the highest levels of service."

The changes will result in an overall reduction of some 1600 employees across the Scottish Courage Ltd business. However, these will be phased over the next 12 months to allow for full consultation and opportunities for redeployment.

The main proposals are:

- Production and packaging at the Fountain Head Brewery at Halifax will reduce progressively with the site closing by October 1996.
- The closure of Home Brewery will also be phased. The brewing and bulk packaging operation will cease by early Summer and bottling operations by Autumn 1996.
- 3. Future production will be focused on

- Scottish Courage's remaining seven breweries located in Edinburgh, Newcastle, Tadcaster, Manchester, Masham, Bristol and Reading.
- Current combined total (Scottish & Newcastle and Courage) of 41 depots should be reduced with future operations focused on 28 strategically located sites.
- During 1996 the following sales and distribution depots will close: Stepps in Scotland, Garforth near Leeds, Gateshead, Nottingham, Preston, Aylesford, Swansea, Dunstable, Cardiff, Southampton and distribution operations at Merton will cease.

Further reorganisation to be implemented at a later stage will include:

- investment in the North West by combining the current operations carried out from the existing Chester and Winsford sites on a new single location to be identified in the Chester area.
- investment in London by combining the current operations carried out from the existing Acton, Tottenham and Merton sites to a new single West London location to be identified.
- the existing Brierley Hill depot, in the West Midlands, will be replaced with a larger site close by. The Newark depot will be expanded further to accommodate increased volume.

In addition, a single integrated business trading as Scottish Courage Brands Ltd is to be established in Edinburgh to service the national off-trade sectors of supermarkets, off-licences and cash & carry wholesalers.

Guy Dickson added: "This consolidation will further enhance our reputation as a strong free trade operator. Within an industry which continues to experience unprecedented change, Scottish Courage now has the scale, resources and ambition to maintain a leading position and compete effectively in the face of existing and future challenges."

In addition to these major elements of restructuring a realignment of other support functions – systems, finance, personnel – will also take place to reflect the needs of the newly combined business.

Very many congratulations to Martin Perkins at the Royal Standard, Croydon, recently voted the CAMRA Regional Winner (Greater London) in the CAMRA National Pub of the Year Competition. The pub was chosen because of the consistently high standard of the beer and the warmth of its welcome.

#### FROM OUR ARCHIVES

FIFTEEN YEARS AGO the colour used for the cover was light blue. The front of the 24 page March 1981 bore a photograph of the Old Town in Antwerp and a splash reading "International Section Inside". This referred to the 4 centre pages, which contained pub crawls of Amsterdam and Antwerp. Oddly, amongst it, was a panel covering about 1/6 of a page announcing "Stop Press. Simon's Tower Bridge Brewery for sale".

"Driblets from the Thames Valley", which was the nearest yet seen to an Editorial – reflected on the fact that many pubs tended to run out of real ale due to inefficient supply, a direct result to the large amount of beers of all sorts, real or otherwise.

Martyn Cornell gave a history, in the form of a tour, of Barclay Perkins' Anchor Brewery in Southwark, backdated to its heyday in 1842.

Another Sandown Park Beer Festival was in the offing, with 20 beers. Sam Smith's had opened the Lord Wolsey, N1, as its latest London pub. David Bruce had opened his third pub, the Frog & Firkin, W11.

TEN YEARS AGO in March 1986 rust red appeared on eight inner pages. The front cover appeared "white on black" in deference to the fact that brewing of real ale had ceased at Romford. The panel was in the form of a newspaper placard with a lattice of "wires". With a large heading written by hand reading "Romford Goes Fizz", a typed Stop Press announced this and concluded "All real Allied beers in the London area will now come from Burton, and we look forward to vast and overdue improvements". What do we think now?

The Editorial quoted three articles at length from the Brewers' Society Journal. Each was about prices rising, and the comment at the end advised: "If you wish to protest to your M.P. about the continuing rises in beer taxation and price increases by the Brewers, we advise you to write... using any of the material from these articles as ammunition."

FIVE YEARS AGO the March 1991 edition, printed in orange, featured the London Drinker Beer Festival on the front

page with a guest editorial by John Gilbert.

Doug Scott, now the London Regional Director, reported on changes in and around Isleworth, once the home of its own brewery.

A significant proportion, 5 pages to be precise, were given over as the programme for the London Drinker Beer Festival and there was also a write-up on the Battersea Beer Festival a few weeks earlier. Details were available on the test marketing in London of a new wheat beer and advance notice appeared for GBBF at Docklands Arena.

That's all for this month.

Hop Back's Greig Futcher accepted an award from North Hampshire CAMRA for the brewer's wheat beer, while its home branch, Salisbury & South Wiltshire, presented awards to Summer Lightning and GFB. The brewery collected 15 awards last year alone and hopes to do even better in 1996.

#### FULLERS CLOSE THE CIRCLE

With their latest seasonal brew Fullers of Chiswick have now completed their annual portfolio of seasonal beers. Following on from the Old Winter Ale, London Porter went on sale on 5th February and will be available until 22nd March with the relaunch of IPA in the Spring.

Brewing Director Reg Drury went back through Fuller's old brewing books and found several recipes for Porter and combined properties of all of them to recreate the taste and appearance of the porters produced in the last century, though not the strength. Fullers describe the result as a rich dark stout, smooth and strong (5%ABV) which will be served with a head.

To quote Mr. Drury: "Our range of seasonal beers has proved very popular with our customers but there seemed to be a gap. London Porter bridges that gap between our Old Winter Ale and the move into spring and India Pale Ale. With the growing popularity of dark, creamy beers, an authentic Porter seemed just the thing.

Fullers announced that London Porter will be available only in firkins so that the risk of the beer going off should be minimised. If you want to try it (assuming you haven't already done so), you had better get your skates on; owing to problems with deadlines its sales period will be at least half over by the time you read this.

Still on the subject of Fullers, they recently announced a trading agreement with family run Italian brewers, Birra Peroni Industriale who coincidentally are celebrating their 150th anniversary in 1996. Peroni had noticed a rapid growth in the sales of imported English beers in Italy and in mid 1995 started to research English beers not available in their country. Fullers were alerted to the opportunity by David Marsh, the DTI Export Promoter for Italy and Elspeth Maxwell, Commercial Attaché at the British Embassy in Rome. Following negotiations a contract between the two brewers was signed at the Griffin Brewery on 19th December between Rodolfo Peroni and Michael Turner, both direct descendants of the founding families of their respective companies.

The contract includes an exclusive agreement to stock Fuller's products throughout Italy, San Marino and the Vatican State and a guarantee that Fuller's will be the only UK brewed ales in Peroni's portfolio. Fullers will be providing three beers to the Italian market, London Pride (in 330ml bottles and 30 litre containers - kegged in Italy from bulk deliveries); Golden Pride in bottles and London Dark Ale, a new 5.3% ABV brand created especially for the Italian market which will also be kegged from bulk supplies in Peroni's brewery in Padova.

Fullers quoted Michael Turner as saying: "We are delighted with the deal. It is particularly pleasing to enter the Italian market in conjunction with another family business that, like ourselves, has 150 years of brewing excellence under its belt! The Fullers-Peroni contract is a very exciting development in our European export drive and is an integral part of our overall strategy to target new markets with high volume potential."

Just a thought - when the Pope visited Great Britain, much was made of his liking for beer and the fact that he was served beer instead of wine (at his own request) with his lunch at Lambeth Palace. Is the Golden Pride being exported with a specific customer in mind?

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#### BEER BRIEFING LONDON BEER GUIDES UPDATE 111

This month we welcome a new sympathetically converted ex bank opened by Fullers in the City; the latest Wetherspoon conversion in N14 Southgate and two further shop conversions, one each for Allied and Morlands, in Sutton. Sutton is rapidly becoming a magnet for `new wave' pubs with all the main free house operators now represented - Wetherspoons, Regent Inns and Grosvenor Inns; two home brews - a Firkin and a Hogshead; a Bass run "All Bar One" and pseudo Irish O'Neills and Scruffy Murphys! Despite their different emphases, all have real ale on offer. By contrast, Sam Smith's, the "traditional Yorkshire brewers" have caught up with the 70's by acquiring a GBG listed pub in SW1 Victoria and promptly removing the handpumps! Elsewhere the acquisitions by Hall & Woodhouse in SW10 West Chelsea; Shepherd Neame in SW18 Wandsworth and Greene King in Surbiton respectively have been reported. Silly corporate renamings continue but there is some evidence that adverse customer reaction is forcing some to revert to their historic names.







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#### OOPS!

Remember the Hoover free flights to America promotion that went horribly wrong? Well, now it seems that one of England's favourite brewers has landed itself in a similar sort of problem, though on a somewhat smaller scale, as readers of the Guardian in December will have seen.

Richard Colbey, a barrister writing in the aforementioned newspaper reported a passport scheme started last July by Brakspear's in Henley. The deal was that anybody who managed to buy a drink in each of their pubs by the end of the year would be entitled to a bottle of beer a day for a year. They obviously thought that this was something of an impossible task but clearly did not appreciate the power of CAMRA members and other lovers of decent beer - after all they only had to visit 74 pubs in five months (that's about one pub every other day) to qualify.

When dozens of punters started turning in their completed passports, Brakspear's suddenly realised the scale of their promotion and got what could be described as rather chilly feet. They changed the rules so that only one lucky customer would get the aforementioned 366 bottles (presumably not 365 as 1996 is a leap year) and all the rest qualified for "an umbrella with Brakspear's name on it and an empty glass" in Mr. Colbey's words.

It is not clear where this will lead to at the moment but if it gets to court, the case law which will apply is one I remember from my school days, Carlill v. the Carbolic Smoke Ball Company (which dates from around 1905 if I remember correctly). In this case the company had offered £100 to anybody who used their product in the designated manner and subsequently caught the flu - Mrs. Carlill did and the law lords ruled that the offer was genuine and not just advertising blurb. So now people have to be careful about what they offer.

But back to Brakspear's. To add London Drinker's voice uninvited to the argument, we call upon Brakspear's to do the right thing and do what they said they would in those hot sunny days last July.

After all, Young's have never reneged on their support for the 135 Club (even if you do have to visit rather more that 135 pubs nowadays) and neither have they put a time limit on those visiting their pubs - or the number of times you can do it. A couple of years back I was in my local in Teddington and I bumped into a couple, well known in CAMRA circles who were doing the "135" for the third time. Furthermore the 135 Club started from a customer initiative that Young's took to their hearts rather than an advertising idea.

I for one, find it very difficult to believe that the directors of Brakspear's, a member of the Independent Family Brewers of Britain did not know about the various passport schemes run by other IFBB members (apart from Young's) – Fuller's for example.
