

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EDITORIAL

PROTECT LONDON'S HERITAGE - VISIT A PUB!

As you will have most likely picked this magazine up in a pub, then perhaps you feel that this call is not for you but we all have a duty to "use it or lose it". And for this reason, the week commencing 14th October, CAMRA is running a campaign to highlight the uncertain future of London's pubs.

Over the last three years, CAMRA has been tracking what has been happening to pubs in England and Wales and it is not a pretty picture. Estimates are that over 1330 pubs have been lost during this time, i.e. around 2.5% of all pubs. So what is happening to them?

A few years ago, London was losing the back street boozers. These pubs often had low turnovers and struggled to pay the increasing rents demanded by owners who wanted better financial returns. Now the situation has changed. 26% of the pubs lost in England and Wales were demolished but the remaining 74% were either converted into other businesses or into residential use. These pubs are now gone forever. In all of these cases, planning permission is needed and anyone can object to these changes. CAMRA, working with local pub users, has many times succeeded in stopping these changes happening but we need to know about them. We do not have to sit and accept it.

Too often as well we see the theming of pubs in line with the latest bright idea from a pub marketer. They rarely last more than a few years before they are done again but in the meantime original fixtures and fittings that were part of the pub's heritage are destroyed. We can work to stop this by getting pubs listed, in some cases both internally and externally. This gives protection to buildings with stunning interiors such as the Salisbury in West London and the Blackfriar at Blackfriars.

But overall, we need to encourage more people to visit our pubs. Without them our traditional social life will never be the same again. And although there are new pubs being built, the numbers are significantly less than we are losing. Of course they do have a part to play, often attracting a newer, younger element where we can hopefully teach them the delights of a decent pint of real ale but they can never take the place of one of London's old masterpieces. Our Victorian gin places, our back street locals, our roadhouses and our historic pubs such as the Queens Larder (Bloomsbury) and the Dove (Hammersmith), all have a story to tell and one that we must preserve to tell their stories to the next generation.

As Belloc said 'When you have lost your inns, drown your empty selves, for you will have lost the last of England'. Do your bit. Visit a pub during CAMRA's pub week and drag others with you!

LONDON PUB WEEK 14-20 OCTOBER 2002

London Week of Action supporting pubs good idea, good excuse for going to the boozer with fellow Real Ale enthusiasts. Pity the pub kicks you out at 11.20, though.

Hold on, do you know just how many pubs are likely to close for ever before that time and during that week? In London alone there could be at least two pubs lost for every one of those seven days. You always thought it was the country pubs we were losing? No, because with greedy property developers the situation in London is becoming much worse. In just two and a half years 380 pubs have closed in Greater London. Many of these pubs have uncertain futures but 46% of these pubs have been lost forever. 61 have been demolished whilst others have been converted to other businesses or residential use. The worst hit area has been inner London, which has lost 307 pubs.

This is terrible news for everyone who likes a good pub. Although there are a number of new pubs opening, only in central London are there sufficient openings to make up for the losses. Variety and choice are being eroded. CAMRA is concerned because the losses are biased neighbourhood pubs. These are the sorts of pubs that are often responsible for keeping a sense of local community. We cannot underestimate their importance to society.

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LONDON PUB WEEK 14-20 OCTOBER 2002

The London Branches of CAMRA, with the support of London Pubs Group, have been well aware of this trend for some time. This is just one reason for bringing it to your attention through a first CAMRA week of action in the region.

Another thing, though, not so many people are actually going to the pubs – what's the reason for this? Pubs too smoky? (several such as Wetherspoons have a non-smoking area), poor beer quality? (this surely equals poor cellarmanship), loud music played just for the bar staff? (there are a number of quiet pubs mentioned in the Good Beer Guide), price increases? (always the case); or perhaps your local has just been turned into another Paddy O'Flagellant's (meaning it's all keg). Another reason for people leaving the pub is the cheap beer on offer at the large supermarkets – stay in and watch those old videos of the 'Beer Hunter' instead.

We have to protect our pubs and get people into them. October 14-20 is London Pub Week. In fact next year CAMRA will have a National Pub Week. London has decided to get there a year earlier, before too many more of our pubs close. The Great British Pub debate should have started yesterday.

During the week I hope all members of London Branches will be visiting their favourite pubs. Enfield and Barnet, for example, has a pub crawl of Barnet on Saturday October 19, taking in several of the old coaching inns (details under Branch Update).

On Monday 14 October there will be an all-London Branches pub crawl of Hampstead NW3. You don't have to be a CAMRA member; everyone is welcome. We might even sign you up!

We shall start at at a famous Young's pub, the Flask in Flask Walk (7pm), gloriously Victorian with a characterful public bar. Then we will go to a very much more modern looking pub, one of the Wetherspoons chain so cheerfully inexpensive, the Three Horseshoes at 28 Heath Street (8pm). Next we go to a wonderful pub that, believe it or not, they wanted to turn into an 'every town in the land' style café and bistro, the Holly Bush at 22 Holly Mount Through CAMRA and various pressure groups the historic pub has now been saved. Finally, unless we have time for other gems and curiosities, we end up at 'Woody's', the local name for North London's CAMRA Pub of the Year, the Duke of Hamilton, 23 New End (9.30). If you're lucky Woody himself might serve you with a superb pint of Fuller's, one of London's favourite ales in one of London's favourite pubs.

Unless we use them we will lose them. Support London Pub Week and keep our pubs alive.

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
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OBITUARY

LONDON CAMRA MOURNS FOR KEVIN REEVE

The success or otherwise of this year's Great British Beer Festival (GBBF) paled into insignificance for me following the devastating news of Kevin Reeve's death at the age of 48 from a heart attack on Mon. 5th August.

Kevin had been the manager of the Every 1's a Winner Tombola stand at GBBF for 12 years and worked at most CAMRA-run beer festivals in London.

I first met Kevin at one of the staff socials at the end of the first festival I worked at, the 1992 GBBF. Over the years we became firm friends and spent many enjoyable sessions drinking in various pubs and festivals, but especially in his favourite pub, Rose's in Woolwich.

Kevin's straight-talking style ruffled a few

feathers over the years, but he made many more friends than enemies. This was evidenced by the large number of people locally and from around the country who attended his



funeral service and the subsequent celebration of his life, which was held at Rose's. Dave, Jackie and Misty at Rose's will miss Kevin terribly.

Kevin's passing leaves a massive hole in the Campaign. The South East London branch of CAMRA has lost a vital festival worker, pubs surveyor and London Drinker distributor. Most importantly, we have lost a great friend who will nevertheless be in our memories forever.

SAVING KINGSTON'S PUBS

Help is at hand for ale drinkers in Kingston. Recognising the vital role that pubs play in their local communities, the Council is proposing a new policy to help protect our locals.

The Borough has been hard hit by pub closures in recent months. A spate of planning applications has been submitted to demolish pubs and redevelop the land, usually for housing. The list is a long one: The White Horse, Cambridge Arms and Duke Tavern have all closed. The Liverpool Arms, Railway Tavern, Duke of Cambridge and the Toby Jug (as shown on the cover) have been demolished.

In an attempt to stop this worrying trend Kingston Council is planning a change to the Unitary Development Plan for the borough giving more protection to pubs which play a part in the social life of the local community.

In October the Council will be consulting local people and organisations, including CAMRA, on the new policy.

It has also asked CAMRA and local

neighbourhoods to identify any pubs in the borough which may be deserving of being listed, or being designated buildings of townscape merit. This would give added protection to the best buildings. As a result of this consultation 21 pubs have been identified and will be assessed for possible listing.

Roger Hayes, Council Leader is vigorously backing the new policy.

'Imagine Albert Square without the Queen Vic, or Coronation Street with no Rover's Return. Pubs play an important role in the community. Our favourite locals could soon be a thing of the past if urgent action is not taken to prevent their closure or even demolition. Our new policy will give the Council more control over the redevelopment of these sites and help preserve vital facilities for the community.'

LONDON PUBS GROUP UPDATE

The following is a summary of current alerts and concerns over pub preservation in London:

E3, Widow's Son (Bun House), 75 Devon's Road: lease is currently up for sale

N20, Rising Sun, Oakleigh Road North: reported to be closed for refurbishment

NW8, Clifton, 96 Clifton Hill: was undergoing refurbishment in August

SW3, Blenheim, 27 Cale Street: planning permission was sought in late July for 'complete refurbishment works to public house, lower ground and ground floor, and conversion of existing public house accommodation into 3 two-bedroomed flats with first floor terrace'. London Pubs Group contacted the Planning Officer to see if the plans showed whether the ground floor was going to be retained as a pub or turned into a restaurant but the Officer said that this was not clear from the plans. Even if the latter is the case there would be no need for a change of use application. West London

CAMRA has been informed and is carrying a watching brief

SW17, King's Head, 84 Upper Tooting Road: closed for refurbishment - London Pubs Group commented on the proposals back in May this year but has recently raised fresh concerns with the Conservation Officer since the work has begun. The Conservation Officer is dealing with the proposals.

W2, Grand Junction Arms, South Wharf Road: may be demolished as part of the Paddington Scheme

Hampton, White Hart, 70 High Street: Richmond Borough Council has approved a second application for change of use to residential flats. It was withdrawn from the agenda of the Planning Committee Meeting of 5 September for reasons unknown.

◆ Deuchars is the best of British

Deuchars IPA brewed by Caledonian of Edinburgh was awarded the title of 'Champion Beer of Britain' at the Great British Beer Festival in August. It was judged to be the best beer in Britain by a panel of brewers, beer writers and journalists. This is the first time that a Scottish beer has ever won the title.

The 2002 Good Beer Guide describes Deuchars as 'an extremely tasty and refreshing amber-coloured session beer. Hops and fruit are very evident and are balanced by malt throughout. The lingering aftertaste is delightfully bitter and hoppy.'

Roger Protz, one of the finalist judges and Editor of the Good Beer Guide said 'I think that the victory for Caledonian is well overdue. Deuchars IPA is a fabulous beer. A brilliant blend of malt and hop character and above all a drink with enormous drinkability. A great victory for Scotland!'

David Brown, Caledonian's Director of Marketing said 'We are absolutely thrilled to have won this award, particularly as we are the first Scottish brewery to do so. Deuchars has been a great success in Scotland for many years and appreciate the support that CAMRA has given us.'

The silver medal in the awards went to RCH East Street Cream from Somerset, and the bronze to Moondance from Triple FFF of Alton, Hampshire.

◆ Get real in ale week

Pollowing on from last year's successful Cask Ale week, the Independent Family Brewers of Britain (IFBB) will be urging customers to 'get real' this year during Real Beer Week. The 33 members of the IFBB, which include Fullers, Young's and many of the best known regional breweries from around the country, aim to lure people into their pubs and boost their sales of cask beer with a range of promotions. The week chosen for the activity is Monday 30 September to Sunday 6 October.

Although the campaign has a national focus, most of the activity will be organised locally, and each member of the IFBB will offer their own promotions. Fullers, Young's and Adnams will be offering a 'try before you buy' scheme; Batemans will have scratchcards with the chance of winning beer for a year; Hydes has a competition to win a brewery tour, and Wadworths is giving lager buyers a voucher for a free pint of real ale when they buy their pint of lager.

Other plans include the Badger school of excellence, to be launched by the Badger brewery as a training guide to real ale for customers. IFBB chairman Anthony Fuller said 'Real Beer Week is a celebration of the many diverse brands that are produced by

IFBB members. We want to introduce more people to the delights of Real Beer, its quality, its uniqueness of flavours, and its health values.'

He added 'To ensure that Real Beer is still around in years to come it is important to widen the market and extend our customer base. Real Beer Week will focus nationally and regionally on introducing more people to Real Beer as a viable drinking choice when entering a pub or restaurant.'

CAMRA has been working closely with the IFBB on ideas for promoting real beer to new markets, as well as running its 'Ask if its Cask' campaign as a generic promotion for cask beer. Spokesman Tony Jerome said that CAMRA was delighted with the announcement of Real Beer Week.

◆ Cains and Tollys sold

Cains brewery, which has been for sale for some months, has finally been sold to Gardner-Shaw, a Midlands based drinks distribution company. The deal, which cost them £3.4 million, ended months of uncertainty - previous owners Danish Brewery Group originally put the brewery up for sale last year. The offer beat one from Carlisle Retail, which included Cains founder and former managing director Steve Holt.

Although Cains was making a loss, mainly due to its reliance on low-cost supermarket lagers, the new owners have pledged to turn the company round. Gardner-Shaw is owned by brothers Sudarghara and Ajmail Dusanj, who took the company over ten years ago and have managed to transform it into a successful business with 11 depots across the country. Sudarghara Dusanj said 'Cains has been important to Liverpool's economy for many years. We recognise the importance of preserving the heritage of the company and firmly believe we can take this piece of history and transform it into a modern day success story.'

He also pledged to continue brewing Cains' award winning beers on the current site, following a vocal local campaign to save the brewery and its beers. Campaigners are treating the change of ownership with caution, and the Supporters of Cains Action Group has vowed to continue its campaign to ensure Cains beers continue to be sold in over 300 local pubs.


A less expected move was the takeover of Tolly Cobbold of Ipswich by Chelmsford based Ridley's, leading to an end to brewing on the Ipswich site. The deal could lead to the rise of a new power in independent brewing in the region; Tollys had just 6 pubs to add to Ridley's estate of 71, but is the main Carlsberg-Tetley distributor in East Anglia and also has some 700 free trade accounts. Many of these

accounts were former Brent Walker pubs now owned by Pubmaster - Tolly Cobbold was bought by the management from Brent Walker 12 years ago. Nicholas Ridley, Executive Chairman of Ridley's said that the main attraction was Tolly's wide range of distribution, as the majority of Ridley's own sales are concentrated near their Essex base. The company is actively looking to expand production following the relaunch of its entire range last year and the introduction of Prospect, its highly regarded Best Bitter.

Tolly Cobbold was originally only kept open following a protest campaign by local people and CAMRA. A preservation order was put on the brewing equipment by the council, and this was a big factor in persuading Brent Walker to sell the brewery as a going concern. Their original plan had been to demolish the riverside brewery and build a marina on the site.

However, sadly, the old brewery has not been operated for some years, and the more modern plant that has been in use has been moved to Ridley's. The Cliff Quay brewery site was not part of the sale, and a Tolly spokesman confirmed that there are plans to revive the marina plan.



♦ Greene King in confident mood

Greene King chief executive Tim Bridge reckons he has 'the best beer business in Britain'. That's his view following the unveiling of strong annual results including a pre-tax profit increase of over ten per cent. Further expansions of the pub estate in the last year included the purchase of the 107-strong estate of Morrells in July; the estate is now close to 2,000 and Greene King plan to spend £50m doing them up in the near future.

Greene King will now be brewing 'Morrells' beersthey have been brewed at Thomas Hardy Burtonwood since Morrells' brewery in Oxford was controversially axed. These beers will join a portfolio that is increasing sales rapidly, with Old Speckled Hen up 22 per cent in the 12 months to May, and increases also reported for IPA and Abbot.

Overall, sales are up by fifteen per cent on the previous year; however, profits did not benefit as much as expected from the World Cup as the boost to beer sales was offset by a big fall in food sales.

◆ Beauty of Hops awards

The annual Beauty of Hops competition sees beers - in the past, the awards have included the ultimate beer to go with curry, pizza and fish and chips. For this year's awards, there were three challenges - to come up with the Ultimate Barbecue beer, the Ultimate Wedding beer and the Ultimate Fruit/spiced beer.

Maybe surprisingly, one of the winners of the best beer to act as a companion for a barbecue was a dark beer - Greene King's Strong Suffolk. Head brewer John Bexon explained 'Usually you would associate blonde or golden beers with barbecues, but the judges have confounded expectations by going for Strong Suffolk. Strong Suffolk is dark and warming, so it's normally thought of as an autumn and winter ale. However, if you chill it it's unexpectedly refreshing and tasty.'

Unable to choose between the top two, the judges awarded joint gold to Harvey's Bonfire Boy. St Peter's Cream Stour won bronze.

The Ultimate Wedding Beer had to be one fit to be served in champagne flutes to toast the happy couple at a summer wedding. The all-female judging panel were looking for pale beers of 5.5 per cent alcohol, and they chose Smiles Bristol IPA as the winner. Fuller's got silver with Organic Honey Dew, and bronze went to Federation Angel Ale.

In the Fruit and spiced beer category, Brains won with Ultimo, with silver and bronze going to Dark Star Spiced Vice and St Peter's Lemon and Ginger.

◆ Local celebrations at Olympia

Fuller's are celebrating yet more awards for their beers this summer, following the Champion Beer of Britain competition held at the Great British Beer Festival (GBBF) in Olympia in August.

Fuller's 1845 won the gold medal in the bottled beer competition, backed up with a silver for ESB in the strong bitter category and a bronze for London Pride in the best bitter category. 1845 was launched in 1995 to commemorate the 150th anniversary of Fuller Smith and Turner, and has enjoyed enormous popularity ever since. The judges in the competition included Roger Protz, Guardian Beer Writer, who said of the beer 'A magnificent russet-coloured ale with a fine balance of malt and hop flavours, with spicy and peppery Golding hops and nutty and creamy malt. Delicious!'

The award will be reflected in a new label for the bottle for this autumn. Fuller's Beer and Brands director John Roberts said 'I believe that bottle conditioned ales are an important and growing sector of the beer market and I am delighted that our '1845' has been voted Champion Bottle Conditioned Beer at this year's GBBE.' The win comes on the back of a 41% increase in sales volumes over the last year.

Fullers boasts that it has already won more CAMRA awards than any other brewer, including previous wins of the Champion Beer of Britain title with three different beers - ESB, London Pride and Chiswick.



RELATIVE VALUES

CAMRA's annual price survey earlier this year found the average beer price increase less than the average average price increase since last year, if I am interpreting the summarized statistics correctly. Of course it is a shame that beer prices should increase at all: if excise duty were 'harmonized' as we might expect, given political commitment to the European Union, then the price of beer ought to fall substantially.

Much more interesting though is the regional difference - between the 'average' pint in London at £2.12 and in the North West at £1.69. Indeed, our money went a lot further over a week in August on the canals around Manchester than it would have done had we stayed 'down south'.

Drink Joseph Holt's Mild preferably. It won silver in the International dark milds and stouts section of the 2002 Brewing Industry International Awards. It tasted marvellous, and at a price of £1.17 a pint whichever pub we visited. There were two nights I drank nothing else.

Enjoying a particularly good evening at the delightful Queens Hotel, Macclesfield (right outside the station; you can't miss it), and wondering how we might return the hospitality of the house, we thought maybe the pub should be 'twinned' with the Priory Arms: we're welcome there; so they're welcome here. Cracking pub, and great beers, sometimes even Holt's, only at twice the price - naturally! Geoff Strawbridge



Twice yearly inspections continue, with additional random inspections triggered by customer comment. Readers' vigilance will be valuable! Many other closures are recorded throughout London and pubs ceasing real ale continue to mount up. Sadly big chains such as Six Continents' Harvesters and Whitbread's Brewers Fayres are removing cask ales. More 'Firkins', 'Rats' etc are being renamed, some even regaining their

original names. A pub in Belgravia has reverted to its original name after 160 years!

New (proper) Wetherspoon Free House opened at the end of July in basement of commercial premises originally occupied by the print trade. Well hidden with blue neon signage at pavement level and entrance round the corner in Ray Street. Steps and a lift, for people with disabilities, lead down into a sprawling cellar with a dimly lit seating area with brown and cream decor leading through to a brightly lit bar. A separate no smoking/eating area with local history panels lies to the side. Carpeted throughout except around the bar. Food. Disabled WC. Open all permitted hours (including weekends). Apparently it was originally earmarked to become yet another 'Lloyds No 1 Bar' but, happily for those of us who like to converse in pubs, late working office workers on floors above objected to the potential noise, particularly in the evenings, and an

authentic and original Wetherspoons was created instead!

A stand up drinking counter is adjacent to a small dance floor area supervised by DJs from a music console, when in session. Loud recorded music and plasma video screens predominate throughout. A respite from the noise is provided by a large outdoor patio at the rear with umbrellas and halogen lamp heaters. Food available including 2 for 1 offers. Open 11-11 Mon-Wed, 11-1am Thu, 11-1.30am Fri, 11-12.30am Sat, 12-10.30 Sun. Formerly Blah Blah's, Rat & Carrot, Mainstreet and Red Lion. (X73, U144, U158, U163)

N1, LLOYDS No 1 BAR (GLASS WORKS), Units 5 & 6, N1 Centre, Parkfield St. Fuller: London Pride; Greene King: Abbot Ale; Shepherd Neame: Spitfire. Brand new Wetherspoon 'Lloyds No 1 Bar' opened late July on first floor of new 'N1 Centre', a leisure and shopping complex which also includes cinemas and a relocated Marquee Club. It is reached from a balcony accessed by stairs or lift from the ground floor/foyer. A grey steel entrance porch flanked by bouncers leads into a rather uninviting large bar area with blue neon lighting, black ceiling and mock steel furniture offset by sofas, a mock stone fireplace, red/blue fussy carpets and brown panelled walls. Loud, thumping 'music' and plasma video screens permeate every corner, discouraging conversation. No smoking/eating area to side where children (hopefully with earplugs) accompanied by adults can sit, provided they eat, up to 6pm. A history panel indicates that the bar takes its name from one of the trades carried out on the site of the N1 centre in the nineteenth century. Disabled WC. Food (including 2 for 1 offers). Opens 9am (for breakfast) -2am Mon-Sat, 12-12 midnight Sun. Clearly aimed specifically at younger drinkers, it is almost indistinguishable from the plethora of other 'circuit' bars and has a slightly menacing edge (at least in the evenings) generally absent from other Wetherspoons pubs. Thankfully real ale is on offer, unlike many bars of its type, and is good value, but why oh why has Wetherspoon gone down this path when its unique formula of catering to a broad section of the community in a music-free environment has proved so successful?

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UNDERGROUND RESISTANCE

A few years ago, I wrote a piece for the Drinker on Dublin's brewing culture.

Things have moved on slowly since then but I feel it worthwhile to update you on the beers and the pubs that are making progress across the Irish Sea.

Many readers will already be acquainted with the Porterhouse chain of brewpubs.

Indeed, a branch has opened in Covent Garden but my focus remains their two pubs in Ireland. The first (and the chain's headquarters) is based in Bray on the Co. Wicklow coast south of Dublin and the other is in Parliament Street in central Dublin. All three Porterhouses brew for their own needs and so are self-contained.

On a recent visit to the Irish capital, I visited the Parliament Street house and once again inwardly digested their range. There are beers for nearly all tastes here: An Brainblasta is a strong ale, Porterhouse Red is a fine example of that indigenous and unique beer style, and there are three stouts and three lagers to choose from! Until last year, they brewed a cask version of their red ale but when the London house started to brew a new ale, TSB, they switched to that instead and this is now on sale and what's more on handpump too. Like their other beers - which are nitrokeg by the way - it is chilled, but this does not detract from the fiercely hoppy taste and aroma of this golden beer. It makes for a very enjoyable experience and I wonder how its sales do in comparison to their other beers.

The Porterhouse continues to become a veritable treasure trove of bottled beers from all over the world, so if you're looking for an obscure Portuguese porter, a Liberian lager or even a British brown ale, this is the place to seek out.

The pub is on three floors and one can see the brewing kit close-up and personal when answering nature's call in the basement. The house continues to welcome a varied clientele of beer lovers, locals, students and tourists and is a totally Guinness-free zone. On the edge of the frenetic Temple Bar area, it is a haven of quality and discernment.

Moving along the bustling quays towards O'Connell Bridge, I next popped into the Porterhouses' rival, Messrs. McGuire, an even larger brewpub with fine views of the River Liffey. McGuire's take their brewing very seriously.

Late last year they hired new head brewer Christopher Reid, a Brit no less, to take the helm and make the pub one of the places for the beer cognoscenti to stop and enjoy. I'd say he was doing a decent job...

Like its rivals, McGuire's boasts a fairly wide range of regularly brewed beers which include two stouts, a red ale, three lagers (one of which is brewed to the Reinheitsgebot), a wheat beer and a new cask bitter. I visited last year too and then they had a handpumped pale ale on which was great. This time around it has been superseded by Dublin Ale, which delivers plenty of hop and malt flavour for its 4.6% and is less upfront than TSB. As well as these regular favourites, MM has found its way clear to brewing no less than nine (I kid you not) occasional beers since it opened just a few years ago and these cover a wide range of strengths and styles too, ranging from a mild at 3.5%, through a Flemish dark ale, a red lager(!), two more wheat beers - one of which was a dark ale - plus a honey beer and a summer ale; they could not be accused of being unadventurous!


MM's is also on three floors with comfortable seating areas and bare boards but some intrusion from semi-loud sounds. The pub has a slightly harder job in shifting its own beers as Guinness have several of their brands on sale in a city which is soaked in their stuff already.

Outside Dublin, micros continue to spring up and start to make their impact in the shadow of the all-mighty empire of St. James' Gate. As if to prove their own independence after many years of domination by the giant, Biddy Early of Inagh (nr. Ennis, county town of Co. Clare) have staked their claim and have been brewing both cask and keg beers for some years now, their cask Real Biddy being a fine pint indeed.

Early's was Ireland's first pub brewery. Set up in 1995 by Dr Peadar Garvey, an industrial chemist, the brewpub sought to offer something different to its customers. Your country correspondent came across their oyster stout, Biddy Black, almost by accident whilst on holiday in the Burren area, near the Clare/Galway border, when trying not to pass a pub with his name on it - well nearly (O'Brien's Bar in Ballyvaughan).

The brewery is named after an 18th century woman who was reputed to have been a witch because of her health potions. A bottle of the potion was given to the local priest who, not wishing to be tainted with evil, reputedly threw the woman's peace offering into the river at Inagh, which then turned up over a century later behind the pub! It was the contents of this bottle that gave Dr Garvey the inspiration for his own brew.

Whether or not all the stories to be found at Biddy's website (www.beb.ie) are to be believed, Biddy Black certainly has a magical rich fruitiness which puts it (hop)poles apart from the standard 'black stuff'. Despite significant expansion of the brewery's output in the past few years the beers are still difficult to find on draught - the website has a list of outlets. Unfortunately, a last-minute hunt for the other beers available in bottle (red, blonde and lager) in the pretty town of Ennis, on the way back to

Shannon Airport on the day of Ireland's big World Cup clash with Germany, revealed only one bar stocking the bottled lager. The website shows one I didn't try, Cruise's Bar, and a couple of outlets in Galway city also stock draught versions of the red or black and, I assume, some take-away bottles too.

The brewery are CAMRA members and a visit to it, about ten miles west of Ennis, is recommended since 'if you stop in Inagh for one drink, you will stay for the day'. It is not known if the reasons for this statement are any more sinister than the quality of the beer...

Thurles, County Tipperary too is on the beer map now as the Dwan brewery produce some awesome cask ales. Dwan are also fortunate as they have a distributor in the UK, their An Dhubhain being a fantastic beer and a great example of their wares.

I predict that the next ten years will see more micros appear and, togetherwith the likes of Dwan and the Porterhouses, they'll start to make serious inroads into Guinness's sales. It will be possible to be a beer tourist like it is here or (say) Belgium and travel the country without resorting to Guinness's products at all. The idea of range and variety will come back to Ireland.

The Celtic Tiger economy is starting to assist Irish micros in setting-up and developing their craft and that's great. After years of being sold nothing but mass-produced, tasteless beers by one giant brewer, the Irish are looking for something else. Good on them!

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WHAT'S IN A NAME?

The Queen is the fourth longest reigning British monarch and, with the Jubilee celebrations in the offing, my topic this time is pub names and signs on a royal theme.

Of the ten most numerous pub names, only one does not relate to royalty - the New Inn. Whilst the King and the Queen are often depicted as chess pieces or indeterminate monarchs, signs of the King's Head and Queen's Head most frequently bear the portrait of Henry VIII or Elizabeth I. The frontage of the King & Queen in Brighton features painted statues of Henry VIII and Anne Boleyn - complete with head.

The King's Arms and Queen's Arms most often use what we recognise as the Royal Standard, though that has been in use unchanged only since 1837. Before then they changed with each reign. An unusual example is the carved and painted Grade II listed stone sign of the King's Arms, Southwark, which was removed in the 1750s from the nearby mediaeval London Bridge when its buildings were demolished.

Most monarchs have been commemorated on signs by either name or portrait, including some who probably existed only in legend, such as King Coel in Colchester, King Lud and King Arthur. Notable amongst those who really existed were William the Conqueror, King Alfred, William IV (known in his younger days as the Sailor Prince and Prince William Henry). King Harold was a great hero, as was King Richard I, despite the fact that much of his reign was spent overseas, but even his brother King John, who did not have such a good press, is commemorated. Another who suffered bad publicity was Richard the Third (in York) who was also Duke of York.

The term Royal in a pub's name is often taken to indicate royal connections, though that is not always the case, at the most tenuous. Pubs and their kin were often the only shelter available in emergency. However, the King's Arms & Royal Hotel, in Godalming, Surrey, had its title conferred by Henry VIII, and Czar Peter the Great patronised it in 1698

Edward III, who claimed the throne of France, used the Fleur de Lys, sometimes depicted as the Plume of Feathers, and Edward the Black Prince, supposedly named from the colour of his armour, was also Prince of Wales and adopted the emblems, which often appear on signs of pubs of that name. There is a possibly apocryphal story going back to the days when itinerant artisans could earn their living and keep at an inn by using their talents on the fabric of the building. One such, it is said, not the best educated of souls, was asked to paint a sign for a pub named the Black Prince, and produced a magnificent portrait - of a Zulu chieftain.

WHAT'S IN A NAME?

Of all British monarchs, more pubs are named after Queen Victoria than any other. Hardly surprising as her long reign saw the greatest building of pubs of all time. During his lifetime Prince Albert, her Prince Consort, was also honoured, as from the previous generations was the Prince Regent, later George IV. He was her uncle, and her parents were the Duke and Duchess of Kent.

Near Euston Station the Queen's Larder records that during his supposed madness George III stayed nearby. His wife Queen Charlotte kept provisions in the cellar and tended to his catering from there.

The simplest royal title for a pub is the Crown, which refers not only to the object but to that institution's ownership of the land on which it stood, and we have such variations as the Crown & Cushion, the Crown & Sceptre and the Crown Imperial. The Crown & Treaty House in Uxbridge, though, was the venue of successful negotiations to halt the Civil War. We know how that ended. It is not, however, the origin of the title of the King Charles' Head in Oxfordshire. comprised the Royal Children (in Nottingham). One of them, Charles II, is also remembered as the Black Boy - his nickname deriving from his swarthy appearance, and the Royal Oak commemorates his taking refuge from the Parliamentarians in an oak tree after the Battle of Worcester in 1651; the Royal Escape in Brighton recalls his flight from there to France in a fishing boat.

In a country as patriotic as Great Britain, it is inevitable that so many hostelries should bear the name or title of its royalty. The only trouble is that the subject is so vast, it is impossible to do it justice.

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



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
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
